# RESUMED

Rebel Artillery at Madrid Not Silenced After All-Arrival Of Food Relieves Bilbao

MADRID, April 24: (CP)—Rebel artillery, after a brief silence owing it was thought to loyalist guns having found its range and put it out of commission, resumed its bombardment of Madrid yesterday for the twelfth successive day. Little, if any progress, in the tide of war has been made, however, by the insurgents in the siege although it is estimated that 250 non-combatants in the city have been killed with many others in-

Italian artillerymen were reported to have marched through San Bebastian yesterday on the way to the Bilbao sector to reinforce insurgent forces in that area.

It was reported from Hendaye France, today that a column of General Emilio Mola's army had pressed into El Orrio against what semi-official insurgent reports described as crumbling Basque defence of this stepping stone to Bilbao. Most of the Basque defenders are reported to have evacuated El Orrio, moving back into the rolling hills to the west.

As soon as he had a rudimentary grasp of the principles of Social Credit he began broadcasting them, harping on the theme of poverty in the midst of plenty, the money monopoly and the need of extra purchasing power based on the vast natural resources of Alberta.

Early Found Support Aberhart soon found he had

struck a responsive chord. He received hundreds of letters from all parts of the province, demanding more information. Riding this wave of public response, he formed study groups for Social Credit, the Bible Institute being the distribution centre for literature. This had an immediate political result. Aberhart at this time had no de-

sire for political power. He instructed his economic converts to press the United Farmers government, in power since 1921, to investigate the possibilities of Social Credit. It was a small voice at first but when it developed into a roar the government hastily set out to counteract

Douglas was commissioned to give evidence before a House committee and it looked like a victory for the orthodox financial views of the government when he said Social Credit could not be established in a Canadian province because of \$54,081,967 its lack of constitutional control over money and credit. # WOMEN AT CROWNING

Coming Ceremony Will Reflect Progress of Gentler Sex In Affairs of British Empire

LONDON, April 24: (CP) -Beautifully-gowned women may be out-numbered by brilliantlyuniformed men in the great congregation in Westminster Abbey on Coronation Day. But among those in the scintillating crimson, scarlet and blue, will be women whose presence emphasizes recent historical development and the changing status of women in a changing world.

Canadian, Australian and South African-born women who have married into the peerage, will sit with those whose lineage dates back to the Norman conquest. Among peeresses of Canadian birth are the Countess of Minto and Countess of Haddington, daughters of G. W. Cook of Montreal; Lady Harding, former ly Margot Fleming of Ottawa; the Marchioness of Donegal, who was Violet Twining of Halifax: Lady de Blagneire, the French-(Canadian; Lady Congleton, sister of the present Lord Strathcona and the two Lady Shaughnessys.
