Chinese Defences Crack Rapidly

Capital Is Moved To Chungkiang And Last Effort To Be Made To Preserve Now Dwindling Morale

Fate of Entire Nation Appears to be Now Hanging in Balance—Expected, However, That Determined Resistance to Invasion Will Continue

SHANGHAI, Nov. 20: (CP)—Cracking the southern pivot of the Chinese "Hindenburg Line," defending Nan- king, Japanese troops today struck shattering blows along then central and northern fronts. The Japanese drove the last Chinese from Kashing and central Japanese columns captured Soochow, pivotal strong point of the line west of Shanghai, after bombardment of both ends of the line. Northern detachments threatened to make untenable Chinese positions at Chang-shu.

DIES AT PREMIER

Hilarus (better known here as "John") Nelson, aged 52, resident of Prince Rupert since the early days, passed away last night in Premier Hospital from heart trouble. He had been at Premier for some years. He is survived by a widow living here who has herself been ill for some time. There is also a sister in Juneau and a brother in the United States. The funeral will take place at Premier.

FRANCO ACCEPTS PLAN

LONDON—General Francisco Franco, insurgent commander in chief in Spain, has accepted in principle the plan for the dispatch of a commission of inquiry to both Spanish civil war parties with a view to preparing for the withdrawal of volunteers, a Reuter News Agency dispatch from San Sebastian reported.

BOY WHEAT KING

TORONTO—James Sebastian, seventeen-year old member of a well known prize wheat growing family of Wembley, Alberta, won the title of Wheat King of the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto yesterday with an exhibit of hard red spring wheat, William Rogers of Tappen in the Kamloops district, showing Durum species, was declared the winner of unregistered varieties.

SITUATION IS GRAVE

PARIS—A situation of "terrible gravity" has been discovered as a result of the investigation into activities of the organization known as "The Hooded Ones" and other revolutionary groups. It was admitted last night by Premier Camille Chautemps. Hidden stores of arms, munitions and all manner of heavy fighting equipment have been uncovered upon which it is evident millions of francs have been spent. Evidently a revolution of a national scale was planned.

MADE RECORD

CROYDON—Flying Officer A. v. Clouston and Mrs. Betty Kirby-Green broke the London to Capetown and return air record today, lowering the mark of Mrs. Amy Johnson Mollison by three days and sixteen hours. Their total elapsed time on the round trip flight was four days, six hours and 27 minutes. They landed here today after having reached Cairo yesterday, 38 hours out of Capetown.

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Hospital Has Busiest Month

Last October was the busiest month in the history of the Prince Rupert General Hospital, it was reported at last night's board meeting by the lady superintendent, Miss Jean Harrison, and the finance committee. There had been a total of 2065 hospital days, it being the first time that hospital days in a month had ever gone above 200. This month there had been a slackening off. The report of the finance committee showed disbursements for the month of \$5091.70, the cost per hospital day being \$2.46.

MAY CALL OUT GUARD

Sitdown Strike Continues in Good-year Plant at Akron—Fisher Bodies Also Tied Up

COLUMBUS, Nov. 20: (CP)—Adjutant General Emil Marx said today that some Ohio National Guard companies had been ordered to prepare for possible mobilization but no units had yet been sent to Akron where a sit-down strike is in progress at the plants of the Good-year Tire & Rubber Co. Any mobilization order would have to come from Governor Martin Davey.

Viscount Halifax Spent Five Hours With Der Fuehrer

BERLIN, Nov. 20: (CP)—Viscount Halifax, the British Lord President of the Council, was welcomed by Chancellor Hitler at the doorstep of the latter's Bavarian mountain home yesterday. Hitler showed Halifax his art treasures and they viewed the beauty of the landscape. There was five hours' visit including luncheon after which Viscount Halifax departed for Munich whence he returned to Berlin last night enroute back to London to present his report on the conversations which were described here as being unofficial.

VICEROY CHANGED

ROME, Nov. 20: (CP)—Premier Benito Mussolini today announced a shake-up in his cabinet and the colonial administration in which the Duke of Aosta is named viceroy to Ethiopia succeeding Marshal Rudolf Graziani with Il Duce himself assuming the African portfolio. Mussolini announced that important changes would be made toward consolidation in the administrative affairs of Ethiopia.

It has hopes of being in a position to call for tenders by the end of the year.

## HOSPITAL MEETING

Board in Session Last Night—New Reports Received

Apart from discussion of the new hospital building project and the presentation by the managing secretary, H. W. Birch of his report on the recent annual convention of the British Columbia Hospitals Association in Victoria which he attended as a delegate, business at the regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital was largely of a routine nature last night.

W. M. Brown occupied the chair in the absence of the president, G. P. Tinker, and the vice-president, F. S. Walton. Others present were F. A. MacCallum, G. V. Wilkinson, Dr. J. H. Carson and Mrs. H. L. Landry, directors; H. W. Birch, managing secretary, and Miss Jean Harrison R. N., lady superintendent. Mrs. Landry is the representative on the board of the newly organized Women's Auxiliary. Her credentials were presented in a communication from the Auxiliary and she was welcomed to the meeting by the chairman, Mrs. Landry informed the board that it was the intention of the Auxiliary for the present to work for comforts for public ward patients.

The monthly report of the fire chief declared the fire alarm systems in good shape and the furnace rooms free of inflammables.

A communication from Valentin Dairy enclosed a report of Dr. R. H. Bedford on bacteriological tests of the milk supplied the hospital. The quality of the milk from this standpoint was found to be well within the requirements.

The report of the house committee, presented by G. V. Wilkinson, stated that new storm windows had been placed on the Nurses' Home. A bad leak had developed in the dormer roof on the front end of the hospital and had had to be repaired. Installation had been made of a new iron coil in the furnace and other repairs had been carried out about the building.

## MEDAL WAS PRESENTED

Festivities at Kitkatla as Chief Edward Gamble Shakes is Honored

KITKATLA, Nov. 20.—On Tuesday an interesting event took place at the village of Kitkatla when Chief Edward Gamble Shakes of the Kitkatla people was invested with the King's Coronation Medal. A special trip was made by Indian Agent W. E. Collison on the department launch Naskeena for the occasion. He was accompanied by Right Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia, and Constable Arthur Handford of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

A sumptuous banquet had been prepared by Chief Gamble in the village hall to which the entire village was invited. During the meal the silver band, under the leadership of Henry Brown, played musical selections suitable for the occasion.

At the conclusion of the feast the Indian Agent read in English and Tsimsean the King's Message and a letter of congratulations and good wishes from Dr. Harold N. McGill, Director of Indian Affairs Ottawa, after which the King's Medal was presented. This was followed by the playing of "God Save the King" by the band.

Chief Gamble expressed both in Tsimsean and English his appreciation of the honor he had received.

Bishop Rix spoke of the Coronation of the King and its meaning expressing the hope that the chief would long be spared to enjoy the honor conferred on him.

Speeches were also made by Rev. G. Goodred; John Nelson and William Lewis, after which the happy affair was brought to a close by the singing of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow" and the National Anthem.

Chief Gamble's grandfather, Chief Shakes of Kitkatla, many years ago was the recipient of an autographed photograph from her late Majesty Queen Victoria and the present chief, who had presented a chief's dancing robe to the late King George, also received an autographed photograph of His Late Majesty. These royal mementoes are the prized possessions of the Kitkatla people who, although living in a somewhat isolated village form one of the loyal communities of the Empire.

## Synopsis of Land Act

PRE-EMPTIONS

VACANT, unoccupied, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 21 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement.

Full information concerning pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which may be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 1,000 feet per acre east of the Coast Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be completed for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emption carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted.

PURCHASE OF LEASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unoccupied Crown lands not used for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre and second-class (pasture) land is \$3 per acre. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 19, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

As a partial relief measure, surveyed lands may be acquired by purchase in less equal instalments, with the first payment surrendered for two years, provided the balance is paid when due and improvements are made during the first two years of not less than 1% of the appraised value.

Mill, factory or industrial site on timber land, not exceeding 50 acres, may be purchased or leased, the additional conditions and terms of purchase or lease being set out in the conditions of sale.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 50 acres, may be leased as homestead, conditional upon a dwelling being erected on the first year, title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 500 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

Under the grazing and industrial provisions the areas are divided into grazing divisions and the range administered under grazing regulations issued from time to time by the Minister of Lands. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in grazing privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits available to sportsmen and travellers, up to the limit.

# Waterfront Whiffs

Harvest of Herring in Prince Rupert Harbor Continues—Fine Big Seine-boat Here—Watch Officers Changed

Three seineboats have been busily engaged since the middle of the week scooping herring out of Prince Rupert Harbor. The harvest of this variety has commenced considerably earlier than usual this winter. The fish are being taken by the reduction plant at Tucks Inlet in Prince Rupert Harbor and by the B.C. Packers new reduction

Plant at Port Edward. Later the cold storage plants will be putting up their bait requirements. The Bacon Fisheries at Prince Rupert is kipping. The three seinboats are the Western Monarch, Capt. Charles Clark, of Vancouver, Number Nine, Capt. Martin Skog, and Zenadi, Capt. R. Gammon, while the Western Star (formerly Chief Zibassa), Chief Skugald, Billmor and C.N. are engaged in connection with packing. The Western Monarch is one of the largest seinboats which has ever operated around Prince Rupert. She is a brand new vessel, having been built at Vancouver during the past year for Capt. Clark. Seventy-two feet long, equipped with 160 h.p. Washington diesel engine and carrying a crew of eight men, she arrived in Prince Rupert November 17 from the West Coast of Vancouver Island where she had been high boat in the pilchard fisheries during the past summer.

J. W. Bryant, who has been standing by the steamer Prince Rupert at the local dry dock as watch officer while the vessel is tied up for the winter, sailed Thursday night on the Prince George for Vancouver. W. E. Eccles arrived Wednesday from Vancouver to relieve him.

Northland Transportation Co.'s motorship liner Northland, Capt. Len Williams, arrived in port at 8 o'clock this morning from Ketchikan and, after discharging five carloads of frozen fish for transshipment East over Canadian Na-

tional Railways, sailed at 11 a.m. for Seattle.

Pilot Bob Ellis arrived here at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon from Ketchikan with three passengers—F. J. Bartholomew, G. M. Margash and J. Grado—Who proceeded to Vancouver aboard the steamer Princess Adelaide last night. Pilot Ellis hopped off this morning on his return to Ketchikan.

# RULES OF HOSPITALS

Code Being Overhauled—Local Board Gets Synopsis of New Regulations—More Help Needed

The local hospital board, at its meeting last night, heard read a synopsis of new regulations governing which it is proposed to put into effect by legislation. The regulations have already been approved by the British Columbia Hospitals Association. Relations of hospitals and doctors are re-defined including requirements imposed upon doctors who practice in hospitals. It was pointed out that the hospital board had the right to discipline doctors.

Dr. J. H. Carson said that the doctors would welcome any plan whereby they were given more voice in the management of hospitals.

The proposed new regulations were referred to a special committee consisting of Dr. Carson, Miss Jean Harrison R. N., lady superintendent, and H. W. Birch, managing secretary, for report at the next meeting.

The board received from the provincial government a copy of a new questionnaire which is required to be filled out giving information in regard to patients. This is part of the general plan of hospital standardization, it was pointed out. It would add considerably to the routine work of the secretary's office where the board felt extra help would be required.

pit which Captain Hudson and his crew occupied and received communion just before they set sail on their voyage of discovery. Among the pictures of streets and places of historical interest in old London was shown the Old Curiosity Shop where the street was undergoing repair. In these same streets, the foundations of which were laid by the Romans, timber from British Columbia's forests was being used in the work of repair. In each link picture the interest was enhanced as the speaker related the story of the association between Canada and the old land.

These pictures were followed by a series of slides in color photography.
