One-half cup butter, 1 cup sifted | brown sugar, 1 egg. 1 teaspoon vanilla, 11/2 cups pastry flour, 3/4 teaspoon soda, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts.

Cream the butter, add sugar and the well beaten egg. Add the vanilla and the sifted dry ingredients! and nuts. Form into rolls. Wrap in wax paper and chill in the refrigerator. When required, slice in thin slices and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) eight to ten minutes.
