The inventive genius of Elihu momson began to make itself mifest when he was 11 years old. at this early age his young brain conceived some sort of a mechaniidea and, with a wine bottle as he constructed a crude machine. Thereafter, through his high school course and for more than three score years, he devoted himself to mechanical, optical and electrical experiments and inventions. Eventually, he gained recognition as one of the group which had contributed most to the phenomenal development of 2 1 electrical science during the half! century beginning about 1880.

Increased Traffic Had Beneficial Result, C. N. R. Annual Report Shows

MONTREAL, March 16;- In creased traffic carried by the railways last year furnished work for a large number of additional railroaders. This is indicated by figures released in the annual report of the Canadian National Railways. During 1936 the average number of employees on the payroll of the National System was 78,836, an increase of 3,783 over the average number of employees during 1935. These figures include railway, express and telegraph employees.

The total payroll of the National System last year was \$111.221,-129, an increase of \$6,359,609 over the payroll for the previous year. The percentage of increase in the number of employees was 5.04 while the increase in payroll was 6.06 percent.

During last lear labor received the largest share of the Canadian National dollar. Out of every dollar of operation revenue nearly 55 cents went to the workers of the system.
