Issues Decree Conferring Absolute Powers Upon Hmself in Insurgent Spain

HENDAYE, France, Oct. 23: (CP The insurgent generalissimo, Francisco Franco, has become absolute dictator of insurgent Spain. His degree setting up a Fascist National Council gives him the right to appoint all members of the council or the right to replace them He is also given the right to name secretly his successor as dictator




