# They Fighting In Chinese War

## Insurance Rates On Vessels Into Hudson Bay Cut

LONDON, Aug. 9.—A reduction from seventeen shillings six pence to fifteen shilling in insurance rates on vessels using gyro compasses in navigating to Hudson Bay ports is announced.

## Planes Cross Ocean Again

Flying Boats Cambria and Pan American Clipper III Homebound In Opposite Directions

BOTWOOD, Newfoundland, Aug. 9. (Canadian Press)—The Imperial Airways flying boat Cambria arrived here Saturday night from its base at Boucherville, twelve miles down the St. Lawrence River from Montreal, in the course of a return flight across the Atlantic Ocean and hopped off last night for Poynes, Irish Free State, where she arrived today, twelve hours and two minutes later.

Meantime the Pan American Airways Pan American Clipper III reached its intermediate base at Shadac, New Brunswick, enroute home to Port Washington, New York, in the course of its fourth Atlantic crossing.

## Italian Workers Get Concessions

Hundreds of Millions More Lire Will Go To Laborers

ROME, Aug. 9.—Several million industrial workers are given large concessions in a contract signed by the Confederation of Industrialists and the Confederation of Industrial Workers. Minister of Incorporations Ferruccio Lantini took part in the negotiations toward the pact which will add hundreds of millions of lire to laborers.

## Uncle Sam's Army Holds Manoeuvres

Twenty-Seven Thousand Men From Sixteen States Mobilized

SAN FERNANDO, Cal., Aug. 9.—The Fourth Army, 27,000 strong and representing sixteen western states, was mobilized in full here Saturday as the United States Army annual manoeuvres got under way. From the Midwest fifteen thousand men had arrived in this territory to join with twelve thousand from the Pacific Coast.

## President Is At Hyde Park

United States Chief Executive Spending Two or Three Days There

HYDE PARK, Aug. 9.—President Roosevelt arrived here by special train from Washington Saturday and motored to his nearby estate overlooking the Hudson River. He had arranged a trip around his 560 acre forest land later in the day, the first of two or three he will spend here.

## DRAGGING FOR BODY

Butedale Police Officer Directing Efforts to Recover Remains of Alf Wikdal

## Late Telegraphs

**DENIAL BY INSURGENTS**  
LONDON, Aug. 9.—An official statement by Spanish insurgent authorities yesterday denied that airplanes which attacked British and Italian steamers last week were units of General Francisco Franco's air fleet. Co-incidentally the Spanish government issued a statement claiming that the alleged torpedo attacks on the German cruiser Leipzig in June, which resulted in the withdrawal of Italy and Germany from the non-intervention naval patrol of Spanish waters, were a "fake" designed to alienate sympathy from the loyalist government cause.

**SINKS IN CHANNEL**  
DUNKIRK.—Following a collision with another vessel, the Belgian ferry steamer Princess Mary Jose sank outside of Dunkirk yesterday. Six hundred passengers who were aboard the Princess Mary Jose were landed safely here.

**DEMONSTRATORS FREED**  
BERLIN.—One hundred and ten demonstrators who were protesting at the government ban on public prayer meetings and imprisonment of ministers for opposing Nazi church restrictions were arrested by police yesterday and later released. They had marched through the streets of suburban Dahlem.

## Drought Relief Plans Proceed

Good Progress Being Made With Government Measures, Minister of Agriculture States

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—Good progress is being made with various drought rehabilitation measures which are being instituted by the federal government to relieve the situation in southern Saskatchewan and other areas on the prairies, it is announced by Hon. J. G. Gardiner, minister of agriculture.

CALLANDER, Ontario, Aug. 9.—After having been isolated for five days on account of a slight sore throat disorder, Emilie Dionne was able to rejoin her famous quintuplet sisters at the week-end. If anyone seemed more pleased at the reunion than Emilie, it was Annette, Yvonne, Cecile and Marie. Dr. Allan Roy Dafee stated today that the other four quintuplets had developed slight colds which will keep them from daily public appearances.

## New York Stock Market Rallies

Steels, Mines and Specialties Led Upward Parade

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—The stock market jogged into a rally Saturday behind steels, mines and specialties. Gains of fractions to two or more points were widely distributed at the close. Bar silver was unchanged at 44 1/2¢.

## Mexican Mayor Is Imprisoned

Sixty Armed Men Seize Civic Control in Town of Tejada

VERA CRUZ, Mexico, Aug. 9.—Sixty armed men are reported to have captured the municipal building of Villa Tejada and to have imprisoned Mayor Arturo Cofolene. A new municipal council was appointed by the raiders according to dispatches from the town. Federal troops were sent to deliver the Mayor and restore order.

## Record For Long Service



PREMIER W. L. MACKENZIE KING  
OTTAWA, August 9.—Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King is receiving congratulations on rounding out eighteen years as leader of the Canadian Liberal party. This is a record for the British Empire. Mr. King is also the only minister in the Empire still in office who was a minister of the crown during the reign of King Edward VII. Mr. King is sixty-three years of age.

## DEAD OF GUNSHOT

Provincial Police Advised Of Tragedy Befalling Peter Wickstrom at Alice Arm

District headquarters of the provincial police are advised of the death at Alice Arm of Peter Wickstrom from gunshot wounds, supposedly self-inflicted. Constable Quigley is at Alice Arm from Anyox to investigate. Wickstrom was an elderly man and was employed as a blacksmith during construction of the Dolly Varden Railway. He was a Scandinavian.

## COMPANY REMOVAL

John B. Stetson Co. Quits At Brockville, Ontario, Owing to Failure Of Strike Settlement

BROCKVILLE, Ont., August 9. (Canadian Press)—Manufacturing operations of the John B. Stetson Co. (Canada) Ltd. have been removed because of failure to settle a strike which held up production for six months, the management said in a formal statement.

## Jewish State In Holy Land Meets Favor Of Women

ZURICH, Switzerland, Aug. 9.—Revolt of American women Zionists against dismemberment of Palestine was threatened following the decision of the centre group of the Zionist World Congress, of which the American delegation is a part, to subscribe to the principle of a restricted Jewish State in the Holy Land.

## Russo-American Trade Agreement

New Pact Has Been Negotiated, President Roosevelt Announces

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 9.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt announced at the week-end that a new trade agreement between Soviet Russia and the United States had been reached.

## Plymouth Auto Strike Is Ended

Plant Resumes Operations Today Following Agreement With C. I. O.

DETROIT, Aug. 9.—An agreement having been reached with representatives of the Committee on Industrial Organization, the Plymouth Automobile Co. plant resumed operations today. The United Automobile Workers' Union Sunday ratified a truce between the union and the Chrysler Corporation paving the way for reopening of the Chrysler plant.

## Italo British Parley Planned

Get-Together to Be Held in Rome Within a Couple of Months, It is Announced

LONDON, Aug. 9.—A meeting of British and Italian diplomats in Rome within the next couple of months is planned, it is announced. During the next few weeks experts will be engaged in the tabulation of material for the conference.

## Chinese Reported To Be Getting Best Of Conflict With Japs

Flight From Hankow Continues and Tokyo Cancels All Commercial Activity in Middle and Upper Yangtze Valley

TIENTSIN, Aug. 9.—Heavy fighting between Japanese and Chinese troops started today along the Tientsin-Pukow Railway ten miles south of here. The Chinese are reported advancing. Rumors spread that Chinese planes are planning to bomb Japanese concessions in this city and huge markers have been constructed to prevent them from dropping explosives into the British concession.

## STRANDS ON WEST COAST

Freighter Nereus, Inbound from Kobe to Port Alberni, In Trouble Near Bamfield

BAMFIELD, Vancouver Island, August 9. (Canadian Press)—Twenty-eight members of the crew, having been removed in lifeboats, were safely ashore here last night while the captain and five others were still remaining on board the Greek freighter Nereus which stranded at 6:20 yesterday morning in a dense fog on rocks and reefs near Cape Beale light, six miles from here. The United States coastguard cutter Red Wing was standing by the Nereus and salvage vessels were racing to the 6994-ton vessel's assistance. It is expected it will be possible to salvage the vessel. A preliminary survey showed the vessel to be resting on the rocks for her entire length with all holds and the boiler and engine room flooded. The Nereus was inbound from Kobe, Japan, to Port Alberni to load lumber when the stranding occurred. She was about to pick up her pilot when she went ashore.

## Ferry Rate For Cars At Frisco Is Cut In Half

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 9.—That the State Railroad Commission contemplates reducing the automobile rate on the San Francisco Bay ferries from fifty cents to twenty-five cents per trip was confirmed here today by Earl Lee Kelly, State Director of Public Works. Kelly said a member of the Commission informed him of the fact.

## Hot and Dry Weather Has Hit England

LONDON, Aug. 9.—England had its hottest weather in four years at the end of the week when the thermometer reaching eighty-seven degrees above in the shade. There has been no rain for over two weeks.

## Substitute For Judiciary Bill

Teeth Are Taken From Measure Which Would Have Reformed United States Courts

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 9.—The "Peace Party" that ended a five months' battle over President Roosevelt's Supreme Court Bill was called up in the Senate Saturday while administration leaders strove to end revolts which threatened to prolong the congressional session indefinitely. The Peace Party constituted a substitute bill, which left the Supreme Court untouched and authorized only procedural reforms in the lesser federal judiciary.

### SOVIET DIPLOMACY

In prospect of the country being involved with Japan or Germany, the government of Soviet Russia has surrounded itself with a band of small neutral nations pledged to non-aggression against Russia except China and Japan. Of these China is friendly to the Soviet and Japan is the only nation to be feared with no neutral territory dividing them.

Only last month Russia signed a pact with Iran, Turkey and Afghanistan providing for a permanent council to discuss international conflicts which concern both sides.

For some years Russia has been building up this non-aggression ring, at first with a view to forming a neutral zone between them and Germany but later extending it so as to almost encircle the country with the exception of the two nations mentioned. While this is a protection to the smaller nations, it is also a great benefit to Russia because, in case Japan should attack, there would be a zone between Germany and Russian which would have to be crossed.

The plan for the non-aggression pact was laid in Geneva two years ago under the league of Nations auspices and has just recently come to fruition so far as the southern group of states is concerned.

This pact also will tend to prevent troubles among the lesser states which have been almost continually at war with each other in the past. Now there is a degree of security which has not hitherto been attained. It is difficult for rebellions in either of the small countries to come to fruition without being encouraged by one of the neighboring states and this is something that cannot happen if the terms of the pact are carried out.

### ABERHART'S MINISTERS

It seems little or nothing to Premier Aberhart of Alberta to dismiss a member of his cabinet. Half of the members have been changed since the evangelist and teacher was first called upon to form a cabinet.

### BENNETT AS LEADER

Everyone is glad to hear that Hon. R. B. Bennett is to stay on in public life although even if he should be successful at the polls two years hence, he would then be only commencing the work for which he is there. He would be expected to remain and carry out his policies. If his health is not good now, six years of hard work is a good deal to expect from a man.

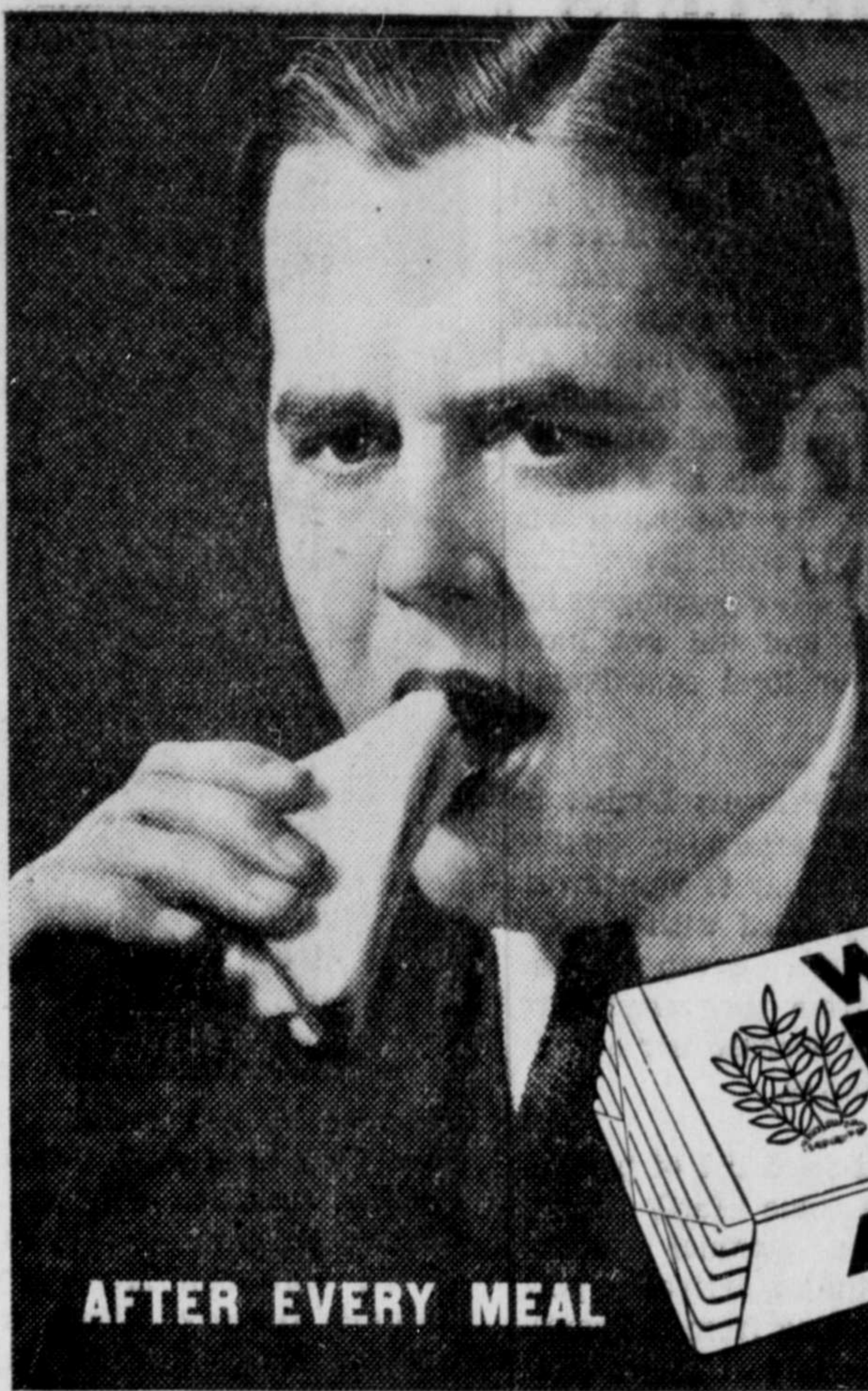

# SCALING OF TIMBER UP

### Present Year Shows Healthy Increase Over Last With Nearly Ten Million Feet More

Timber scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district for the present year to date shows a healthy increase over 1936. So far in 1937 the scale aggregates 64,325,295 board feet in comparison with 55,671,597 board feet during the first seven months of 1936. The scale for July this year, aggregating 25,387,790 board feet, compared with 19,262,274 board feet a year ago.

# Present Year Is Drier And Duller

### Compilation of Official Weather Figures Shows Less Precipitation and Also Less Sun

Rainfall and also sunshine continue less in Prince Rupert this year than in 1936, according to compilation of official figures. So far this year precipitation here has aggregated 35.66 inches as compared with 43.3 inches in the corresponding period of last year. The sunshine for the present year has reached a total of 638.2 hours in comparison with 741.6 hours during the first seven months of 1936. July 1937 was sunnier than the same month last year with a total of 119 hours as against 99 hours. This July was also drier than last year with 4.25 inches of rain as compared with 5.8 inches.
