The whole dispute is much involved and, while the sentiment in Canada is undoubtedly in favor of the Spanish government, there is also a strong feeling in favor of the insurgents. Had it not been for the doubt in the popular mind as to whether the loyalists really stood for a democracy as we understand it, the response to the appeal would have been much greater and Canadian newspaper support would have been forthcoming to a much larger degree than is apparent today. The average Canadian will not help a socialist dictatorship any more than he will a fascist dictatorship.
