Hatfield Draws Jail Term And Logan Arrested

OTTAWA, Sept. 23: (CP) — Capt. Freeman Hatfield, Nova Scotia mariner, was sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment in reformatory today for defrauding the reparations commission of \$71,000. He was paid reparations when he claimed his ship, the Gypsum Queen, was sunk by a submarine during the war. The crown claimed that the vessel actually floundered in a storm and this was the contention that the jury accepted in finding Hatfield guilty. Later Senator Hance J. Logan of Nova Scotia, was arrested on a warrant charging him with conniving to deliver the reparations money to Hatfield.

WILFUL DAMAGE

The city is offering a reward of \$25 to any person who will give evidence leading to the conviction of persons who wilfully damage property in Prince Rupert.

There have been a number of complaints of boys and others breaking railings, invading and ransacking houses, breaking windows and otherwise damaging property in the city. Also there have been similar complaints in regard to damage to summer cottages across the harbor.

This instinct to smash things is not new but is none the less annoying and the curious thing is that the worst damage is to the character of the person who is responsible for the damage. Anyone reporting such actions is doing the whole city a service. It is a patriotic duty and only firm action on the part of everyone will prove effective in stopping it.

ITS A CURIOUS WORLD

In the old days piracy was common on the high seas and when a pirate ship was caught the captain and crew were made to walk the plank which meant that they were forced to jump into the sea. No mercy was shown.

For many years piracy had been confined to the China seas and only at long intervals were cases reported. Now in the twentieth century it is necessary for the nations of the world to combine to stop piracy.

There was also a time when the British flag was protection for British subjects anywhere in the world. Today the British flag is being flaunted, British subjects fired upon and many losing their lives because one Oriental nation quarrels with another.

At one time the nation that had the strongest navy was mistress of the seas. Today the one with the most airplanes and the most highly skilled pilots is mistress of both land and sea. These are very important changes.

BARRIERS TO TRADE

A few years ago there was a definite swing of all nations toward nationalism and the consequent raising of trade barriers with the hope of improving business at home. Canada was one of the nations that participated in this scheme. While we are not going to say that Canada was wrong in a certain measure of protection, we think it was a mistake to cut off trade almost altogether as was done at that time.

Now there is a very definite swing in the opposite direction. Nations are realizing that they cannot live to themselves and that restricting trade is injurious to all concerned. When we buy goods from another country and sell the same country enough goods to pay for the imports, it is a benefit to both countries. Cutting off trade relations with Japan some years ago injured British Columbia and threw many citizens out of work. Reopening trade relations allowed Canadians to buy many Japanese goods that were needed and at the same time provided a market for many Canadian articles of commerce, especially British Columbia products. And what applies to Japan applies to almost every other country.

HE STAGED GREAT RACE

"Abe" Orpen Brought Man-o-War and Sir Barton Together—Was Picturesque Figure

TORONTO, Sept. 23. (CP)—The most celebrated horse race ever staged in Canada was under management of "Abe" Orpen, famous Canadian sportsman and race track owner who died in Toronto yesterday, at Kenilworth Track, Windsor, in 1920. Orpen brought together Man o'War, owned by Samuel Riddle, and Sir Barton, owned by J. K. L. Ross of Montreal, when the turf world was in hot dispute over the merits of these great runners. Orpen put up a purse of \$75,000 and horse followers from all parts of the continent came to watch Man o'War win easily.

Before he purchased the Hillcrest race track, a half-mile oval in the centre of Toronto, at the turn of the century, Orpen operated a handbook at Woodbine track. For a time he managed a hotel. But always he was interested in gambling and so successful was Hillcrest that he purchased Dufferin in 1902. Hillcrest was sold in 1916.

Kenilworth was opened the same year and in 1924 Orpen started Long Branch, a mile track west of Toronto. In 1935 Orpen leased the Fair Grounds at London for yearly two-week meets.

In 1935 he opened wickets for dollar betting at the London track, an innovation so popular he placed it in operation at all his tracks. He was the first in Canada to install equipment for photographing finishes and was the inventor of a three-section starting gate used now at nearly all Ontario tracks.

Known For Generosity
While Orpen's chief interests were horse racing and betting, he was known in Toronto as a philanthropist. He made friends with prominent politicians and ministers. For years he was accompanied everywhere by an armed guard—his chauffeur.

Orpen was 83 in the spring of 1937 when he reported to police that three men had kidnapped him as he entered his National Sporting Club. He was forced to drive them to a downtown bank where he said he withdrew \$1000 and sent the trio away with it. "I dealt my way out of that mess," he told reporters.

A few days earlier he told of losing \$81,000 on a "tip" by his close friend, Charles Vance Miller, author of the famous "Stork Derby" will. Orpen and Miller bought a narrow strip of property dividing two downtown buildings, expecting to make big profit by selling the strip they considered "essential" to one building or other. Orpen held his interest several years and finally sold at a loss.

It was Orpen's belief that any man with a few dollars to spare should have the right to bet it, either at the track or elsewhere. But he was frank in announcing his customers couldn't expect to beat the races. "Betting on the horses is a losing proposition," he said. "It is a game the public cannot beat. Once, twice or oftener the better may win, but if he follows the game day in and day out he will always end a loser."

Orpen was born in Toronto Feb. 10, 1854. He married Isobel Wrigley of Newmarket, Ont., and nine children were born of the union. The only three living are Fred M. and Abram M. Jr., and Mrs. T. Ambrose Wood.

The age of greatest athletic prowess is 25 to 29, except in golf and bowling, when it is 30 to 34. This was the finding from a study of 11 leading sports reported to the American Psychological Association by Prof. Harvey C. Lehman of Ohio University, at Athens, Ohio. He studied the records of hockey and baseball players from the years 1916 to 1937. The best single year for baseball records in this group, he said, was the age of 28. But the average for both baseball and hockey was 25 to 29.

In prize fighting, with 135 world champions in all classes supplying the material, the best age was 25 to 29. Bowlers were 30 to 34. Duck pin bowlers were the same. Golfers included only the British and professional champions. Tennis champions, the professor said, ranged from 22 to 26 for outdoor play and 25 to 30 for indoor. 

Referendum

(1) As to whether, in the event of the Canadian American Pulp and Paper Mills Limited, or any other company, obtaining, utilizing and carrying on the manufacture of pulp and (or) paper at the drydock site in the City of Prince Rupert, it should be granted the following concessions, in lieu of all rates, licenses and (or) other forms of municipal taxation to which it may be subject under the "Municipal Act," at present or in the future:

- (a) A fixed annual payment of One Thousand Dollars for a period of five years and a fixed annual payment of Five Thousand Dollars for the next twenty years
- (b) After the expiration of the said twenty-five year period, the rate of taxation is not to exceed twelve and one-half mills on improvements and twenty-five mills upon land.
- (c) Free water for fire protection, personal and other uses not directly concerned with manufacturing operations during the lifetime of the industry.

(d) Permission to take and use the water required by the said pulp and (or) paper mill from Shawatlans Lake, during the lifetime of the industry.

(2) As to whether, in the event of the Canadian-American Pulp and Paper Mills Limited, or any other company, obtaining, utilizing and carrying on the manufacture of pulp and (or) paper at the Seal Cove site in Waterfront Block I, Prince Rupert Townsite, it should be granted the following concessions, in lieu of all rates, licenses and (or) other forms of municipal taxation to which it may be subject under the "Municipal Act," at present or in the future:

- (a) A fixed annual payment of Five Hundred Dollars for a period of twenty-five years.
- (b) After the expiration of the twenty-five year period, the rate of taxation is not to exceed twelve and one-half mills on improvements and twenty-five mills upon land.
- (c) Free water for fire protection, personal and other uses not directly concerned with manufacturing operations, during the lifetime of the industry.
- (d) Permission to take and use the water required by the said pulp and (or) paper mill from Shawatlans Lake, during the lifetime of the industry.

(3) It is understood that no retail business shall be conducted on either site.

Those entitled to vote are property owners as defined by subsection (2), of Section 180 of the "Municipal Act" and also all holders of licenses qualified to vote under the "Licensing Bylaw" of the City of Prince Rupert at Civic Elections.

FELLS OF CROWNING

Dr. W. T. Kergin Interesting Speaker With Illustrated Address At Gyro Club

Not the great procession itself or the impressive ceremony in Westminster Abbey but the general atmosphere and the gigantic preparations were the features of the Coronation of King George VI in London which proved most striking to him, said Dr. W. T. Kergin in speaking before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at its regular weekly luncheon yesterday. No where else in the world but in England could such a great show have been staged. Nevertheless, it was astounding to consider that in England, known as it was for democracy and personal liberty, the people should enter with such enthusiasm into such a celebration at that of coronation, emblematic as it was of the monarchy which in so many countries had been discarded.

Dr. Kergin told of the handling of the vast crowds which thronged the streets like "sardines in a box." It was all most impressive.

The speaker told how he and his party had viewed the great procession from Constitution Hill. It had been necessary for them to be in their seats at 7 a.m. although the parade did not pass until 3 p.m.

The ovation which the crowds gave the Dowager Queen Mary was a wonderful thing, said Dr. Kergin. It was not excelled by the tribute of loyalty and affection that was accorded the new king.

As for the Duke of Windsor, Dr. Kergin said that the general attitude of the British people appeared to be that it was the best thing that Edward should have dropped out.

Dr. Kergin's remarks were preliminary to a very interesting display of moving picture scenes of the Coronation, some of which were actually taken by the doctor himself.

Dr. H. N. Brocklesby, president of the club, was in the chair. Luncheon guests were Ernest Meadows and George Dibb.

President Brocklesby announced that next week's luncheon would be addressed by Mr. Justice A. M. Manson and that members of the Women's Canadian Club and their husbands would be guests. The luncheon of the week following will be cancelled and, instead, there will be a dinner dance and theatre party on the evening of October 8.

W. F. Stone was appointed to represent the Gyro Club at a Boy Scout's organization meeting to be held Thursday night. Jack Bulger will represent the club at the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Bowling League Sunday night, the expectation being that the club will again be represented in the League this winter.

All day yesterday the Prince Rupert Presbytery of the United Church of Canada was in session in the Church parlors dealing with routine matters connected with the church. The sessions commenced at ten o'clock and adjourned about an hour before midnight. Rev. Peter Kelly of the mission boat Thomas Crosby presided and others present included Rev. Dr. S. S. Osterhout, superintendent of missions from Vancouver, Rev. J. C. Jackson, and Rev. C. D. Clarke of Prince Rupert, Rev. D. W. More, of Hazelton, secretary, Rev. W. Selder of Skidegate, Rev. W. C. Colwell of Port Simpson, and Rev. G. H. Raley D. D., a visiting member. In addition to this there were a number of lay delegates including Mrs. G. V. Wilkinson of Prince Rupert, Mrs. Peter Kelly of Ocean Falls and Peter Wells of Port Simpson. Guests at the sessions were Mrs. N. Moses of Skidegate and Dr. H. H. Colwell of the mission boat Thomas Crosby.

The delegates yesterday afternoon were entertained at tea by Rev. and Mrs. J. C. Jackson at the Parsonage.

Encouragement was given by the Presbytery to native congregations to be represented at future sessions. They are fully entitled to participate.

The celebration will consist of a unique and elaborate pageant showing conditions as they were at Kitimat before the advent of the mission and ending by a huge banquet on Monday showing contrasting conditions.
