

# Japs Stopped

SHANGHAI, Oct. 1: (CP)-Two hundred thousand more Chinese communists have been ordered to the North China front to stem the relentless advance of the Japanese army as Chinese outside Shanghai continue to nold their positions and show no signs of weakening. The Japanese meanwhile puch vigorously on with their campaign.

Japanese are reported to be considering sending a further warning to foreign powers to evacuate Nanking completely or face danger of even more determined air raids.

On the northern fringes of Shanghai the struggle for the Chinese Chapei section went into its fourth day with the Chinese defenders holding their lines. When war broke out in 1914 between Germany and the allies, Italy was bound by treaty to Germany and there was some doubt as to what would happen. It became clear that Italian sympathies were on the side opposed to Germany and she took part very soon.

Many changes have taken place since that time and now we find Italy and Germany the closest of friends or at any rate their dictators are and the rest of the people follow the lead of the dictators. They dare not do anything else.

Should Germany or Italy again return to the demo-cratic fold, there may be changes in foreign policy, each Old Country Soccer side taking its cue from its leaders.

Once the Spanish trouble is settled it will be easier for the nations to get together unless some other complication should set in such as the entry of Russia into the Chinese war. Already Russia is said to be taking part but not offically just as Italy and Germany and Russia are not officially taking part in the war in Spain. Just now it is difficult to know when a nation is at war.

## HUMAN LIFE

Under modern conditions human life seems of little importance. It was always so only in a different way. Away back in the earlier ages the slaves or common workers were looked upon as of only such value as they would bring in the open market. If they were killed, the loss was a property loss.

Today the people of the world view human life differently. In that we have made progress. There are still great famines such as those of recent years in China and Russia in which many thousands have perished when they might have been saved if the resources of the country had been used to save them. On the whole today the loss of human lives is looked on as a tragedy and not as a property loss. There is a much greater fellow feeling today than ever was the case in the past. Let a person of any prominence be lost or abducted or charged with crime and the whole world becomes interested. It is the interest of a human being for another of its own kind. That is why the world views with horror the slaughter of non-combatants in China.




