IS ASKED

Premier Pattullo Takes up Cudgels at Ottawa on Behalf Of Relief Camp Workers

VICTORIA. May 7: (CP)-Premier T. D. Pattullo said yesterday that he was sending a telegram to the Department of Justice at Ottawa recommending that fifty relief camp workers who had been sentenced to a month in prison for obstructing police in Vancouver be released.

The Premier said that "it is felt that the men who have been charged with the offences could not have been aware that the British Columbia Department of Labor was at the time endeavoring to find accommodation for them in camps and that they were victims of unsound advice from those who did not have the welfare of the men at heart."

LAKEHURST, N.J., May 6:-Of ninety-seven persons who were on board the great German dirigible Hindenburg, which was destroyed by explosion and fire last evening as she was about to land at the United States Navy air base following a trans-Atlantic crossing from Germany, 33 were known dead or unaccounted for while 64 were still alive, it was indicated by an official check-up early today. 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



According to figures just issued International Fisheries Commission the total catch of halibut on the Pacific Coast for the present season up to the end of April totalled 10,109,848 pounds as compared with 9,800,000 pounds in the corresponding period of last year. Oddly enough, fishing in Area No. 2 so far this year has been at somewhat slower a rate this season so far while in Area No. 3 it has been slightly faster. The yield for Area No. 2 so far in 1937 is placed at 5,750,000 pounds in comparison with 6,000,000 pounds in 1936 while in Area No. 3 it has been 4,400,000 pounds as compared with 3,800,000 pounds last year. Of the! total of 10,109,848 pounds of fish taken so far this year, 2,448,312 was caught by the Canadian fleet and the balance by the United States. The figures are issued by George J. Alexander, chairman of the International Fisheries Commission.

Yesterday six boats sold catches of halibut in Seattle totalling 156,- son. 500 pounds as follows: Helgeland, 30,000, Booth, 87gc and 61/gc; Trinity, 34,000, Whiz, 9c and 63/8c; Venture, 30,000, Sebastian, 87ac and 61/4c; Polaris, 34,000, New England, 9c and 61/2c; Forward, 13,500, San Juan, 81/4c and 7c; Blanco, 15,000, San Juan, 81/2c and 7c.


