Albert Sidney Burleson, Woodrow Wilson's Postmaster General, Dies

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov 25: (CP)-Albert Sidney Burleson, aged 74 who was Postmaster General of the United States in the cabinet o President Woodrow Wilson, died at his home here yesterday

Born at San Marcos, Texas, June 7, 1863, Mr. Burleson was educated in his native state, graduating from University of Texas in 1884 and being admitted to the bar in 1885. He was assistant city attorney of Austin from 1885 to 1890 and district attorney from 1891 to 1898. He was a member of Congress from 1899 to 1913 and became Postmaster General in 1913, continuing through the Wilson regime. In 1918 he was made chairman of the United States Telegraph and Telephone Administra-

Mr. Burleson is survived by his widow who, before she married him, was Adele Steiner of Austin.
