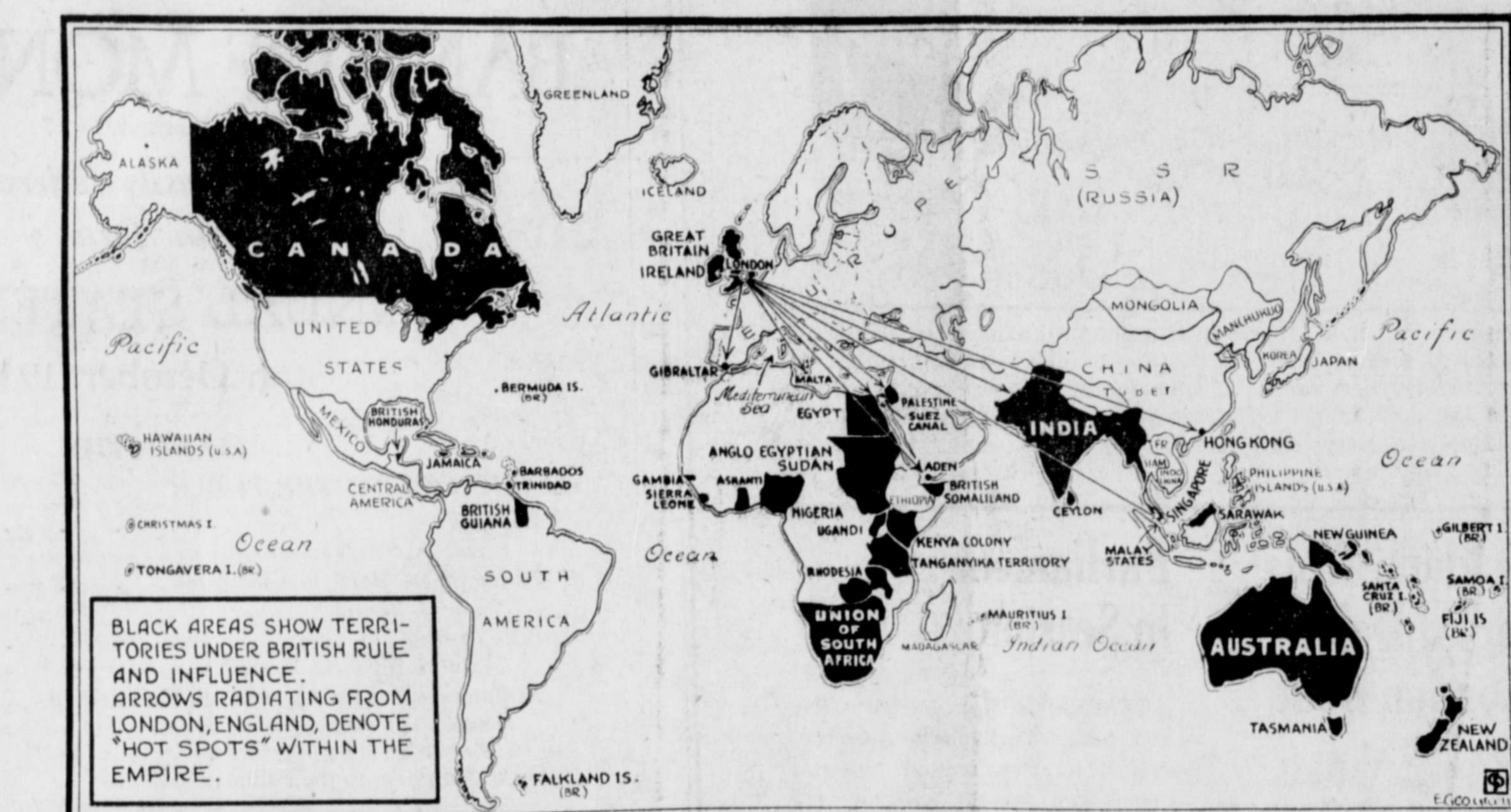

Britain and France to Sound Out Czecho-Slovakia and Austria on Minority Question

LONDON, Dec. 1: (CP)—Czecho-Slovakia and Austria will be sounded out by Great Britain and France, informed sources said today, on their attitude toward making concessions to Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany on problems of German minorities within their borders.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 1—Cheap railway fares will again be available over the Christmas and New Year holidays, according to an announcement by J. B. Parker, secretary, Canadian Passenger Association.

ENGLAND WINS

LONDON—Fielding practically the same team that defeated Wales two to one two weeks ago, England scored a 5 to 4 victory over Czecho-Slovakia in an international football game today.

HATFIELD APPEAL DISMISSED

TORONTO—Appeal of Captain Freeman Hatfield against a conviction of fraud in connection with reparations paid for the loss of the schooner Gypsum Queen in the Irish Sea during the Great War was dismissed in the Ontario Appeal Court today.

TO SUBMIT DRAFT

OTTAWA—Draft of the proposed amendment to the British North America Act empowering the Dominion to enact and administer an unemployment insurance system will be submitted to all provinces once they agree to the principle, Premier King told Premier Duplessis of Quebec in a letter made public last night. Duplessis is one of the three Premiers withholding assent to the principle pending further particulars.

FISHERMAN DIES Judah Osborne, 56, local fisherman, died this morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

BUILDING PERMITS Building permits issued in Prince Rupert during the month of November totalled \$18,420 in value. Chief item was \$15,000 for the wharf and buildings of the Standard Oil Co. of British Columbia being erected on the local waterfront. There was \$1500 for the Armor Salvage Co.'s new gravel bunkers and \$1000 for a new machine shop for George Rogers and Con Michaloff on First Avenue.

CUSTOMS REVENUE Customs and excise revenue for the month of November totalled \$14,063.81 at the port of Prince Rupert as compared with \$6,956.25 in the same month last year.

NOVEMBER WEATHER There were 4.4 inches of rain and 44 hours of sunshine in Prince Rupert during the month of November. The highest temperature for the month was 58 on November 1 and the lowest 28 on November 14. The mean temperature was 42.7. Highest barometer reading was 30.27 on November 28 and 28.75 on November 24.

#### THE VOICE OF VICTORIA

Victoria has spoken and the decree of British Columbia's capital city is that it likes the proposed policy of friendliness with the United States and that it will not listen to the voice of Hon. R. B. Bennett which in effect was "no truck or trade with the Yankees." In order to show how they felt about it they had to desert their traditionally Conservative policy and vote for a new man who is going to Ottawa to support the Mackenzie King policies.

Mr. Bennett set the election issue. Before a large meeting, with loud voice and emphatic gestures, he urged the electors to vote for McKelvie as a protest against trade alliances with the United States.

The campaign was a strenuous one with a number of prominent speakers taking part on either side. The most outstanding of these was former Premier Bennett but, on the other side, Defense Minister Ian McKenzie led the government forces and stressed the policy of improving Canadian defenses on this coast. Evidently that policy also was acceptable to the electors who helped to pile up the splendid plurality of close to eighteen hundred.

Any idea that the Mackenzie King government is weakening in the west was set at rest in the Victoria election.

#### WILL ACT IN UNISON

A satisfactory announcement was made yesterday in London to the effect that France and Great Britain would act in unison with other powers to protect their treaty rights in the East—rights which have been threatened by Japan since the taking of Shanghai. Another interesting statement was that, before Germany's demand for colonies could be considered, Chancellor Hitler must cease "rattling the sabre." It seems to have been a most satisfactory discussion of world affairs that took place between Premier Chautemps of France and Prime Minister Chamberlain of Great Britain in London.

#### TALKING OVER PROBLEMS

The policy initiated by Great Britain of trying to talk over mutual problems with affected powers seems to be an excellent one. Many differences would disappear if we could oftener get together and talk things over in a reasonable way. The spectacular method of making daring speeches to large multitudes of their own people is for the purpose of inspiring those people with confidence and has a political significance. The policy of Britain in this case should be one that will appeal to Canadians.

#### ELECTION THURSDAY

Another important by election is to take place tomorrow in Alberta when, in Lethbridge riding, there will be a test of the strength of the Aberhart Government. There are but two candidates, one a Social Credit supporter and the other one who is opposed to Social Credit. The result will be an indication whether the government is holding its own in that province or whether it is losing ground. We should hear the result late tomorrow night.

### NEWS OF THE MINES

#### Bert McDonald, who is in charge of operations on hydraulic placer leases on Manson Creek for a strong Vancouver syndicate, has closed down the work for the season. The ground has been closely drilled and tested with shafts and drifting. Mr. McDonald took in a steam shovel to the ground but, owing to shortage of water, was not able to get it into production. To obviate any possible recurrence of water shortage, Mr. McDonald has been using the steam shovel to dig seven miles of ditch and flume and, on completion of this work early next season, he will be in a position to feed two six-inch monitors to work the hydraulic pit. The property has been fully equipped with camps, sawmill and all machinery necessary to go into production as soon as water is available next season. The operation, judging from preliminary indications, should be exceedingly profitable when production of placer gold gets under way.

Nat Porter, who has been working on placer leases in the Manson Creek country being developed by his father for southern interests, has arrived in Prince George from the camp.

According to the latest word from the former smelter town, the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. now has about sixty men employed at Anyox. They are to a large extent employed in exploratory work on the extensive copper holdings there. It is understood that the activities of the crew now there presage a re-opening at Anyox on

There were nearly a thousand visitors from Ketchikan at New Metlakatla on Sunday to attend the proceedings of that day.

One of the honored guests for the anniversary celebration at New Metlakatla was William Leask of Old Metlakatla. Mr. Leask went north with Father Duncan's originals but later returned to the village of his birth where he is now postmaster.

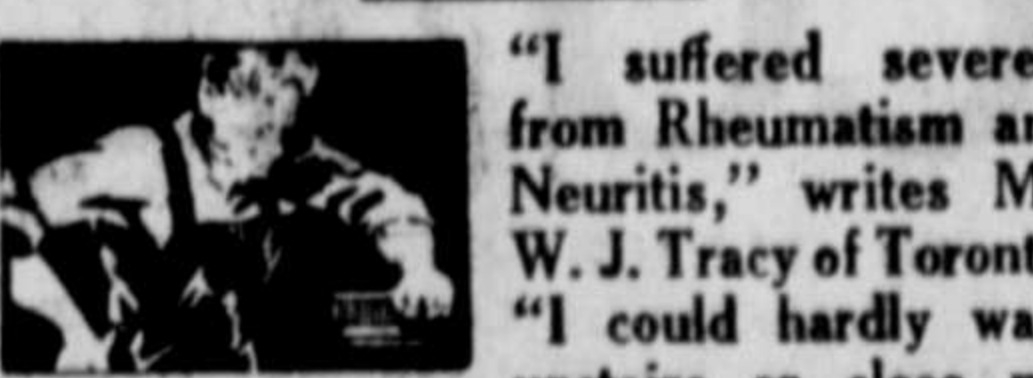

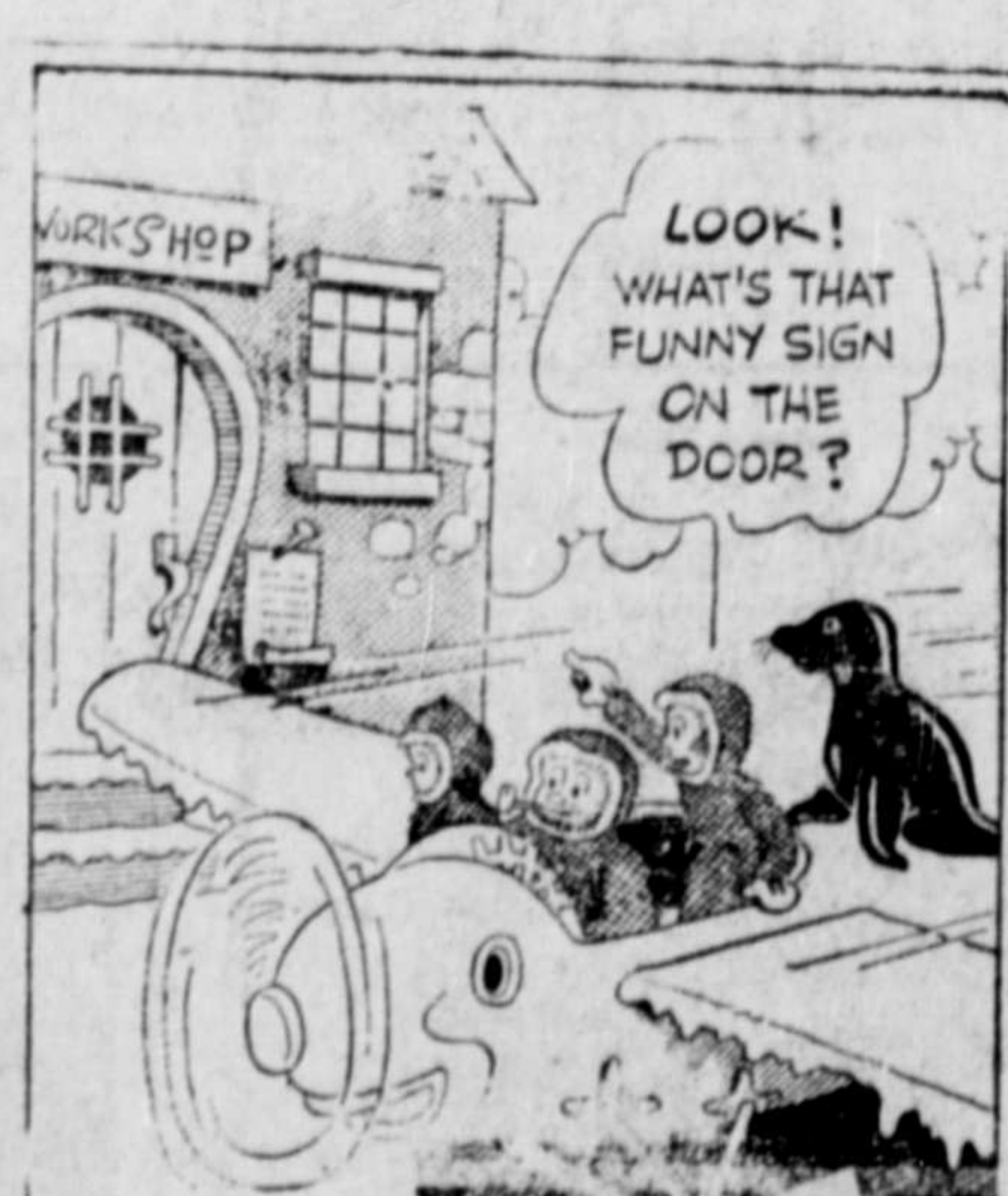
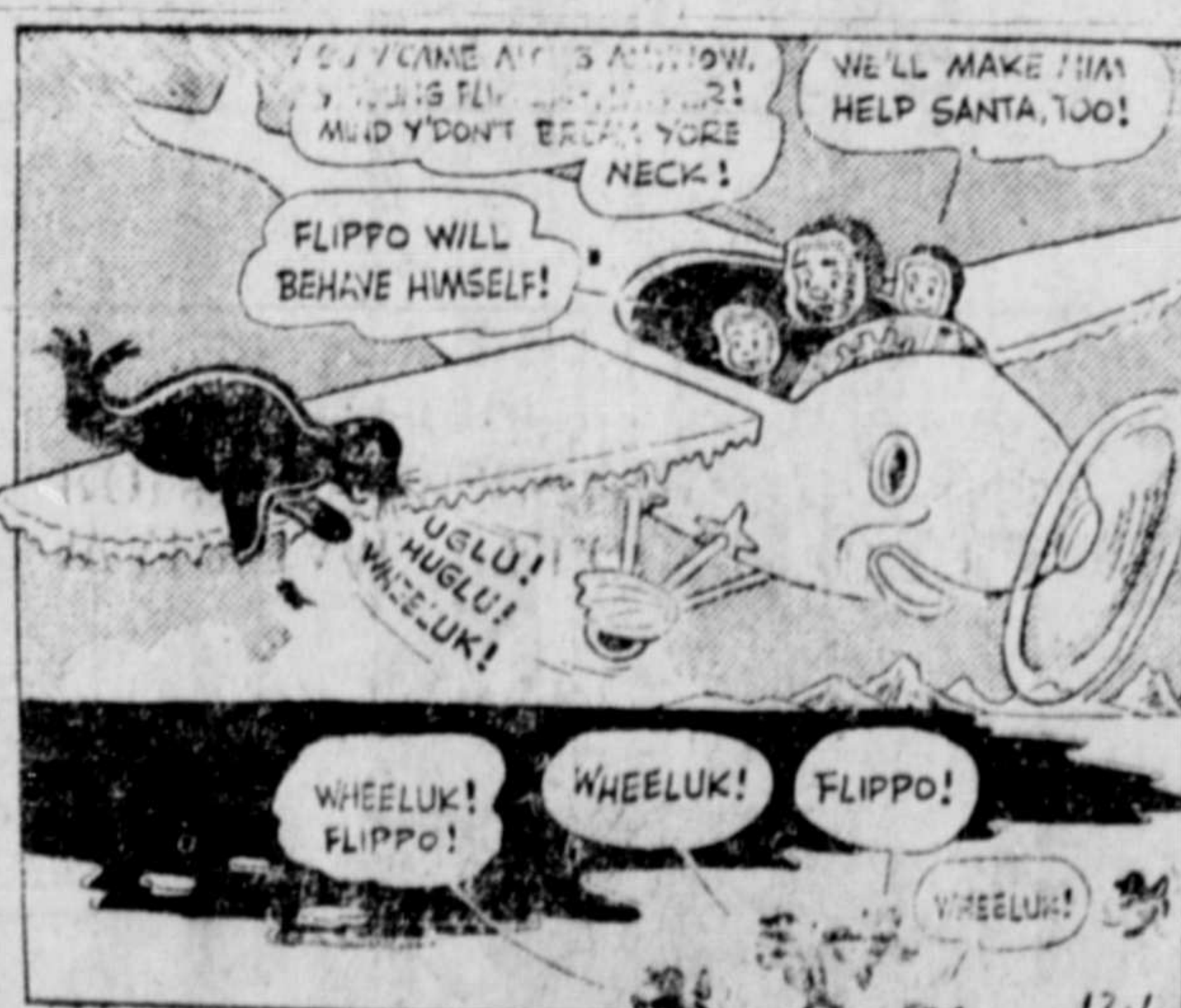
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
