Statesmanship Concerned Principally With Foreign Ministry

BERLIN, July 16: (Canadian Press)—A jurist of established reputation in pre-war days, Dr. Walter Simons was one of the leaders of the republic and was made president pro-tem. for the two months of Germany in the birth-pang years interim in 1925 between the death of President Friederich Ebert and the first inauguration of Field Marshal Paul von Hindenburg.

At the end of the world war he was director of the judicial department of the foreign office and was made German commissioner-general at the Versailles peace conference. He resigned when that pact was drawn up and never ceased denunciation of its terms as oppressive to his country.

His Statesmanship Simons's statesmanship was concerned chiefly with the post of foreign minister which he held in the cabinet of Konstantine Fehrenbach in 1920-21, an interval which saw him resisting demands of the allies at the Spa reparations conference of 1920 and finally accepting under protest the Dawes plan as adopted at the London conference of 1921.

Simons was born September 24, 1861, at Elberfeld, the son of a Westphalian textile manufacturer. He studied history, philosophy and law at the Universities of Strassburg, Leipzig and Bonn and then entered the empire's judicial service. He was made an assistant judge in 1888 and elevated to the bench five years later.

In 1905 he was transferred to Kiel as judge of the provincial supreme court, but a few months later was recalled to Berlin to become advisory commissioner in international law of the ministry of justice. In 1911 he was made justiciary of the foreign office, represented Germany at the exchange law conference at The Hague in 1912 and at the 1914 Christiana conference which recognized Norwegian sovereignty over the archipelago of Spitzbergen. As judicial advisor to Prince Max von Baden, the last Imperial chancellor, he took part in negotiations which led to the peace treaty of Brest-Litovsk. Signed March 3, 1918, this pact definitely took Russia out of the world war.

Nurses Dislike Petticoat Test

Australian Nightingales Have To Go Through It Just The Same

SYDNEY, New South Wales, July 16: (CP)—A nightly "petticoat parade" brought objections from Sydney nurses. Although not part of their uniform, 50 nurses at the Nightingale home must "show petticoats" to a senior staff member each night before going on duty. They were described as "Cumbersome Grindy Things," by one nurse, who added: "I wonder if Florence Nightingale wore one."

Compromise On Spain Accepted

LONDON, July 16: (Canadian Press)—Great Britain's compromise proposal to solve the non-intervention deadlock was unanimously accepted here by the 27-power "Hands Off Spain" committee as a basis for further discussion. The plan would grant limited beligerent rights to both sides of the conflict.

BANQUET OF PILLS

Super-Condensed Food Long Culinary Aim Now on Use on Northern Airline

EDMONTON, July 16: (CP)—Long predicted as the ultimate in culinary science, tiny pills loaded with food values, are now in use as emergency rations on the United Air Transport Lines, running from this city.

Officials have installed a gallon container of the tablets in their north-bound tri-motor, and calmly assert, that in event of forced landing, the supply would be enough to feed a party of 12 for two weeks.

For instance there are "lunch tablets." Twenty-five of these each about the size of a quarter, possess high-powered food value equivalent to a large order of milk and vegetables. Then there is a quart-sized can of "granulated potatoes in powder form" with sufficient caloric value to equalize two bushels of the "live" vegetable.

The full course meal includes a type of "high velocity" spinach which weighs but three pounds, last the hypothetical party of 12 for one week, prevents scurvy and possess an overpowering smell.

For dessert, the marooned passengers could fall back on four vest pocket-sized tins of sacharine, 500 times sweeter than sugar with each minute container equal to 10 pounds of sugar.

Information Being Sought

Minister of Labor Asks Various Governments for Details as to Unemployment

OTTAWA, July 16:—Hon. Norman L. Rogers, federal minister of labor, has requested the provincial governments to supply full information in regard to the present unemployment situation and prospects for the future. This is sought in connection with the making of future grants which have not yet been fixed.

Improvements At Terrace School

C. H. Thomas is Re-elected Trustee for Coming Year

TERRACE, July 16:—Last Saturday the annual school meeting was held. There was a small attendance of less than 20. It was decided to repaint the outside of the building and to instal a new furnace. The buget for the next year's operation of the school called for \$4250—the same as last year. C. H. Thomas was re-elected trustee. Chairman was Rev. Adam Crisp.

TALKS OF ENGLAND

T. H. Johnson Was in London At Time of Abdication and Tells of Reactions

Bringing three flags presented him for his home club at Prince Rupert, T. H. Johnson, formerly of this city, spoke interestingly at the Rotary Club weekly luncheon held in the Commodore Cafe yesterday afternoon. These flags were given him on the occasion of visits paid to the clubs at Hull, Goole and Bridlington, all in Yorkshire, England.

In the course of his remarks, Mr. Johnson referred to impressions he had formed of the average Old Country businessman. He found that he takes himself quite seriously, demands fair dealing and is willing to deal fairly himself. Some people have the idea that any businessman of another country is inferior but that is not true of the English businessman.

Mr. Johnson was in England at the time of the abdication. He told the Rotary Club it seemed quite dramatic when the former King made his abdication speech and immediately the Broadcasting Company shut down until the next day. Visiting Hyde Park to listen to the orators that day Mr. Johnson was one of a quarter of a million people there. Every speaker was dilating in favor of the former king and against Mr. Baldwin. They thought it was because Edward had favored and spoken encouragingly to the miners and others that he was forced to resign. They thought the late King should have been allowed to marry whom he liked.

On a bus tour taken by easy stages from Hull to London a stop was made at King's Lynn, the former home of Captain Vancouver. G. G. McGeer of Vancouver had also visited the city not long before and had not been received with any great enthusiasm. In fact he was criticized somewhat severely.

After traveling a great deal Mr. and Mrs. Johnson were agreed that they liked British Columbia better than any other places visited and decided to settle down at Victoria. Visitors to the club yesterday included Thomas McClymont, Staff Sergeant G. H. Greenwood, Sheldford Dorton, T. G. McWatters and Robert Cumins of Vancouver.

TAME DUCK MATES WITH WILD GOOSE

WINNIPEG, July 16: (CP)—Oscar, wild Canada goose on the farm of Edward McDonald, near here, has mated with Susie, a tame duck, and settled down to a life of domestic bliss.

Two of the family from the first hatching showed traces of wild geese. They were larger than the others, had longer necks and distinctly marked heads.

Nine years ago Oscar was picked up in a field with a broken wing. Mr. McDonald carried him home, cared for him, but the wing remained crippled so he could not rejoin his flock.

Oscar made the best of things and within two years was barnyard boss, making hens, turkeys, calves, horses and pigs scurry around when they came too near.

TOURIST INJURED; IS IN HOSPITAL

Mrs. Catherine Hendrick of Minneapolis, a tourist passenger aboard the steamer Princess Charlotte, which was in port this morning, had the misfortune to fall and break her hip while playing shuffleboard aboard the steamer on the way north from Vancouver. OTTAWA, July 16: (CP)—Canadian exports increased \$52,067,000 in the first quarter of the fiscal year to \$272,491,818, the Department of Revenue announced. Gains in the price structure of all major industries of the country are reported.

"Barney" Johnson In Daring Swim

Courageous Plunge in Storm Tossed Waters Brings Aid To Helpless Boat

VANCOUVER, July 16: (CP)—Adventures come to Commander Barney Johnson as easily as other people run into debts. According to fellow yachtsmen "he just seems to pick 'em out of the sea any time he gets bored."

Diving into heaving seas when his "Westward Ho" dragged her anchor in Bellingham, Wash. harbor and threatened to pile up on the shore after the kicker propeller fouled on a cable, the doughty sailor swam ashore to get assistance from a tug. Puzzled immigration authorities, passed the unorthodox entry into port of the blood-stained and weed-festooned mariner and helped him locate a tug to tow the yacht to a safe berth. His wounds were superficial scratches.

PULP MILL IMPORTANT

What it Will Mean to Surrounding District is Envisioned

SMITHERS, July 16:—Announcement of the establishment of a pulp mill at Prince Rupert in the Daily News was good news for the people of the Skeena and Bulkley Valleys. Such a project would mean a change in time for Northern British Columbia generally.

It can be easily understood that the starting of such a project would mean a market for the produce of the farms, a market for some of the timber of the Skeena River and the coast districts, increased traffic on the railway with consequent increased employment of more railway men and a vast number of small enterprises that would come into being as a result of such an industry.

To Prince Rupert itself it would be of the utmost importance but the outlying district would benefit in a very material way which should spell a new period of prosperity for the North.

It is hoped that activity will be begun without delay.

CHINESE ADVANCE

Main Forces Are Moving on Both Peiping and Tientsin

TOKYO, July 16: (Canadian Press)—The Japanese War Office announced today that they had received reports that main forces of the Chinese Army were advancing on Peiping and Tientsin to support the 29th Route Army in the fight with Japanese troops in North China.

Japanese officials at Peiping declared that renewed fighting south and southeast of the city, increasing the Japanese losses in North China to twenty killed and sixty wounded, had compelled the Japanese to take adequate measures.

Chinese reports said that Peiping was being severed from reinforcements by a semi-circular line of Japanese trenches south of the city.

CHICAGO IN LEAD AGAIN

Defeated Boston Bees Yesterday While New York Giants Were Idle

BOSTON, July 16: (CP)—Chicago Cubs got back into the lead of the National League as a result of defeating the Bees here but their margin was only mathematical over the New York Giants who were idle with Pittsburgh owing to rain at New York.

In the American League the New York Yankees increased their margin of leadership to seven-and-a-half games by defeating the Tigers again at Detroit.

NELSON, July 16: (Canadian Press)—An entire Douk family of five persons, Mr. and Mrs. William Stoopnikoff; two daughters, Polly, aged 8, and Mable, 3, and son, Bill, aged 5, were drowned in the Columbia River between here and Trail last night when a rowboat overturned and was swept under by the current.

TREKKING IN NORTH

Schoolboys From Upper Canada, Canada College in B. C. Hinterlands

EDMONTON, July 16: (CP)—Thirty-seven bronzed boys from Upper Canada College have left Edmonton for a trip that will take them into the wilds of northern Alberta and British Columbia. Headed by N. Ignatieff, master of the college, the lads plan travel by pack horse from Wembley, Alta., to Mount Alexandra to the Fraser River Valley, to Prince George and Summit Lake, then by boat down the Parsnip River to Finlay Forks and Fort St. John.

Accompanying the party are Dr. C. V. Thompson, resident surgeon of the Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto; Jim Worrall, Olympic hurdler, and a master at the college; and Walter McDoom, master of Lower Canada College, Montreal. Two sons of Dr. D. E. Robertson, who were imprisoned in the mine collapse at Moose River, Nova Scotia, are in the party.

Equipped with all the needs of the prospector and geologist the party will make surveys of the territory they pass through and will seek gold and other precious metals where they can find them.

The trip is being undertaken to give the lads training in prospecting and survey work, and not with any intention of making mineral discoveries.

They will also carry radio equipment to keep them in touch with the outer world, and also small portable sets which will enable the different field parties to communicate with each other.

Envoy's Trail Specially Cut

Path Through Tweedsmuir Park, Blazed for Buchan—Coming Here

VICTORIA, July 16: (CP)—Following the route of Sir Alexander Mackenzie, the first white man to reach the Pacific coast by an overland route, a 30-mile trail through the 3,500 acre provincial park is being prepared for the August visit of Lord Tweedsmuir.

A noted walker, His Excellency is expected to make a 10-day tour through the former glacier "playground," past extinct volcanoes and over lakes and steamers noted for their trout and salmon. He is scheduled to visit Algatecho, largest Indian village in the district, and will close his holiday at Bella Coola, famed for its Indian rock carvings.

Throughout the journey a small provincial police escort will be provided. Radio equipment will be taken and constant contact with British Columbia police posts will be maintained. After the trip, His Excellency and his party will proceed to Prince Rupert for a three day visit.

PROMINENT POLITICIAN

Late Senator Joseph T. Robinson Long Prominent in American Affairs

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 16: (AP)—Political fortunes shaped themselves almost by apparent design to lift Joseph Taylor Robinson, who died this week, to a position of eminence in the Democratic party in the affairs of the nation.

Although a figure of importance in the Senate during the better part of the decade after the World War, his peculiar availability in 1928 made him the running mate of Alfred E. Smith in one of the most memorable presidential elections in the nation's history.

To a large extent he shaped his own destiny, but he was, nevertheless, a man seemingly cast for the times. Religion and prohibition, over which the states below the Mason and Dixon line felt deeply, dictated that the Democratic party which had chosen Smith, a New York Catholic and wet, as its leader to contest with Herbert Hoover, would do well to go to the south for its vice presidential nominee.

In Senator Robinson, the party found a man not only suitable to meet the strategic necessities, but also one whose ability, political courage and simple dignity held out the best hopes for success.

Real Party Power

He carried his campaign—one of the most ambitious ever attempted by a major candidate—from coast to coast and from northernmost states to the gulf and, while his ticket was badly beaten, Robinson returned to the Senate manifestly more strongly entrenched as the leader of his own party and a power to be reckoned with by the Republicans in the determination of any policy.

His rise to prominence reads like the theme of a boy's novel from the pen of an Alger or a Standish. Within fourteen days he had been a Representative in Congress, governor of Arkansas and a United States Senator from that state. He resigned as Congressman January 14, 1913, to become governor, having been elected to that office the previous September.


Meanwhile, the death of one of the Senators from Arkansas had created a vacancy and the legislature promptly chose the newly installed governor to go to the Senate. He was selected January 28 and took the oath March 10, 1913, thus returning to Washington almost coincidentally with Woodrow Wilson, whom he supported loyally.

Senator Robinson was born in a small settlement near Little Rock, Ark., August 26, 1872, the son of Dr. James and Matilda Jane Robinson. He obtained his early education at home and in rural schools and at the age of 17 began teaching school to earn money to enable him to continue his studies. He attended the Arkansas State University and pursued his law course at the University of Virginia. He was admitted to the bar in 1896.

On December 15, 1896, Senator Robinson married Miss Ewilla Gertrude Miller. They had no children.

Pan-American Clipper Hops Homeward Now

FOYNES, Ireland, July 16:—The Pan-American Airways flying boat Pan-American Clipper III landed here Wednesday afternoon from London in the course of its return transAtlantic flight. The ship is to take off for Bedford, Newfoundland, enroute back to New York.

ARE WE EASY MARKS?

Prince Rupert is evidently getting the name of being an easy mark for adventurers of any kind. People from out of town can come in and sell almost anything to local merchants or citizens who will turn down a real business project from a local man. Take advertising as an example. The local newspapers sell advertising at a very low rate compared with other places and yet when they are approached a good many local merchants refuse for various reasons or excuses. Then comes along some outside sharper with a "scheme" for advertising and they fall for it, almost clamor for it, and yet in most cases it has absolutely no advertising value.

There is no way in which merchants can get real returns for money expended on advertising which compares with the local newspapers. It goes before the people six days in the week and, if changed at reasonable intervals, compels attention. Every person in business should keep in touch with the public with a regular newspaper advertisement. We do not often mention this but think it right to draw attention to the fact that this type of advertising is far better than that peddled by transients who collect the cash and get out of town. The same is true of other lines of business.

ATTITUDE OF OPPOSITION

A great many local people seem almost to take offense at the announcement that a pulp mill is likely to be established in the city. Because a previous similar announcement was unfortunately not carried out is no reason why the present should not become effective. It certainly looks like a genuine proposal. As one that would benefit the city tremendously it should be welcomed, one would think, by every citizen. If this second attempt fails, it is just too bad for us, as was the other attempt. At any rate we can all welcome the interest taken in this city by outsiders, who have absolutely nothing to expect from citizens but their approval. We hope they will succeed in their project and make a lot of money out of it. If they do this they will also benefit the city. We shall be in the line of progress.

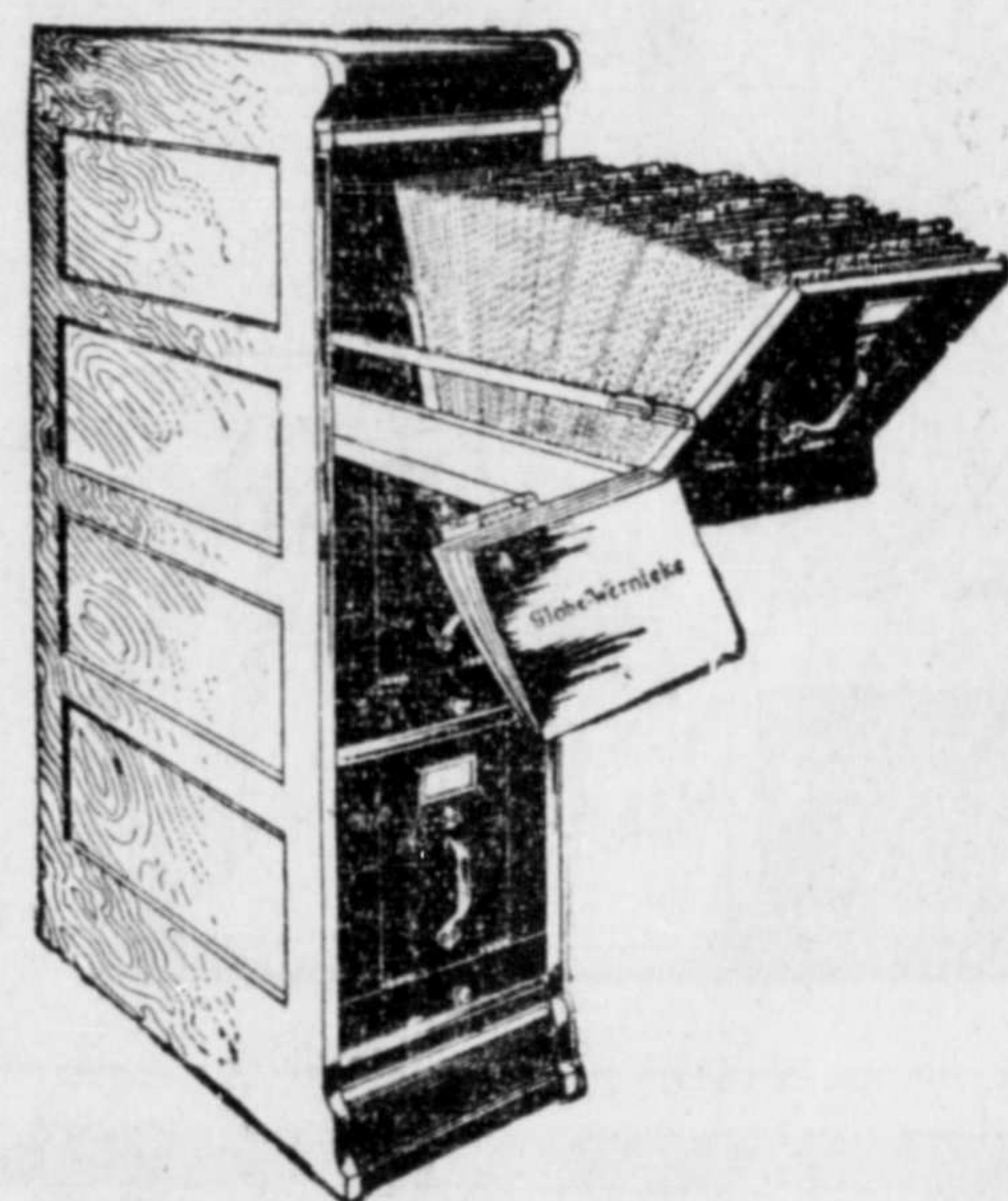
