#### AN UNSATISFACTORY INQUIRY

Unknown and friendless as he is, John Crawford, who met his death by falling off the Second Ave. sidewalk last Saturday night, deserves that a more searching inquiry than has been made should be made into the causes that led to his death.

Anybody who saw his crushed skull, knew that he died of his injuries. It requires no doctor or official board to announce that fact. The question that demands an answer is: "How did he come to walk off the sidewalk to his death?"

There are two theories to his death, and a third that is a combination of the two. One is that he walked over the sidewalk because it was dark, and the corner was unprotected; the other is that he was intoxicated, and did not know what he was doing.

If the first theory was correct, then it was a matter for a coroner's jury to decide whether or not a charge should lie against the City authorities who contributed to his death by leaving that corner unprotected.

If the second theory is correct then it is a matter for a coroner's jury to decide whether or not a verdict should be returned fixing the responsibility on the hotel keeper who permitted the man to leave his hotel in an irresponsible condition.

The decision made to hold a "police inquiry" instead of a public inquest, is not satisfactory. The safety of every man, woman and child who uses the streets is menaced by the failure to definitely establish the causes that led to John Crawford's death.
