

Invaders Lose No Time in Starting Offensive Following Chinese Defiance of Ultimatum to Surrender

SHANGHAI, Dec. 10:-The Chinese defenders having defied the ultimatum to surrender, the Japanese invaders commenced their offensive upon Nanking, the evacuated Nationalist capital, today, raining bombardment from the air and from land artillery. Soon the Jap- the case for Japan and against. life. anese claimed that the walls had been penetrated at two

points, that they had entered the city where fighting in the streets had commenced. Predicting that he city would be captured within twenty-four hours, the Japanese gave final warning that the taking of Nanking would not mean the end of the campaign against China. The Chinese, on the other hand, declared that Nanking was ready o withstand a long siege.

Enter Through Walls

The Japanese command anounced today that Kuanchuamen, e principal southeastern gate in anking's massive walls, had been aptured by a detachment of Japan's Ninth Division. The Nipponese infantry surged through breaches in the defenses and occupied adjoining sections of the walls.
