

Naval limitation under the Washington naval treaty of 1922 and the London naval treaty of 1930 ended with expiration of 1836 with likelihood that all nations bound by the agreements will pursue increased building programs. Britain is already launched on naval expansion; Japan denounced the Washing on agreements in 1934 and has added to her list of warcraft: United States, with a number of new light cruisers and submarines already in the water, is committed to greater naval expenditure in 1937. Italy and France are both continuing to increase their navies. The 5-5-3 ratio between Britain, United States and Japan has been repeatedly attacked by the Japs as unfair to their aspirations in the east, and these three nations will lead the competitive building race aimed on the one side of retaining this ratio, on the other of changing it to naval equality. 


