Skeena Member Sees Liberation

Kenney Thinks Yukon Annexation Would Speed Day When New North Province Might Take Form

Such is His Reason for Supporting Premier's Scheme— Would Break Bondage to South— Appreciates Sampling Plant and Urges Assay Office— Could Handle Settlers

VICTORIA, Nov. 4: (CP) — E. T. Kenney, Liberal member for Skeena, told the Legislature yesterday that he favored the proposal of Premier T. D. Pattullo for annexation of the Yukon because it might result eventually in the formation of two Pacific coast provinces. "From a purely selfish viewpoint," said Mr. Kenney "I would like to see the Yukon become a part of British Columbia. In that event there might be a chance for two provinces on the coast, thus freeing the northland from the influence of southern coastal cities."

Mr. Kenney commended Hon. George Pearson, minister of mines, for the establishment of an ore sampling plant at Prince Rupert and suggested the establishment of a small assay office there.

The Skeena member declared that there was sufficient land in the Bulkley Valley to accommodate all the farmers wishing to migrate from the drought areas and suggested that arrangements be made to bring settlers from there.

AGREEMENT CONFIRMED

British Prime Minister Announces Trade Negotiations with Spanish Insurgents—Herald Claims Recognition

LONDON, Nov. 4: (CP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that the British government and Spanish insurgents were negotiating for the appointment of commercial agents without diplomatic status. This did not mean de facto recognition of the insurgents, the Premier said.

The Daily Herald, however, said that the British government was preparing to recognize the insurgent regime in Spain "as soon as certain details were arranged."

The Spanish civil war non-intervention committee is continuing its sessions here with consideration of plans for the evacuation of foreign volunteers from both sides under the supervision of a commission. There seems to be a tendency to evade the vexed question of belligerent rights.

Debate Seems In Offing For Meeting Friday Evening

Chamber of Commerce Committee Refuses to Change Resolution Asking Vancouver Support On Peace Outlet

The Peace River committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, at a meeting last night decided to again recommend to the monthly general meeting of the Chamber, which is to be held tomorrow, that the support of the Vancouver Board of Trade be requested for the western rail outlet of the Peace country "by the most direct westerly route to an established port." This resolution had been sent back to the committee from the last meeting for redrafting.

The committee discussed this situation for the better part of an hour and then decided not to make any change in the resolution but to recommend to the Chamber that the resolution be passed as it stands.

It was suggested in the course of discussion that some members of the local chamber seemed to be more interested in Vancouver than in Prince Rupert and it would be a good thing to have a show-down and see who was with the city and who against.

NEW DEPT' IS FORMED

Legislation Providing for Trade and Industry Branch is Introduced in Legislature

Organization Plans

Will Also be Bureau of Economics and Statistics and Industrial and Tourist Development

VICTORIA, Nov. 4: (CP)—A bill creating a Department of Trade and Industry was introduced in the Legislature yesterday and was given a first reading.

The bill calls for the establishment of the new department, a bureau of economics and statistics, a bureau of trade extension and a bureau of industrial and tourist development.

The bureau of industrial and tourist development will stimulate and aid tourist traffic and secure information and advise as to the establishment of new industries where such can be profitably carried on. A tourist council of seven members will be chosen, four from the civil service and others from representatives of organized tourist bodies.

Three departments of the government—industries, provincial information bureau and economic council—will come under a new portfolio to be administered by a minister or a deputy minister to be named later.

HOCKEY IS UNDER WAY

National League Opens Tonight at Toronto and Chicago

TORONTO, Nov. 4: (CP) — The four month season of the National Hockey League gets under way tonight with Detroit Red Wings and Toronto Maple Leafs meeting here and New York Americans at Chicago.

Saturday night the Americans will be here to play with the Maple Leafs while the Boston Bruins will play the Maroons in the opening game of the season at Montreal.

On Sunday night the New York Rangers will play the Red Wings at Detroit.

ILL AT KETCHIKAN

DRUMHELLER STRIKE

DRUMHELLER, Alberta—Three hundred coal miners went out on strike yesterday in protest at timbering conditions in a local colliery.

LEAD PRICES CUT AGAIN

NEW YORK — The American Smelting & Refining Co. reduced the price of lead by another \$5 a ton yesterday to 5 1/4c per pound. The St. Joseph Lead Co. at East St. Louis reduced the price to 5.1c a pound. It is the third slash of 35 per cent in the price of lead in recent months.

WAR ADMIRAL WINNER

BALTIMORE — War Admiral, undefeated three-year-old champion and an odds-on favorite in betting at 3 to 5, won the \$7500 added Pimlico Special at Pimlico yesterday. The event was restricted to three-year-olds and there was a field of ten. Charles Kurtzinger, 128 pounds and top weight of the field, rode the son of Man o'War.

DELANEY WINS

LONDON—Al Delaney, up and coming new Canadian boxer, easily outpointed Norman Baynes in ten rounds here last night.

EYSTON SPEEDY

British Racer Lowers Three Marks On Bonneville Salt Flats in Utah Wednesday

BONNEVILLE, Utah, Nov. 4: (CP) — George Eyston, British automobile racer, holds three new speed records today as a result of drives yesterday.

In the two thousand mile drive he averaged a fraction over 163 miles per hour. He also broke the records for the 3000 kilometres and the twelve-hour run.

Eyston plans an assault on the measured mile speed record either Saturday or Sunday in another car.

SECOND BID FOR JAPAN

Will Be Asked Again to Attend Nine-Power Conference Now Being Held at Brussels

War Continues

Bitter Fighting Still on Around Shanghai With Air Bombings at Canton and Shansi

BRUSSELS, Nov. 4: (CP)—Great Britain, France and United States having sponsored the proposal, the nine-power conference has decided to send a second invitation to Japan to attend the conference on the Sino-Japanese situation. The desire is to bring about direct peace negotiations between Japan and China but, if Japan persists in refusing to attend the conference, some other means of mediation will be sought. The majority of the powers are in favor of a process of mediation rather than branding Japan as an aggressor. The Italian delegate yesterday expressed himself as not being very hopeful of the conference achieving any results unless it should be directly between China and Japan.

Today the conference of nineteen nations decided to empower a sub-committee to offer aid to Japan and China in effecting peace between the two nations.

Meanwhile heavy and bitter fighting continues around Shanghai and elsewhere in China. Further victories north and east of Shanghai are claimed today by the Japanese. In south China the city of Canton was bombed from the air and there was also aerial bombing in Shansi Province.

It is reported that the Chinese are on the verge of altering their defense tactics at Shanghai. One report is that the Chinese may abandon the entire Shanghai Peninsula. It was also reported today that Japanese soldiers were being transferred from North China for reinforcement at Shanghai.

New Official Of Canadian National Railway

MONTREAL, Nov. 4:—H. C. Rochester has been appointed general car accountant, Canadian National Railways, with headquarters at Montreal, according to an announcement by G. N. Goad, chief of car service of the National system. He succeeds H. A. Balkwill, retired.

Born in Prince Albert, Sask., in 1892, Mr. Rochester commenced his railway career as stenographer in the master mechanics' office of the Canadian Pacific at Winnipeg in 1907. He joined the Canadian Northern Railway at Winnipeg in the same year, holding various positions until his appointment as chief clerk to the assistant general manager of the Canadian Northern at Vancouver in 1915. He served with the Royal Flying Corps and Royal Air Force during the war, and entered the service of the Canadian National Railways as chief clerk to the vice-president at Toronto in 1918. In 1922 he became chief clerk to the vice president and general manager, Toronto, and in 1923 was transferred to Montreal as chief clerk to the vice-president in charge of operation and maintenance later being appointed office assistant. In 1934 he was appointed superintendent of passenger train service which post he has held until his present appointment.

Union Organizers Are Blamed For Outrage In Vancouver Last Night

Charles Greenlund in Hospital with Burns on Face, Hands and Arms While His Boat is Shattered Hulk Following Explosion

VANCOUVER, Nov. 4: (CP)—Police and fire department investigators today examined the hulk of Charles Greenlund's gasboat Ibis which was shattered last night by an explosion which it is said was probably caused by a bomb. Greenlund is in hospital recovering from burns on face, hands and arms suffered when the blast ripped the top from the boat's cabin. Greenlund told investigators that his boat was bombed because he refused to join an outlaw fishermen's union. He said he was warned by friends that union organizers had threatened to "get" him for refusing to join.

GYM IDEA UP AGAIN

Community Centre Again to be Gone Into by Local Gyro Club

Rejecting the idea of participating in certain other undertakings of civic welfare, the Prince Rupert Gyro Club, at a special business luncheon yesterday with President H. N. Brocklesby in the chair over a good-sized attendance of members, decided to once again go ahead actively with consideration of the idea of establishing a fully equipped civic centre or gymnasium here.

A committee will be appointed at once by the president to obtain and collate information in regard to the various phases of the project, presenting a report to the club a month hence.

The decision to this effect was the culmination of a rather extensive discussion in the course of which a number of community projects were mentioned. The decision does not imply any interference with the Gyro Club's present general objective of playground activity.

PASSES IN VICTORIA

Harry C. Fraser, Former Inspector of Schools Here, Is Dead

VICTORIA, Nov. 4: (CP)—Harry C. Fraser, provincial school inspector and former Presbyterian Church minister, died here Tuesday night at the age of fifty-eight. From 1921 to 1930 he was inspector of schools at Prince Rupert, coming here from the northern city.

News of Mr. Fraser's death will be received with feelings of much regret by his many friends here. General sympathy will be extended to the widow and son and daughter. Although he had retired from the ministry, Mr. Fraser took an active part in the work of First Presbyterian Church while in Prince Rupert, often relieving in the pulpit. He came here from Chilliwack where he had been in the ministry.

TREND OF POLITICS

Little Significance Seen in Off-Year Elections—Some Further Results

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 4: (CP)—Observers have looked in vain for any general political significance in the off-year elections of Tuesday. The outstanding feature of the elections, and not unexpected, was the decisive victory in New York of Mayor Fiorella LaGuardia over Jeremiah Mahoney, Tammany Democratic candidate, with a majority of 454,425 votes. Particular interest was taken in the contest for district attorney of Manhattan in which Thomas Dewey, special rackets prosecutor and a henchman of LaGuardia's, defeated Harold Hastings, Tammany Democrat. Tammany had made a drive for this office but Hastings suffered a severe defeat. Republicans gained a congressional seat by electing Bruce Barton, an advertising man, to fill a vacancy. In New Jersey Senator Harry Moore, Democrat, defeated Lester Cleo, Republican, by a majority of some 100,000 for the governorship now held by Harold Hoffman, Republican.

Richard Reading, American Federation of Labor supporter, was elected mayor of Detroit over O'Brien, Committee on Industrial Organization candidate. The vote being some 255,000 to 150,000. C. I. O. supporters failed to take over the civic government of Detroit as threatened, being beaten in the contests for all nine city council seats. In only one seat did they have a chance and there they were beaten by a small majority.

C. I. O.-backed candidates in the important industrial centres of Akron and Canton in Ohio were also defeated.

Morris Hogan, young Democrat, won the mayoralty of Boston by a decisive majority over Former Governor James Curley.

In Virginia James Price, Democrat, won the governorship by defeating Powell Royall, Republican.

POST OFFICE SITE

Plans and specifications for the new federal government building here, which were received in the city yesterday, call for the erection of the building on the north side of Third Avenue between Third and Fourth Streets in the middle of the block as originally planned.

Labor Peace Conference Resumed

WASHINGTON D.C., Nov. 4:—The peace conference between American Federation of Labor and Committee on Industrial Organization was reopened today. It was preceded by a caucus between John L. Lewis, head of the C.I.O., and his followers.

HIGHWAY REVENUE

Similkameen Member Makes Suggestion for Increasing Gas Tax Without Advancing Price

VICTORIA, Nov. 4: (CP)—Speaking in the Legislature, C. H. Tupper, Liberal member for Similkameen, advocated increasing the gasoline tax five cents a gallon with the additional revenue thus derived being earmarked entirely for construction and upkeep of British Columbia highways.

What is certain is that outside firms will be bidding on the work. The probability is that representatives of these firms have already examined the ground and looked into local working conditions.

Everyone is hoping and expecting that the contract will be let and the work commenced before the end of the present year so that the excavation may be completed at a time when the work is badly needed locally. In any event it is satisfactory to know that tenders are now being invited and bids must be in within a very short time.

More Using Library Now

Autumn Reading Season Commences—New Lot of Books Received

TRADING LIGHT ON CATTLE MART

VANCOUVER, Nov. 4.—Trading was light on the Vancouver cattle market yesterday. Seventy head of steers were sold but no heifers or cows. The price of steers was \$4.75 to \$5.75 as compared with \$5.50 on Tuesday. The heifer price on Tuesday was \$4.25 and cows \$2 to \$2.25.

Mrs. Charles Barrett, wife of one of the Bulkley Valley's best known pioneer ranchers, arrived in the city on the Prince George yesterday morning following a trip to Vancouver and proceeded to the interior by the evening train.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Cod Fishing Continues Out of Here—Clamshell Scow Being Reloaded—Armour Putting in New Gravel Bunker.

Black cod fishing is being continued by both Canadian and American halibut vessels and substantial quantities of this variety are being landed at Prince Rupert. With a slight advantage in price, Ketchikan boats were landing their catches at Prince Rupert instead of at their home port. The buyers at Prince Rupert are the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Atlin Fisheries and Booth Fisheries. Unfavorable weather has been mitigating somewhat against successful fishing operations and catches are inclined to be light. The Melville, Capt. John Ivarson, was in today with a catch of black cod.

A large scow which overturned recently in Hudson Bay Passage, Dundas Island, dumping a load of 500 tons of clamshell into the sea, is now being reloaded with a similar cargo at Dundas Island for delivery to Seattle. After the capsizing, the scow was righted by the Armour Salvage Co.'s service boats Daly and Pachena with derrick scow. The Pachena has returned to port and the Daly is remaining at Dundas to assist with the reloading.

Power tug Pachena left yesterday for the Montieth logging camp at Newcombe Harbor, Pitt Island, to deliver a boom of logs to the McAfee & Sunbury mill at Georgetown. The Pachena will also bring in some piling for the use of the Armour Salvage Co. here.

The Armour Salvage Co. is about to commence on the erection of a new gravel bunker on the end of its dock here. It will be a good-sized bin and is being put in at

this time in view of the prospect of early building activity here.

Capt. Reg Green of the Armour Salvage Co. has been in hospital for the past week for treatment to his ankle which was badly cut recently at Sandspit, Queen Charlotte Islands, while he was engaged in work for the company there. Capt. Green is expecting to be out again within the next few days.

Delayed by head winds and generally stormy weather, C. N. R. steamer Prince John, Capt. Neil McLean, is not expected in port before this evening from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands. The vessel left Skidegate Inlet at 10:30 yesterday morning for Massett and has been further delayed by stress of weather since then.

Northbound from Vancouver to Skagway and other Alaskan points on a regularly scheduled voyage, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, sailing a couple of hours later in continuation of her trip. The vessel is due back here next Monday afternoon southbound. There were only twenty-six passengers aboard the Princess Norah on arrival here. Five disembarked from the vessel at this port while two boarded her here for the north.

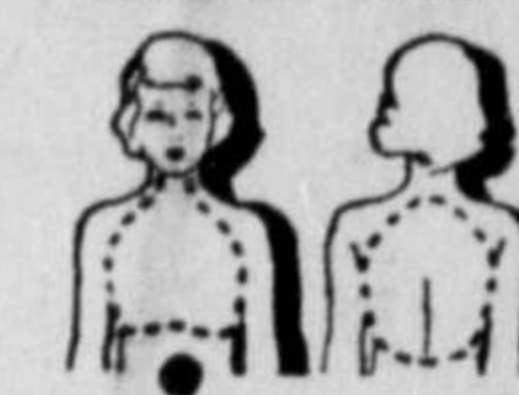




