Japanese Scaling Nanking Walls

Invaders Resort To Manoeuvre Of Ancient Times In Capturing Of Evacuated Capital Of China

Tokyo Awaits Fall of City in State of Frenzy Although it is Not Expected to Mean End of Hostilities in Orient

SHANGHAI, Dec. 7: (CP) — Advance columns of Japanese troops assailed Nanking's historic walls tonight. Japanese officers, who announced the attack, said that the spearhead of the invaders was attempting to climb the city's massive battlements with scaling ladders—a type of manoeuvre handed down through the Middle Ages. The gates of the apparently doomed city are closed. The Chinese have started a final stand which seems destined to fail. The Japanese spokesman did not say how soon he expected the fall of the one-time fountainhead of Nationalist China.

Chinese advices disclosed that General Ching Kai Shek, the Chinese leader, and Madame Chiang had left Nanking by air for Nanchang, capital of interior Kiangsi Province. A Chinese boom at Kiangyin in the Yangtze River, blocking Japanese warships from attacking Nanking, still remains intact although the Japanese had earlier reported its destruction.

In Tokyo, the Japanese awaited the fall of Nanking in a state of frenzy even though the capture of the Chinese capital is not generally expected to mean the end of hostilities.

The Japanese government is said to be considering issuance of a declaration withdrawing Japanese recognition of the Nanking government.

H. G. Perry M.L.A. would also have Dominion Take Over Mount Robson Park

VICTORIA, Dec. 7: (CP)—Harry G. Perry, Liberal member for Fort George, has urged in the Legislature completion of the highway eastward from Prince George to McBride as well as the construction of a road connecting up this section with Blue River. Mr. Perry also urges the handing over of Mount Robson Park to the federal government for development.

Eleventh Infant In Chicago Dies

Physicians and Scientists Endeavoring to Save Lives of Seven More Babies Affected

CHICAGO, Dec. 7: (CP) — The eleventh infant to succumb to an epidemic of acute diarrhea in St. Elizabeth's Hospital here died Sunday. Physicians and scientists are endeavoring to save the lives of seven other babies which have become affected by the baffling malady. The young parents of twelve-day-old Daniel Ennisser, the eleventh victim of the mysterious malady, have offered the body of their first born so that medical science may seek the cause of the intestinal disease. John G. Essener said he and his wife "thought it might help other little babies" if doctors performed an autopsy.

Today it was stated that the seven other afflicted infants were gaining strength under a new treatment.

He is being held on complaint of Hans Schwander, Massett logger, who claims \$10,000 damages from Tessen for alleged alienation of his wife's affections.

Seattle Service Stations Closed

Pickets Prevent One Hundred Richfield Branches From Doing Business

SEATTLE, Dec. 7: — One hundred Richfield service stations in the Seattle area are closed down owing to a strike dispute. Pickets have prevented deliveries of gasoline being made to the stations which are, therefore, unable to do business.

Second Crop of Strawberries Picked Here This Month; Fine Fruit Ripens Late In Rupert

Prince Rupert people, shivering today in what appears to be the start of a cold snap, may find it difficult to believe that fine strawberries, growing outside, were picked here yesterday. Nevertheless, it is a fact.

While plucking late roses in his garden on Park Avenue yesterday, Fred Lanza looked down into his strawberry patch and could hardly believe his eyes when he saw an excellent big berry, fully ripe, solid and fully an inch in diameter. It was one of a cluster which also contained four well shaped green berries, two of which were also quite large.

The cluster was being exhibited this morning at the Grotto Cigar Store.

It was evidently a second crop induced by the mild fall.

TELLS MR. WINCH WHY

Incident of Change in International Fisheries Commission Membership Explained by Premier

VICTORIA, Dec. 7: (CP) — Replacement of George J. Alexander, deputy commissioner of fisheries, by L. W. Patmore K.C. on the International Fisheries Commission was protested in the legislature by Harold E. Winch, fiery young C.C.F. member for Vancouver East. Mr. Winch said that Vancouver fishermen resented the change.

Premier T. D. Pattullo replied that he had received representations from Prince Rupert, which port represented eighty per cent of the entire halibut catch of the British Columbia coast, asking for a Prince Rupert man on the Commission and had forwarded the request to Ottawa. The resignation of Mr. Alexander and the appointment of Mr. Patmore to succeed him had resulted.

Minimum Wage Convictions At Interior Town

SMITHERS, Dec. 7: — Two infractions of the Minimum Wage Act for girls were tried in the local court before Stipendiary Magistrate R. L. Gale last Friday and two Chinese restaurants were fined for having failed to pay the minimum wage to waitresses.

Forin Campbell of the Department of Labor had charge of the prosecutions.

LOG SCALE IS HIGHER

Production For This Year to Date Shows Healthy Gain Over Year Ago

Log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district for the year 1937 to date stands at an aggregate of 149,367,112 board feet in comparison with 135,521,152 board feet up to a corresponding date last year. The scale for this November was 14,565,653 board feet as against 13,393,814 board feet in November 1936.

The production of poles and piling as recorded in the interior this November was 188,408 lineal feet—666 lineal feet fir, 182,137 feet cedar, 4,705 hemlock and 900 miscellaneous—as compared with 56,414 lineal feet—practically all in cedar—in November 1936.

The tie count this November was 33,703 pieces, all jackpine, as compared with 21,347 pieces last November.

The cordwood record this November was 22 cords in comparison with 192 last year while 43 cords of fence posts were taken out this November in comparison with 15 in the same month a year ago.

ALL SEEM TO BE HUMAN

The C.C.F. in this province seems to be as human as the old line parties, judging from the report of the recent Victoria by-election in which its candidate ran third. In reviewing the situation "The Federationist," organ of the party, makes much of the fact that Professor King Gordon, their candidate, polled 756 more votes than he did in the previous by-election when he nearly defeated the late S. F. Tolmie. It fails to mention that the Liberals polled 3762 votes more than they did in 1936 and that the Conservatives polled 1664 more votes than in 1936. These figures indicate that, while the Liberals and Conservatives made large gains in the strength of their respective parties as shown in the vote, the C.C.F. made but a small gain.

We did not intend to have commented on this phase of the vote but seeing the published report in the C.C.F. paper it seemed only right to give both sides of the news so that all readers might be properly informed in regard to the situation. Had we stated that the Liberals made great gains and not mentioned the gains of the others we might have been condemned as unfair. The Federationist had no such qualms. It gave only the C.C.F. side of the election and left out the more important news. As we said before, it is an intimation that the C.C.F. is human but it also indicates that its journalistic supporters lack newspaper training and try to build up a fabric of success from a failure instead of admitting the failure.

SIR EDWARD'S LETTER

Sir Edward Beatty, writing to the Peace River Outlet Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, suggests that the outlet to the Peace should be built in such a way as best to contribute to the prosperity of the Peace River country and the economical use of the wealth reposing in the country to be traversed between the grain fields and the sea. This is encouraging to Prince Rupert where it is believed that an outlet to Prince Rupert would best serve that purpose.
