## GYROS TO BE ACTIVE

### Extension of Supervised Playground Work Expected to Be Major Objective for Ensuing Year

Continuation on an increased scale of supervised playground activities, which were initiated with such success last year, was forecast as the major objective of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club for the year 1937 at the monthly business luncheon of the club Wednesday. The playground committee, of which Dr. R. G. Large is chairman, has under consideration plans for further improvements to the playgrounds and extension of the season for supervised activities. A more complete report on projected playground activity will be presented by the committee at a special business meeting of the club to be held in two weeks.

W. H. Tobey chairman of the Gyro committee on the Morse Creek skating rink and swimming pool project with which the Rotary Club is also associated, reported on the accomplishments of that committee. The water had been raised by means of a dam and there was a large ice sheet available. Plans include the construction later of a path and a shelter. The possibilities of development as a swimming pool will be gone into now.

The club decided to hold a coronation dance on May 12 at which there will be no games of chance or other forms of raising money. A committee under chairmanship of C. C. Mills was appointed and was instructed to plan a dance which will be in keeping with the occasion. It will be a program of fair and the services of the Capitulations have been offered as one of the features.

Matters of club finance were also discussed at Wednesday's luncheon at which the president, Dr. H. N. Brocklesby, was in the chair.

## FISHERY LICENCES

### Annual Taxes Abolished by Provincial Government While Plant Fees Raised

## Scale of Imposts

### Some Interesting Changes Made—Each Line of Business Now Must Pay

VICTORIA, March 12: (CP)—The provincial government, in the 1937 fishery licence schedule issued yesterday, abolished individual taxes affecting seven thousand British Columbia fishermen and raised fish plant fees.

The following taxes were abolished:

Herring, pilchard and salmon purse seiners, \$25.  
Salmon drag seiners, \$25.  
Salmon gill-netters, \$2.50.  
The licences increased are:  
Herring dry salteries, \$500 to \$1000.  
Herring reduction, \$250 to \$500.

## Extra Licences

In addition, plants carrying on more than one business pay an extra licence for each business. New schedules include:  
Fish cool storage, herring and pilchard canneries, \$100.  
Pilchard, whale reduction and tierced salmon plants, \$500.  
Salmon canneries, \$1500.  
Co-operative firms are exempted from the \$25 fish buyer licences.

Massett, B. C., March 12:—Douglas Edenshaw and party have just returned from a four months visit at Hydraburg, Alaska, where they were lavishly entertained at a series of banquets and parties, at each of which from fifty to seventy-five were present.

While in Alaska Mr. Edenshaw helped to carve a fifty-foot totem pole for the Nakat Packing Company which was being made by Chief Wallace of Hydraburg at Waterfall Cannery. The old cannery there is being torn down and a new plant erected and on July 1 all the natives of the surrounding villages are invited to attend the raising of the totem, the finale of which will be a grand ball.

## Mooney Pardon Resolution Is Passed by House

SACRAMENTO, March 12:—The California state assembly has passed a resolution designed to pardon Tom Mooney, famous convict, who is serving a term of life imprisonment at San Quentin Penitentiary for participation in the fatal Preparedness Day bombings in San Francisco in 1916. The resolution was passed over advice that the legislature had no authority to grant such a pardon. Adoption by the Senate is necessary.

## DEFENCES WEAKENING

### Insurgents Claim to Have Advanced Thirty-Two Miles In Thirty-Six Hours

## To Head Patrol

### Two Dutch Admirals and Danish Colonel Will Run Spanish Blockade

LONDON, March 12: (CP)—Two Dutch naval officers and a Danish colonel have been named to run the international non-intervention committee's blockade against foreign volunteers and munitions shipments to Spain. Admiral Van Dulm of the Netherlands has been placed in charge of the entire neutrality project. Admiral Olivier, also of the Netherlands, will direct the naval patrol and Colonel Lunn, Danish, will supervise frontier agents along the Franco-Spanish border.

MADRID, March 12: (CP)—Defences of Madrid are weakening on an ever-widening front, impartial observers here agree. Insurgent quarters declare that their forces have advanced thirty-two miles in thirty-six hours.

While militiamen grimly dug in on Madrid's northeastern front, the government command asserted that the drive on the capital of 30,000 Italian soldiers had been checked forty-four miles from the city. Meanwhile uncensored reports reaching New York by mail from Valencia, Spain, said that odds against a government victory in the civil war had gone up to three to one, even in that temporary government capital. The majority of observers at Valencia believe it will be June at the earliest before peace is reached.

## HOPES FOR NEW OFFER

### City Commissioner W. J. Alder Further Discusses Local Hospital Issue

City Commissioner W. J. Alder, speaking last night, expressed hope that, if a request was made by a large majority of the citizens of Prince Rupert, the Sisters of St. Anne might reconsider their decision in withdrawing the offer to build a \$200,000 hospital here. Mr. Alder suggested that fixed assets of the present hospital might be offered without cash and securities now held by the hospital.

The commissioner expressed belief that the majority of citizens were convinced that the present hospital situation was intolerable. Mr. Alder quoted the annual hospital financial statement for 1936 which gave the total value of fixed assets at \$37,144.26 with cash, securities and book accounts at \$20,000. If the assets had been turned over to the Sisters the last item would have been the only one of any value in erecting a building costing upwards of \$200,000.

**The Letter Box**

**HOSPITAL SITUATION**

Editor, Daily News.—Will you allow me space to make a clear statement of facts relating to the controversy that has arisen around the offer of the Sisters of St. Ann and its subsequent withdrawal.

The intent of this letter is to dispel, if possible, the suspicion, distrust, bitterness, acrimony and intolerance inseparable from discussions of this kind. They are regrettable but inescapable.

There are many Sisterhoods in the Catholic Church. Some nurse the sick, others care for the blind, others succor and help the wayward. Whatever their particular vocation, all, without exception, are bound by the most solemn vows to enhance the prestige and extend the influence of the Catholic Church.

The Medical Association of British Columbia is a body of honorable men, some 600 in number, whose skill in medical and surgical practice cannot be gainsaid. They have drawn up a code of ethics in medical and surgical practice that is in strict conformity with the laws of Canada. Their code of ethics is accepted in every non-Catholic hospital in British Columbia.

The Sisters of St. Ann insist, as a condition to any doctor practicing, either on the active staff or as a visiting physician in their hospitals, that he or she shall sign and agree to abide by their own rules and regulations. Certain of these Catholic ethics are of a distinctively denominational character. (I have a copy of these rules and regulations before me as I write). No Catholic need feel outraged by the statement that some of these Catholic ethics are not acceptable to the non-Catholic majority in this city.

Bishop Bunoz can, if he wishes to do so, lift this matter clear out of the realm of religious controversy by giving specific assurances that, insofar as non-Catholic patients are concerned, the code of ethics laid down by the British Columbia Medical Association shall be the only code required in any Catholic public hospital that shall be established in this city, this assurance to be agreed to by any Sisterhood seeking the support of public funds.

Catholics will thus be secured in their right to subject themselves to the discipline of their church, and non-Catholics will have the assurance that their liberty of conscience shall in no way be interfered with.

Furthermore, that the Catholic ethic on baptism shall not apply to non-Catholics, and that under no

circumstances shall the Catholic rite of baptism be performed on a child of non-Catholic parents without the knowledge and free consent of the parents.

That a proportionate number of non-Catholic graduate nurses shall be permanently employed on the active staff, the number to be a matter of agreement according to the number of beds.

That the condition demanding a monopoly of hospitalization for the Sisterhood be withdrawn.

If these guarantees are given, I sincerely believe that should the Sisters of St. Ann or any other community of nursing sisters seek to come here, a more friendly feeling might be expected.

In these days, when religious liberty, and even elementary human rights, are being stamped underfoot by upstart dictators, it behooves both Catholics and non-Catholics to stand together in defence each of the others' right to freedom of conscience and freedom to worship in his own peculiar and particular manner.

With this controversy out of the way, the citizens can then dispassionately consider whether it is in the public interest to turn over to the Catholic Church the assets of the present hospital.

As to the fire hazard, may I suggest that until a new hospital is built, some of the extra men that are to be taken on to the staff at the fire hall be detailed to the protection of the present hospital structure.

Thank you, sir.

## DR. CARTER IS SPEAKER

Anglican Young People Thrilled By Scientific Discourse

Dr. Neal Carter delivered an extremely interesting address to the Anglican Young People's Association on Wednesday night in the cathedral hall. His subject was "Very Low Temperatures." Dr. Carter touched on the methods that are used by scientists to obtain these temperatures. He illustrated his lecture with numerous experiments with what is known commonly as "dry ice" but in reality is solidified carbon dioxide. His audience was impressed when an egg was dipped into a solution of carbon dioxide and ether and, after a few seconds, was fished out nothing less than a white rock. It was with no less interest that the young folk saw liquid mercury frozen to a solid metal in the same solution. After many more thrilling experiments, Dr. Carter closed his talk with an explanation of how absolute zero had never been reached but that an American scientist had come within more than an extremely small degree of reaching it.

R. Yerburch thanked Dr. Carter on behalf of the association for his illuminating address and for the trouble that he had gone to.

The meeting was then adjourned and an appetizing supper was served. Then a short business meeting was held at which the committee in charge reported on the arrangements that had been made for the tea to be held on April 10.
