#### **ELECTION ON JUNE 1**

The election of a new provincial legislature is to take place June 1. The provincial government will be on trial. If the people of the province approve of the conduct of affairs since the Pattullo government took office from the Tolmie administration the natural thing will be to return them for another term. If they disapprove they will be defeated and replaced by some other government.

It is to be assumed that there will be in the field three or four parties. There will be the traditional Conservative party that dissolved at the close of the Tolmie administration, some running as unionists and others under other names. Only one professed Conservative was elected. Under the reorganization of Dr. Frank Patterson the Conservatives will again have candidates in the field; and the probability is they may elect a few members. The C. C. F. group has been rather badly split since the last general election. The leader, Rev. Robert Connell, and several of his followers left the party because they felt it was becoming communistic. They have formed a new party and will have candidates in the field in some constituencies. The C. C. F. party still continues as a party, but there is more or less change in its personnel going on all the time. However, the members continue active and keen and are likely to put up a good fight for a place in the legislature, even though it scarcely can expect to command anything approaching a majority there. It seems rather as if it might be a contest between Conservatives and C. C. F. for second place.

#### POLICY OF THE LIBERALS

We have not yet before us the full text of the manifesto issued by the Pattullo government in regard to policy except insofar as its stand goes on health insurance. On that it is proposed to take a plebiscite of the electors and, if they approvee, there will be a health insurance law passed, although not the same law that was proposed recently.

Since the present government took charge, the finances of the province have been rehabilitated and industry has revived, until today it is said that British Columbia leads the rest of Canada in its recovery from the depression. Modern hotel, Hyder, B.C. Good Pressure has been brought to bear upon Ottawa with the opening for building up fine busiresult that some help has been received, not only in the matter of loans but also in highway construction, building of mining roads and also in contributions to general revenue of the province. Further efforts will be made through the commission which is to be appointed, to see that British Columbia gets a fair deal in the Canadian federation. Few, if any, provincial governments have made such progress in so short a time as the one now in power. For that reason alone it seems hardly likely there will be any change in the general set-up as a result of this election.

#### CLEAN UP FOR TOURISTS

No plans have been made this year so far to prepare for the advent of tourists by cleaning and painting up and generally improving the appearance of the city. Possibly before the spring is over such a campaign may be started but at any rate in order to keep our own self-respect it; would be a good thing to clean and paint up as soon as possible.




