CABINET MEMBER

Albert Sidney Burleson, Woodrow Wilson's Postmaster General, Dies

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 25: (CP)—Albert Sidney Burleson, aged 74, who was Postmaster General of the United States in the cabinet of President Woodrow Wilson, died at his home here yesterday.

Born at San Marcos, Texas, June 7, 1863, Mr. Burleson was educated in his native state, graduating from University of Texas in 1884 and being admitted to the bar in 1885. He was assistant city attorney of Austin from 1885 to 1890 and district attorney from 1891 to 1898. He was a member of Congress from 1899 to 1913 and became Postmaster General in 1913, continuing through the Wilson regime. In 1918 he was made chairman of the United States Telegraph and Telephone Administration.

Mr. Burleson is survived by his widow who, before she married him, was Adele Steiner of Austin.

WAR ON BRITAIN
TOKYO—The Kokumin Shim-bun, Nationalist paper, today demanded a "Holy War" against Great Britain. "The Sino-Japanese conflict must end in crushing of British influence not only in China but in all Asia," the paper said.

CHARGED WITH PLOTTING
PARIS—Eugene deLone and General Edouard Duseigneur, alleged master minds of the Cash-oulard (Hooded Ones) secret society which the police claim planned to topple the government by armed force and establish a dictatorship, were arrested today.

MRS. PRESTON DIES
SMITHERS—Mrs. S. G. Preston 22 wife of the district agriculturalist here, died last night at the local hospital. She was formerly Miss Doris Barger of Telkwa and had been married only this summer.

Nanking To Fall Next

SHANGHAI, Nov. 25: (CP)—The Japanese advance toward Nanking is still slowed down, supposedly in preparation for the final drive on the city. The general opinion appears to be that the Chinese will relinquish Nanking after a minor rearguard engagement although they are reported to be rushing up reinforcements to meet the threatened Japanese big push at Nanking. Front lines are more or less calm but air raiders are active. Six planes bombed a passenger train on the Canton-Kowloon Railway while attempting to destroy four bridges. Chinese said civilian loss was heavy.

TO CREATE NEW BOARD

Coal and Petroleum Control Body For British Columbia Will Be Formed, Announces Pattullo

VICTORIA, Nov. 25: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo announced in the Legislature last night that legislation would be introduced at the present session providing for the establishment of a coal and petroleum board.

The Premier's announcement followed the making public of the report of the MacDonald Royal Commission on coal and petroleum products which found prices of coal and gasoline to be excessively high in British Columbia.

Pattullo Outlines Ambitious Twenty-Six Point Program Of Objectives For Legislature

"Beehive of Industry with Economic and Social Security For All"—Alaska Highway Construction, Enlargement of Province, Peace River Transportation Among Plans

VICTORIA, Nov. 25: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo last night outlined for the Legislature a twenty-six point program of government objectives designed to make the province a "beehive of industry and development with economic and social security from the Forty-Ninth Parallel to the northern boundary and from Alberta to the Pacific Ocean with our people happy and prosperous."

TIE-UP IS NOW OVER

Seattle Ships Moving to Alaska Again After Settlement of Dispute Over Work Distribution

SEATTLE, Nov. 25: (CP)—The six-day tie-up of ships of three companies operating in the Alaska service from here is ended with the settlement of the dispute between the companies and the cooks and waiters over the distribution of work.

The Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Sea will sail for Alaska on Friday.

Scientific Station In Arctic Is Urged

Would Serve a Very Valuable Purpose, Says Viljalmur Stefansson

NEW YORK, Nov. 25: (CP)—Viljalmur Stefansson, noted Canadian-born explorer and president of the Explorers' Club, urges that Canada establish a scientific research station in the Arctic regions. It would serve a very valuable purpose, he says.

FERRETING OUT REBEL ACTIVITIES

Authorities of France are Co-operating in Getting at Bottom of Revolutionary Movement

PARIS, Nov. 25: (CP)—French police operatives are co-operating in a nation-wide drive to ferret out arms caches of conspirators to discover the leaders and learn the source of funds for vast purchases of arms by Les Cagoulauds (The Hooded Ones) who are suspected of connection with a royalist revolutionary dictatorship. Papers seized during the past few days in the most important of a long series of raids indicate extensive revolutionary plans.

Refunding Is Near Finished

City Has Converted Million and Three Quarters of Debentures With Only \$6000 remaining

The municipal refunding operation which was instituted by City Commissioner W. J. Alder a couple of years ago has now been completed except for a mere \$4000 worth of bonds. The city, on starting out, had a total of \$1,735,000 of debentures to convert from old issues to new of lower interest rate. Sitting in his capacity as a city council yesterday, the commissioner authorized the exchanging of another \$6000 of old bonds for new, bringing the total now refunded to \$1,731,000.

HANDS ARE KEPT FREE

No Commitments Were Made By Halifax to Hitler, it is Announced

LONDON, Nov. 25: (CP)—Viscount Halifax, Lord President of the Council, made no commitments to Chancellor Adolf Hitler during his recent visit to Germany. Nor will any commitments to Germany be made without the House of Commons having full opportunity to discuss them.

The Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain sketched in the House of Commons today the result of the Berlin conversations. The Prime Minister dismissed press speculations as to what occurred between Halifax and Hitler as "not only irresponsible but highly inaccurate."

Madrid Is Bombarded

MADRID, Nov. 25: (CP)—There was another heavy aerial bombardment of Madrid yesterday by insurgent fighting planes which are estimated to have dropped at least two thousand projectiles on the beleaguered city. There was much property damage and casualties are also believed to have been quite heavy.

QUEBEC IS AGREEABLE

Is Fifth Province to Approve B.N.A. Act Amendment for Unemployment Insurance

QUEBEC, Nov. 25: (CP)—Quebec is the fifth province of the Dominion to agree to the proposal of Premier William Lyon Mackenzie King to amend the British North America Act so that a scheme of federal unemployment may be enacted.

Autonomy of the province of Quebec would be safeguarded, said Premier Maurice Duplessis in announcing approval of his government of the move.

Many Writers Clever; Good Ones Scarce

TORONTO, Nov. 25: (CP)—Speaking before a convention of poets and authors here, Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor General of Canada, said there were many clever writers but few good ones. There was an inferiority complex among many who had the talents to become good authors.

DEPORTING IS SOUGHT

Proceedings Against Harry Bridges Instituted By Oregon Governor May Be Heard in 'Frisco

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 25: Federal immigration officials indicate that proceedings instituted by Governor Charles H. Martin of Oregon seeking the deportation of Harry Bridges, longshoremen's union leader, may be held in San Francisco. Martin charges Bridges with communist activities on which grounds he seeks his deportation. Bridges, who is an Australian and is in this country on permit, has persistently denied being a member of any communist organization.

HONG KONG, Nov. 25: (CP)—More than seventy persons are believed to have perished in disastrous floods on the Island of Formosa.

VICTORIA BY-ELECTION

We have great respect for some of the C.C.F. leaders and we like a good deal of the C.C.F. platform. Much of it is just part of the Liberal platform. The main difference is that Liberalism stands for reform. The C.C.F. as we understand it, is not much interested in making gradual changes but would scrap the whole system, a policy which would be very likely to lead to much trouble with possible rise of fascism and establishment of a dictator. This is what they are fighting out in Victoria today.

Victoria is divided into three camps. There is the Liberal camp which believes in the policy as set forth by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King. There is the Conservative camp with Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennet as leader, the party of extreme nationalism. The camp of the C.C.F. has not yet had any political responsibilities thrust upon it except that in the last provincial Legislature it was the official opposition. It professes to stand for socialism as set forth originally by Carl Marx of Germany.

It will be most interesting to watch the by-election campaign in Victoria, particularly in view of the close run given there at the last election by the C.C.F. and also because of the reported growing strength of Conservatism in this province. A hot campaign is being carried on by all three parties.

THE C.C.F. IN THE EAST

We have read that the C.C.F. is well pleased with the outcome of the Ontario election but the completion of the compilation of figures there shows that in the previous campaign the C.C.F. polled 108,000 votes but in the election of a few weeks ago this dropped to 77,000. That is not very encouraging. The percentage of the whole vote polled was only 4.9 per cent, a drop from 6.9 per cent. It is suggested by observers that the C.C.F. is one of those numerous new parties which spring up and then gradually disappear. The present Victoria election may be an indication of what is likely to happen.

DEMOCRACY AT STAKE

A great many people favor the return to a strictly two-party system of government because they see in the rise of third parties danger for our whole system of democracy. Many people support the C.C.F. because they have been disappointed at the slowness with which the other parties move. We have all been disappointed at some time or other that better progress was not made. Possibly if the advance guard of Liberalism which has broken away had remained with the party we might have advanced more rapidly. In any event whatever the west may do, the East is evidently not enthused over the prospect of the third party and the East has the preponderance of power in our democracy.

ACTIVITIES OF SERVICE

World Would Be Better Place if All Men Would Play Their Part, Father Gordon Tells Gyros

"If all men would devote some of their talents as you of the Gyro Club are doing, to activities designed for the betterment of the community and the country in general there would be a social order which would leave no room for influences of an insidious character," declared Rev. Father James Gordon, parish priest of the local Roman Catholic Church, at the conclusion of a luncheon address before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club yesterday. Father Gordon chose as his subject "Guilds or Societies of the Middle Ages" and his discourse was of a very interesting character.

These guilds of the Middle Ages, said Father Gordon, represented the first attempt of man to organize for social and economic improvement prior to the Twelfth and Thirteenth Centuries there had been little in the way of town and city life. The working classes had been to a large extent engaged in agriculture. Under the feudal and manorial systems prior to that time the lords had lived off the poor people. Around the time of the Crusades, however, due to the development of travel and commerce, there had risen a new social period. Agriculture was not still taking up all the time of the poor people and they gathered in communities to engage in trade and crafts. The social instinct commenced to manifest itself and the guilds, founded to large extent on religious ideals, came into being. There were three principal types of guilds — religious, merchant and craft. Ideals of these guilds were of the finest. They worked towards the development of the better qualities and improvement of the conditions of mankind. Such had been the foundations of the societies and guilds of today, even such organizations as the Gyro Club.

Dr. R. G. Large, past president, who occupied the chair, expressed the appreciation of the club to Father Gordon for his address.

The club authorized an additional grant of \$100 to be used in connection with the development of the Morse Creek swimming pool and skating rink project, the Rotary Club having voted a similar amount.

Miss Saita is accompanied on her trip by her patroness, Mrs. E. Miyake, wife of a Vancouver Japanese dentist, and by her accompanist, Miss S. Higashi.

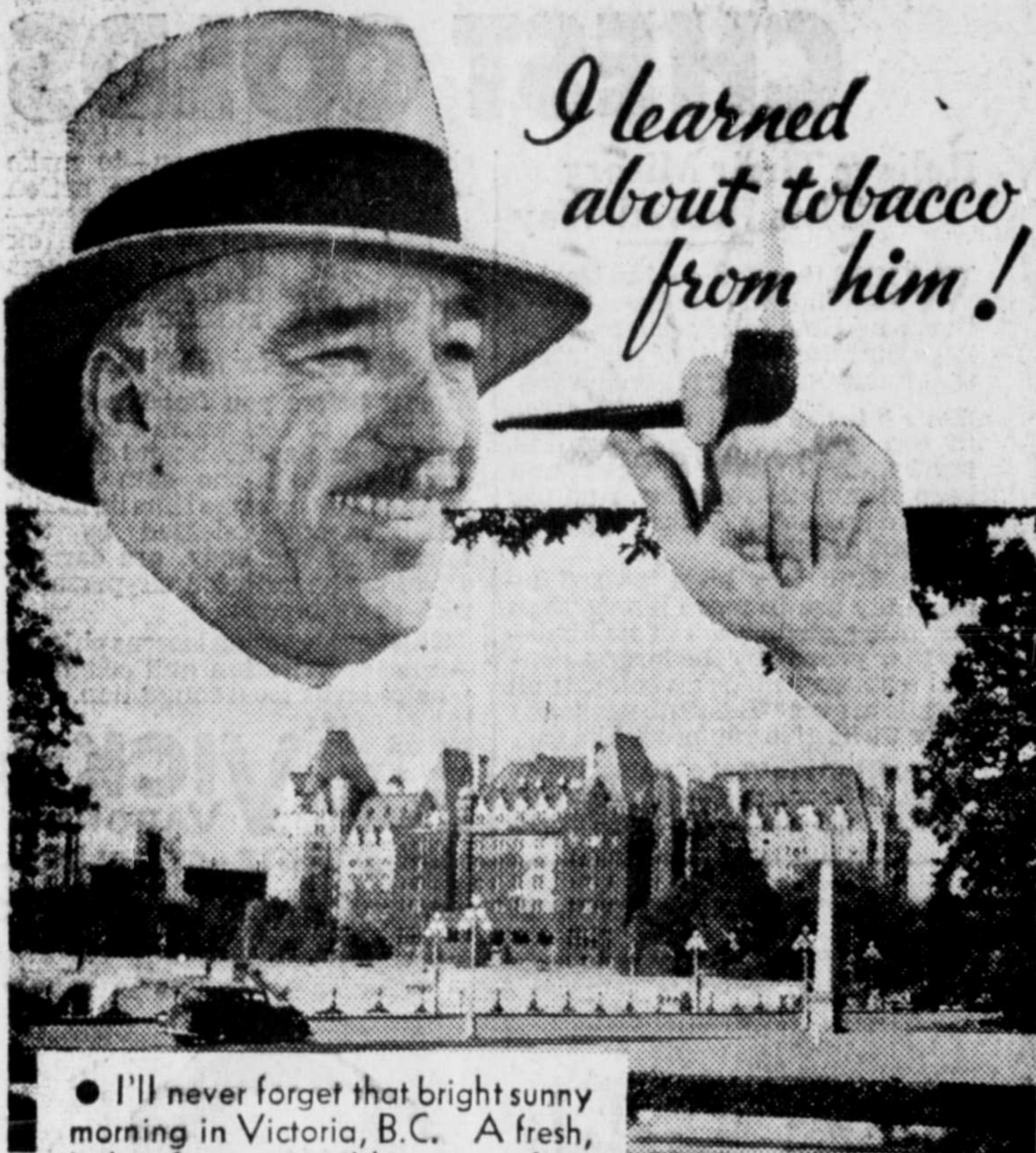

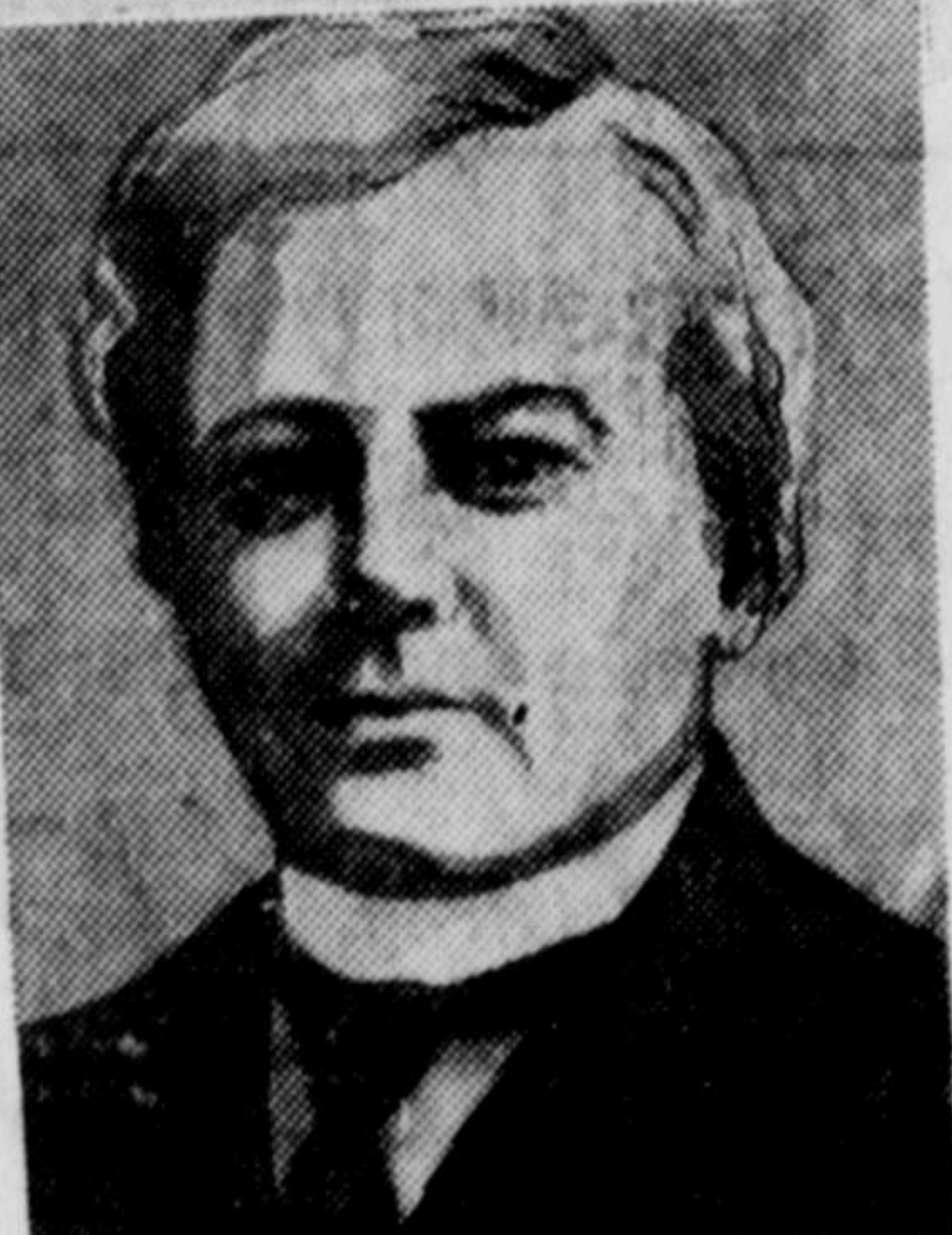

BURNS LAKE, Nov. 25.—In the Elks' Hall the installation of the new officers of the Young Rangers' Band was conducted by Mrs. Walter Wilson assisted by Hon. Ranger Audrey Jewell. After singing of "O Canada," Mrs. Wilson expressed the appreciation of all members of the Band for the leadership provided by the retiring officers. 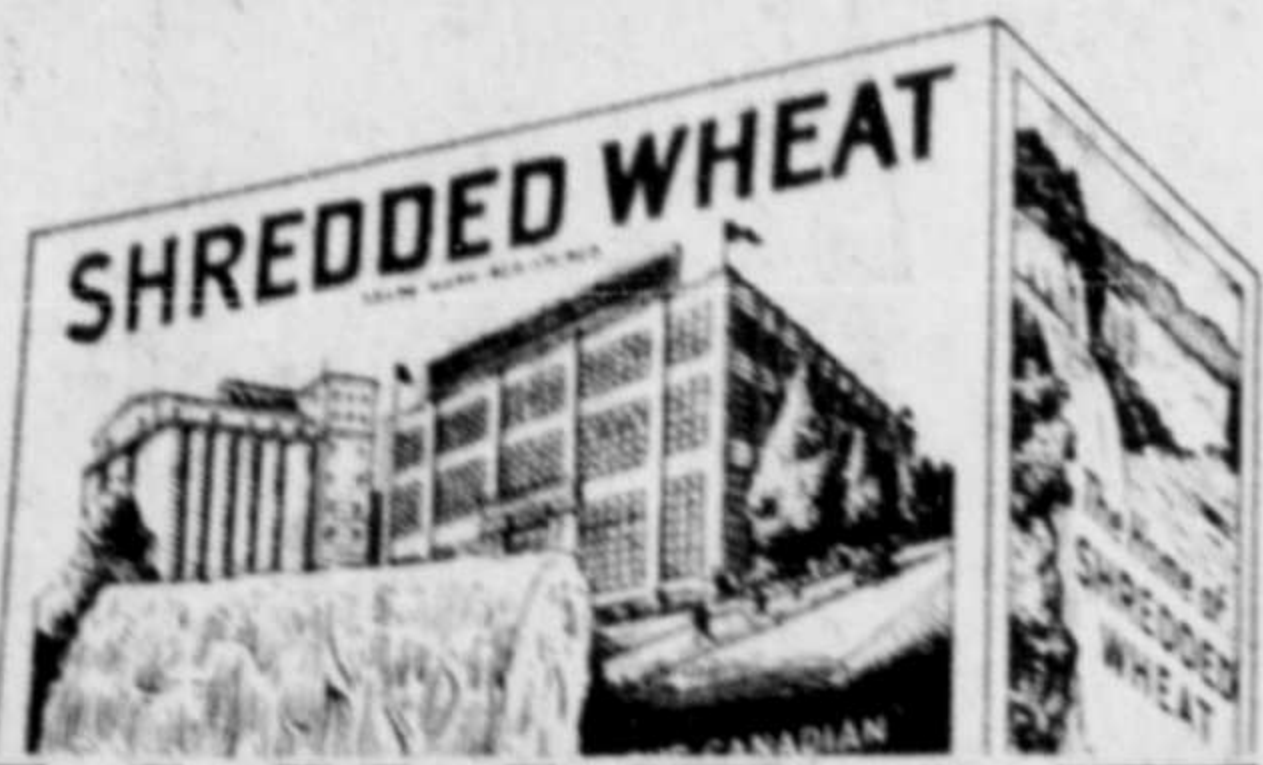
