City Commissioner W. J. Alder, speaking last night, expressed hope that, if a request was made by a large majority of the citizens of Prince Rupert, the Sisters of St. Anne might reconsider their decision in withdrawing the offer to build a \$200,000 hospital here. Mr. Alder suggested that fixed assets of the present hospital might be offered without cash and securities now held by the hospital.

The commissioner expressed belief that the majority of citizens were convinced that the present hospital situation was intolerable.

Mr. Alder quoted the annual hospital financial statement for 1936 which gave the total value of the Netherlands, will direct the fixed assets at \$37,144.26 with eash, securities and book accounts at \$20,000. 
