HOPE REVIVED THAT STR. TEES MAY BE RESCUED

THE BARQUE 'CARRONDELET' MAY BECOME A TOTAL WRECK

CAPTAIN FREEZE AND CREW OF SIX TAKEN OFF BY TUG LAST NIGHT—VESSEL SAID TO BE BADLY HOLED AND COAL CARGO LIKELY TO BE LOST.

From the scene of the Carrondelet wreck on Holland Rocks the tug J. E. J. returned yesterday evening, bringing off Captain Freeze and six men from the stranded barque. An effort was made to recover the hawser, which had to be slipped when the barque ran ashore. Another effort will be made today.

The Carrondelet is badly aground, having slid some twenty feet or more down the reef, tearing her bottom badly. It is doubtful now if she can be gotten off at all. The sea runs heavily on Holland Rocks, and the vessel bumped a good deal. Her cargo consists of 315,000 feet of lumber and 600 tons of coal, and the latter will be a total loss unless salvaging of the hull can be effected.

The reason for the stranding is said to have been the swerving of the vessel caused by wind and tide when passing the danger point. The keel touched and before the tug could regain control the hulk had drifted hard aground, the falling tide and sea running doing the rest of the mischief.

MACNAMARAS MAKE CONFESSION

James Admits That He Blew Up Los Angeles Times Building, and John Admits He Blew Up the Llewellyn Iron Works

DRAMATIC END TO SENSATIONAL TRIAL

Prosecutor Will Ask for Life Sentence on James Who Caused Death of Twenty-One Men—Sentence of Fourteen Years Will be Asked for John—Labor Leaders are Astounded at Sudden Turn of Events

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 2.—This morning James and John McNamara sit in their cells, the former the confessed murderer that placed the bomb which blew up and wrecked the Los Angeles Times building in the early hours of October 1, 1910, thereby causing the deaths of 21 persons, and the latter, by his own confession, guilty of having dynamited the Llewellyn Iron Works on Christmas Day of 1910.

The trial reached a dramatic climax yesterday afternoon when twenty minutes after the court reopened both men made confessions and went back to prison quarters.

Sentences will be delivered on Tuesday, December 5th, when the Prosecuting Attorney will ask for a life sentence for James and 14 years in the penitentiary for John. This disposition had practically been arranged between the two sides previous to the opening of court.

The conclusion of the case came as a great surprise to everyone. The leaders in the labor world are astounded, as they had believed the two prisoners to be innocent.

PROPERTY OWNERS HAVE ORGANIZED AND WILL TAKE A HAND IN THINGS

Sections 5, 6, 7 and 8 Unite, and Will Consider Whether They Will Also Unite With Section One Ratepayers—Latter Body is Said to Intend to Bring out a Competent Council for the Coming Year

Ratepayers of Sections 5, 6, 7, and 8 assembled in the Presbyterian church hall last night, and after considerable discussion decided to organize into "The Property Owners' Association of Prince Rupert," an executive committee of twelve, three from each section, was elected by standing vote, as follows:

Section Five—W. H. Montgomery, A. J. Galland, F. M. Lannic.

Section Six—E. H. Mortimer, D. H. Morrison, A. Gnapp.

Section Seven—A. W. Edge, J. A. Brooksbank, J. O'Brien.

Section Eight—John Carroll, T. W. Saville, A. Flexman.

A Gnapp presided over the meeting. The most important question brought up was a suggested union between the Property Holders' Association, representing the above sections, and the Ratepayers' Association, representing Section 1. An allegation by W. H. Montgomery that the latter association was run by a ring which was also responsible for the starting of this new organization, resulted in the naming of the "Ratepayers' Association" leaders as follows: President, W. J. Alder; Secretary, J. H. Pillsbury; Treasurer, Lee Baker; Executive, Messrs. H. Rogers, H. F. McRae, R. A. White, J. Lorne McLaren and W. T. Robinson.

It was decided that no idea of union of the two bodies should be entertained until the "Property Holders" had properly organized. Strong feeling was shown against union at all. Meanwhile the executive of twelve will proceed to elect officers, and next Friday night another meeting will be held to announce these.

Messrs. H. F. McRae and W. T. Robinson were present on behalf of the "Ratepayers' Association" as well as being property owners in other sections. They stated that the desire of the Section One organization was towards union, and that it existed simply to protect the rights of ratepayers and to ensure if possible the return of a competent city council next year. This object is the same as that of the "Property Owners" who, however, have in view the needs of their section for substantial improvements.

The meeting was distinctly against any sort of political color in the proposed organization.

TUG WILLIAM JOLLIFFE HAS HOPE OF RESCUING THE TEES

AT 10 O'CLOCK THIS MORNING THE TUG ENTERED KYUQUOT SOUND ON HER SEARCH—THE TEES' DISTRESS SIGNAL WAS HEARD AGAIN LAST NIGHT.

The wireless station on Digby Island reports that the tug William Jolliffe entered Kyuput Sound at 10 this morning in search of the steamer Tees, which was heard calling for help at 6 o'clock last night. The mountains surrounding the sound prevent wireless communication from following the tug, but hopes are felt that news of the rescue of the Tees or her crew will soon be made known.

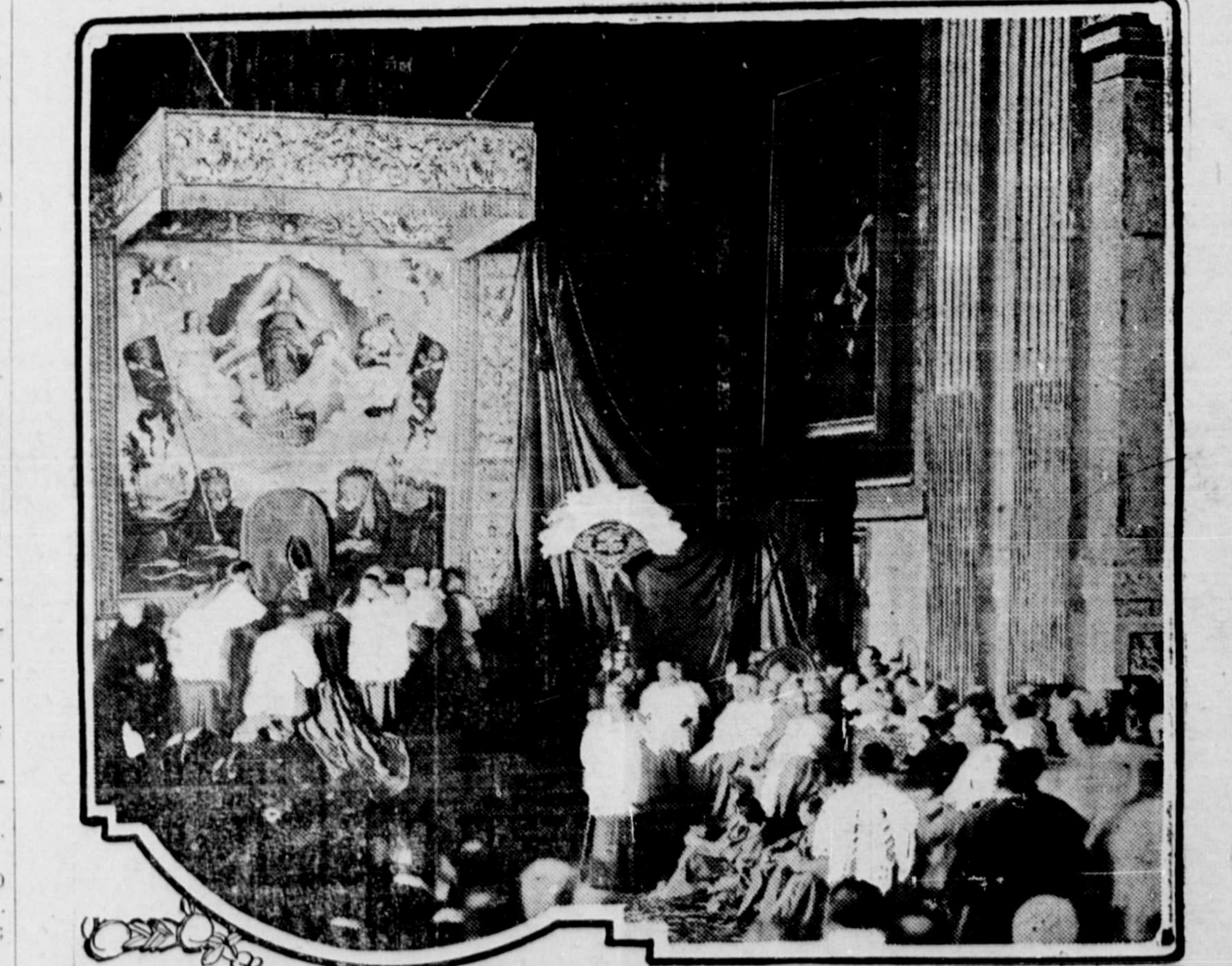

THE RAILWAY COMMISSION AND PRINCE RUPERT.

The telegraphic dispatch from the Daily News' special correspondent at Ottawa, announcing that the Railway Commission has refused to sanction the G. T. P. plans from Mile 0 to Mile 3, westerly from Prince Rupert, has proved welcome news to many citizens in Prince Rupert, and the full text of the judgment is eagerly being awaited.

It means that, despite the City Council's withdrawal of objection to the railway plans, the citizens who purchased property on Cow Creek with the idea of using it as waterfrontage are not going to have their rights sacrificed.

Cow Creek is the only piece of waterfrontage in Prince Rupert that has been purchasable by private citizens. The action of the railway company in blocking up the entrance of the creek without securing sanction for their plans was a high-handed piece of work that robbed the property owners of Cow Creek waterfrontage of the special value their property possessed.

If the railway counted on being able to carry out their work by force, to hush up opposition later, and then to secure a sanction with the help of the City Council's cringing letter, they reckoned without the Chairman of the Railway Commission. He has had too much experience with the ways of little opportunistic councils of tradesmen, holding office for twelve months, to be affected in his judgments by any consideration save that of justice. Chairman Mabey is the modern St. George, rescuing maiden municipalities from the clutch of the railroad dragons.

It is to be hoped that Judge Mabey will be able to save some of the bays for the mosquito fleet, in addition to restoring the navigable waters of Cow Creek to the property holders of that district.

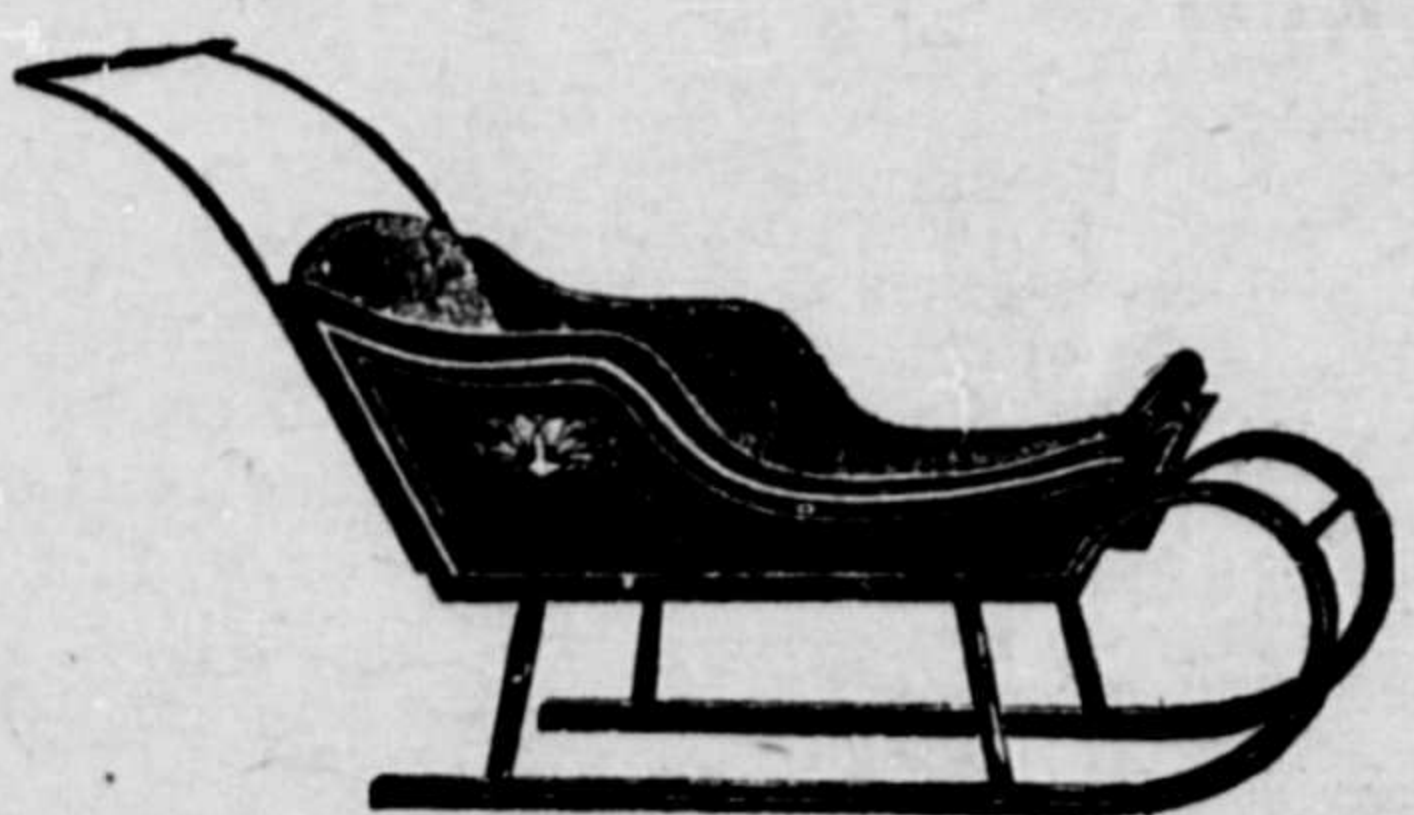

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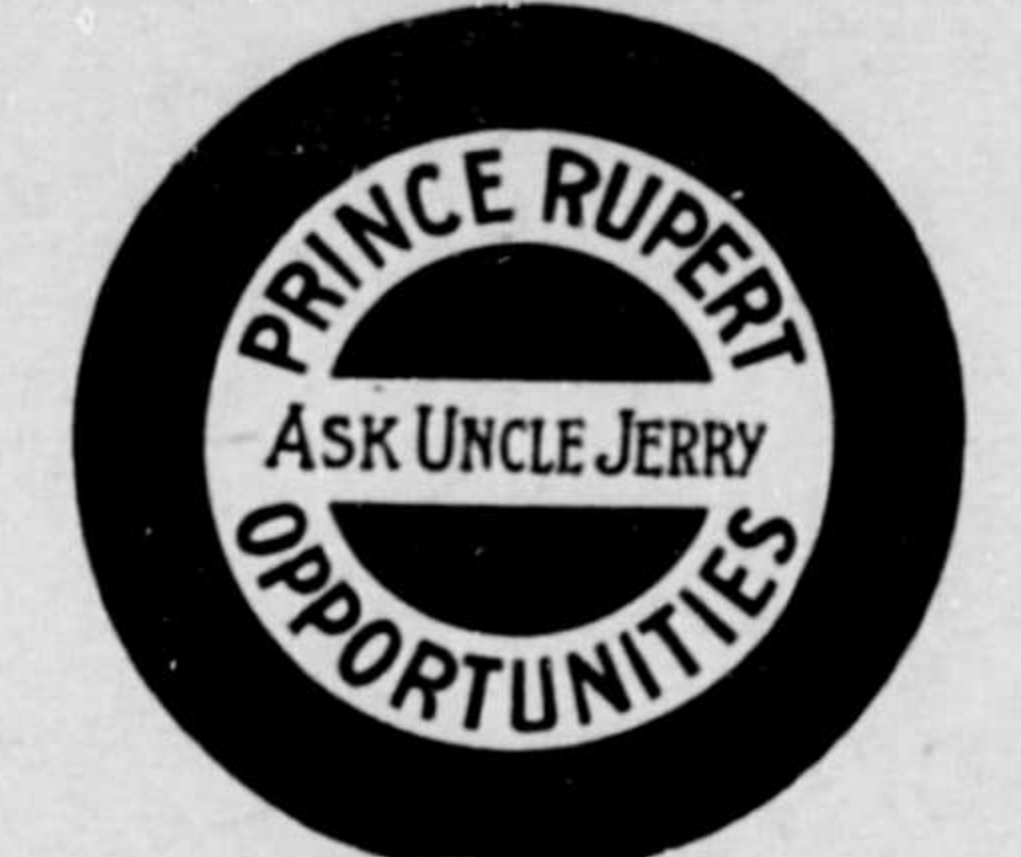

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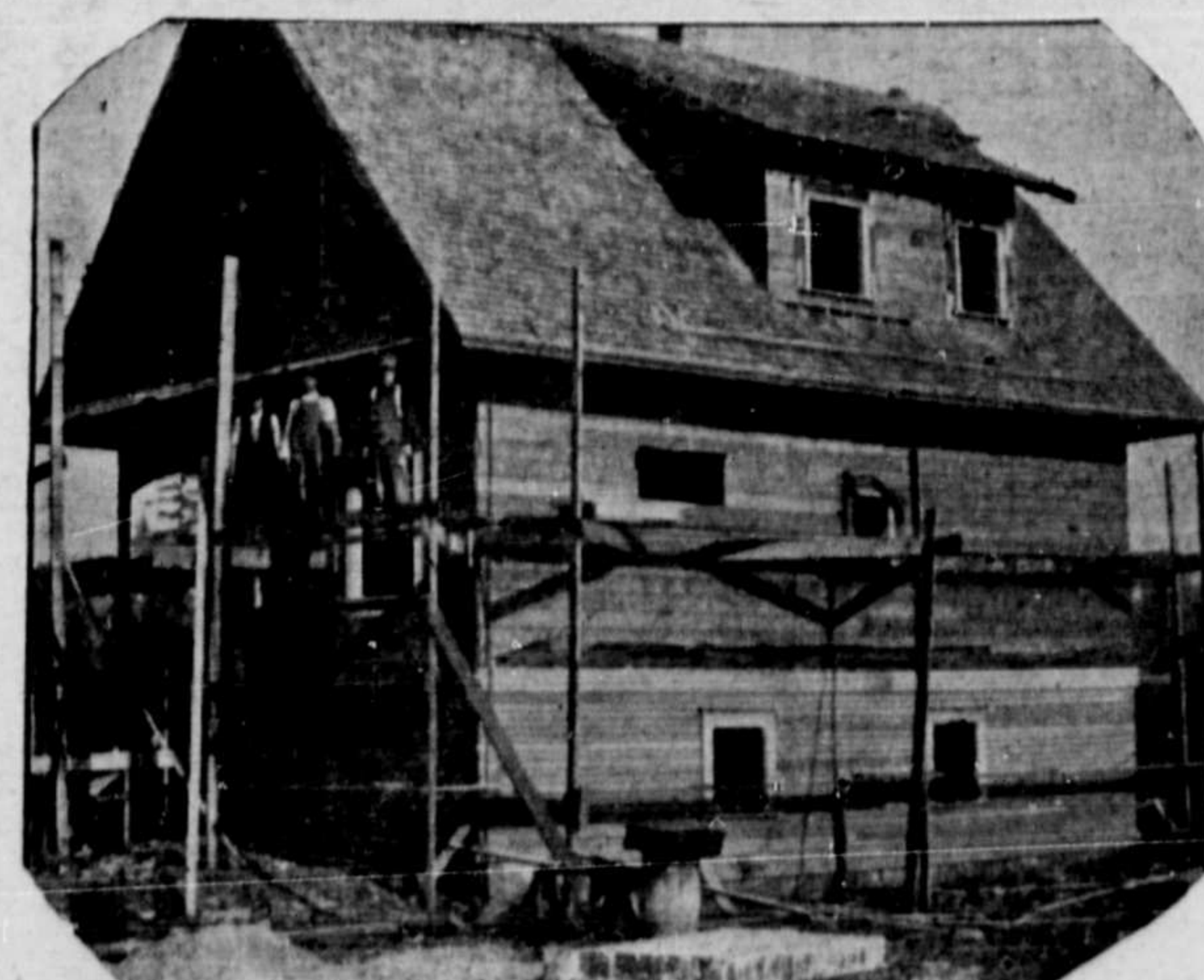
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
