

## Japanese Report Defense Lines In North China Are Shattered In Big Advance In That Area

### BONUS IS DEMANDED

Prevents British Freighter From Sailing Out of Port Alberni To Orient

PORT ALBERNI, Sept. 16: (CP) -The British freighter Dalcroy was tied up here today with the refusal of thirty-five members of the crew to move the ship unless granted a bonus of \$75. The ship is loaded with logs for Dairen, Manchukuo, and the crew says the voyage would take them into the Sino-Japanese war zone.

The log book was read to the crew of British and Malayans yesterday.

Manchurian Divisions Said to Be In Full Retreat With Centre of Battlefront Broken By Pursuing Invaders

GENEVA, Sept. 16: (CP)—The League of Nations Council today put China's appeal against Japanese aggression in the hands of a revised advisory committee and asked twenty-three nations to take part in the deliberations. The United States was asked to participate. By its action the League pushed into the background, for the time being at least, the question of sanctions against Japan. China's move for sanctions was shelved with her approval.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 16: (CP)—The Chinese counterattacked today from the centre of the Shanghai defense line and drove the Japanese from Litien, fifteen miles northwest of the international settlement. Despite steady rain, the Chinese are said to have broken the mechanized Japanese attack.



Meanwhile from Peiping the Japanese reported that the centre of the Chinese battlefront in North China had been shattered and that General Wan Fu Lin's Manchurian divisions were in full retreat. Japanese advices from the front thirty miles south of Peiping said that the 100-mile Chinese line was split and that the left wing had been driven from the west by pursuing Japanese. The Japanese described the advance as the greatest undertaken by a Japanese army since the Russo-Japanese war.

FOUND HIS PLACE

Rev. Robert Connell, formerly leader of the C.C.F in 4. British Columbia, has been chosen president of the Island Arts and Craft Society at Victoria. Here he will find scope for his activities which will undoubtedly be much more congenial than leading a political party. He explains that the love of art cannot be taught but it may be aroused. Many people will be glad that Mr. Connell has turned his brilliant mind and splendid energies to an occupation that is suited to his temperament.

#### NEED OF TOLERANCE

A writer in a southern paper objects to the Vancouver city council accepting for the museum a set of models showing the ascent of man from the early ages to the present. He suggests that this breeds atheism among the young and he speaks of "the ungodly evolution theory.'

We remember the case of a young man who was brought up in the belief that Darwin was an atheist. Then one day he went with a friend to South Kensington Museum and noticed the bust of Darwin there and found that he was spoken of with reverence by students as one who had led people away from idol worship, the idol in this case being the Scriptures as compiled in the book usually! known as the Bible. He was spoken of as one of the greatest of great men.

We all respect the people who are jealous for the faith in which they had been brought up and for the truths which they had been taught. Even if we think they are wrong, we respect them. So with the man who has been brought up in the faith of Buddha and is faithful to its tenets. Undoubtedly he will benefit thereby. In spite of this we cannot hold back the advances of scientific knowledge, because some people object to it as heresy. We cannot be sure that the men who were appointed in the time of King James to translate the scriptures from the various languages in which they were written did so with absolute accuracy or that in the change they conveyed the meaning intended by the various writers. The same is true of other translations. So we cannot be sure that the deductions of science are always accurate. There must be tolerance on both sides and a desire to add to our knowledge as the ages pass. From time to time we secure additional information about the earth and the universe of which it is a part and we have to adjust our views accordingly. Others refuse to budge from their original convictions like Oom Paul Kruger, the president of the Transvaal, who always insisted, in spite of evidence to the contrary, that the earth remained stationary and that the sun revolved about it. The spread of knowledge is gradual and is often hampered by honest convictions and silly superstititions.




