The King will enter the Abbey and children as well as several siswearing a crimson velvet robe and a cap of state. The Queen will be attired in purple robes and a circlet of gold. The lengthy coronation ceremony is expected to start about 11 a.m. when the royal couple advances to the "coronation theatre," a raised platform in front of the high altar, and kneels on faldstools set before the chairs of state on the right of the altar. After various rituals the Archbishop of Canterbury administers the Coronation for burial. Oath to the King who kneels at the altar with his hand on the Bible. silken pall the King is girdled with the sword of state in a purple velvet scabbard. He removes it, after a prayer has been said, and carries it to the altar.
