British Ship Riddled By Bullets

Liberals Revive Old Battle Cry Vessel On Mercy Trip From Shanghai Shot on; Japs Insist Their Way

Lower Cost Of Living Aim Of Sir Archibald Sinclair And Cohorts

Challenge View That Wages Are Going Up as Fast as Prices—Would Take Tariffs and Quotas Off People's Food

LONDON, Dec. 4: (CP)—Under the leadership of Sir Archibald Sinclair, Opposition Liberals are organizing a monster petition to Parliament protesting at the high cost of living. Sir Archibald said the Liberals were demanding that the "government should take tariffs and quotas off the people's food." He said the Liberals were challenging the view that wages were rising as quickly as prices.

Railway Track At Pr. George Lost In River

In answer to questions asked by E. E. Winch, C.C.F. member for Burnaby, Premier T. D. Pattullo has informed the Legislature that about forty-three miles of single railway track belonging to the Pacific Great Eastern Railway has been lost by erosion of the Fraser River at Prince George.

Strange Disease Attacks Infants

Ten Are Victims of Acute Epidemic Diarrhea at Chicago Hospital Within Eleven Days

CHICAGO, December 4 (Canadian Press)—Physicians and scientists are waging a concerted fight against a strange disease—diagnosed as enteritis or acute epidemic diarrhea—which has caused the deaths of ten babies and imperilled the lives of eight others during the past eleven days in the infants' ward of St. Elizabeth's Hospital.

Chamber Of Commerce Goes On Record As Favoring Drastic Change In Government Method

Would Decrease Membership of Legislature to Sixteen and Take Away Most of Powers of Provincial Government

Owing to the extremely bad weather last evening the attendance at the monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was very small, only thirteen braving the elements in the service of the commercial interests of the city. In spite of the poor attendance, the thirteen men proceeded to try to upset the constitution of Canada by making recommendations to the Royal Commission on Dominion-provincial relations which, if accepted, would practically abolish the provincial governments of the country by leaving them stranded with almost nothing to do.

MYSTIC OF TIBET DIES

LONDON—Reuters News Agency reports that Panchen Lama, ranking spiritual ruler of Tibet, is dead in Western China after thirteen years of exile from his so-called "forbidden land." He fled in 1924 from the mysterious plateau land after differences with his secular superior, Dalai Lama, who died in 1933.

SWIMMERS FOR WEST

TWO FLIERS KILLED

MIAMI, Florida — Two fire-blackened patches of debris formed mute epitaphs for two of the most daring air race pilots of the United States as Miami's annual air show entered its second day. Late yesterday Rudy Kling of Lemont, Illinois, and Frank Haines of Detroit were killed in crashes, apparently caused by the same down draft.

RECORD SHORT

TORONTO—The Legislature of Ontario prorogued yesterday after the shortest session in the history of the province. It lasted only four hours and three bills were put through.

FIVE BURNED TO DEATH

JAMOTTE, Quebec — A young mother and four children were burned to death yesterday in a fire that destroyed a farm home. The dead are Mrs. Henry Miron and children, all under five years of age. The husband, brother and father of the woman jumped to safety.

Insist on Freedom In International Settlement After Foreign Resistance—Nanking is Definitely Threatened

SHANGHAI, Dec. 4: (CP)—The British steamship Siushan was reported today to have been riddled with bullets from an undetermined source while on a mission of mercy to Japanese-occupied Tsungming Island near Shanghai. The vessel was attempting to rescue nine French-Canadian nuns who had been marooned on the island for three months. Among those on board the 296-ton Siushan were Rev. Adrian Sansoucy, French-Canadian missionary, and B. Boothby, British consular official. Boothby was seeking to rescue the nuns but his efforts were frustrated by machine-gunning. The chief officer, a Chinese, was killed. Several passengers and a sailor were hurt. British authorities say that the Japanese, who have an air base on Tsungming Island, were informed of the voyage in advance. Tsungming is in the mouth of the Yangtze River estuary between Shanghai and the China Sea.

Wheat Exports This Fall Low

Less Than Half of amount Sent Out of Canada Compared With Year Ago

According to a bulletin issued by the federal government, there is a marked falling off in export clearances of wheat from Canadian ports this fall, the figures being less than half what they were last fall. There were no exports from Prince Rupert this fall whereas last year 562,913 bushels went out of here.

HEALTH SCHEME

TORONTO — The Canadian Medical Association, it was announced here yesterday by the general secretary, Dr. A. D. Kelly, will make representations to the Rowell Royal Commission on Dominion-provincial relations, favoring a Dominion-wide health insurance scheme. Information with that end in view is being assembled. The Canadian Medical Association feels that it is inadvisable for the various provinces to have different health insurance schemes.

Veteran Prospector Of Cassiar Country, In Pitiful Condition, Rescued By Provincial Police

Provincial Constable J. Blakeston-Gray and an Indian guide are back at Telegraph Creek, according to a report received at district headquarters here, from a special patrol to Goat Mountain of Kehlechoa River, a tributary of the Stikine above Telegraph Creek, having succeeded in bringing out Hugh Ford, 61-year-old trapper and prospector, original discoverer of placer at Gold Pan Creek, who had been missing for several months. Ford was found to be in a deplorable condition but is recovering at Telegraph Creek from the hardship and privation which he underwent. The patrol took the police officer and his guide twenty-five days and they travelled 406 miles by foot and seventy-three miles by truck. Their journey was through country which has been little traversed by man.

On receipt of reports from other prospectors that Ford was missing somewhere in that country and was very poorly equipped, the police officer and the native set out in quest for him. Finally at timber line of Goat Mountain they heard dogs barking and it was there that they located Ford in a small draw. He was in a pitiful condition and a veritable "living scarecrow" the officer's report says. He told the officer that he had been living on nothing but moose meat for six months. He had no flour, salt or tea. His clothes were in tatters and virtually falling off him. He was walking around in six inches of snow with not even socks on his feet. His only shelter was a rotten fly His bedding consisted of two old blankets and he also had a worn-out rifle. Ford told Constable Blakeston-Gray that he had thought to "tough it out" until Christmas, having become much interested in some mining ground there. It was evident, however, that, had he not been found, he would have soon succumbed to privation and exposure with winter coming on. Ford has been in the Cassiar country since 1916. He is not unknown in Prince Rupert.

Unfortunately, owing to a slight indisposition, William Rudland, chief councillor of our village, Metlakatla, B.C., is unable to be with us and I have been requested by him to convey to you all our heartfelt congratulations on this historic occasion."

"The people of Metlakatla, B.C., remembering our common origin look with pride and kinship at the wonderful progress made by you here in Alaska. We hope this progress will continue in the future in ever greater measure than in the past."

"Although I am no stranger to your town, having been raised here, there are new faces to me, some I do not know."

WOMAN FACTOR

Madame Chiang Kai-Shek Will Have To Be Reckoned With Before Japanese Win War

NEW YORK, Dec. 4. (CP)—Before the Japanese soldiery complete their conquest of China they will have to conquer a woman—their most dangerous adversary next to General Chiang Kai-Shek.

She is no fierce amazon but a dainty, soft-spoken and demure little person with a big brain and a world of initiative. She is Gen. Chiang's wife. To all intents and purposes she is joint-dictator with her husband of China's 450,000,000 people.

One speaks literally in saying this woman is taking an active part in the war. Apart from other things, she actually is commander-in-chief of China's air force.

As might be expected, she has a diversity of accomplishments and activities. She is first lady of the land, home-maker, shrewd watcher over her husband's delicate health, his chief adviser in affairs of state and envoy extraordinary.

When she isn't directing the air force, or doing some equally important work, she may be writing poetry. She employs either Chinese or English. The latter language she speaks with an American accent due to her long residence in the United States.

Madame Chiang converted her husband to Christianity and it is said this is the great influence in his life.

When Chiang was a captive of rebels at Sian a year ago, she took matters into her hands and flew to him in one of his private planes. She played a big part in obtaining his release and in persuading the rebels to come into his camp.

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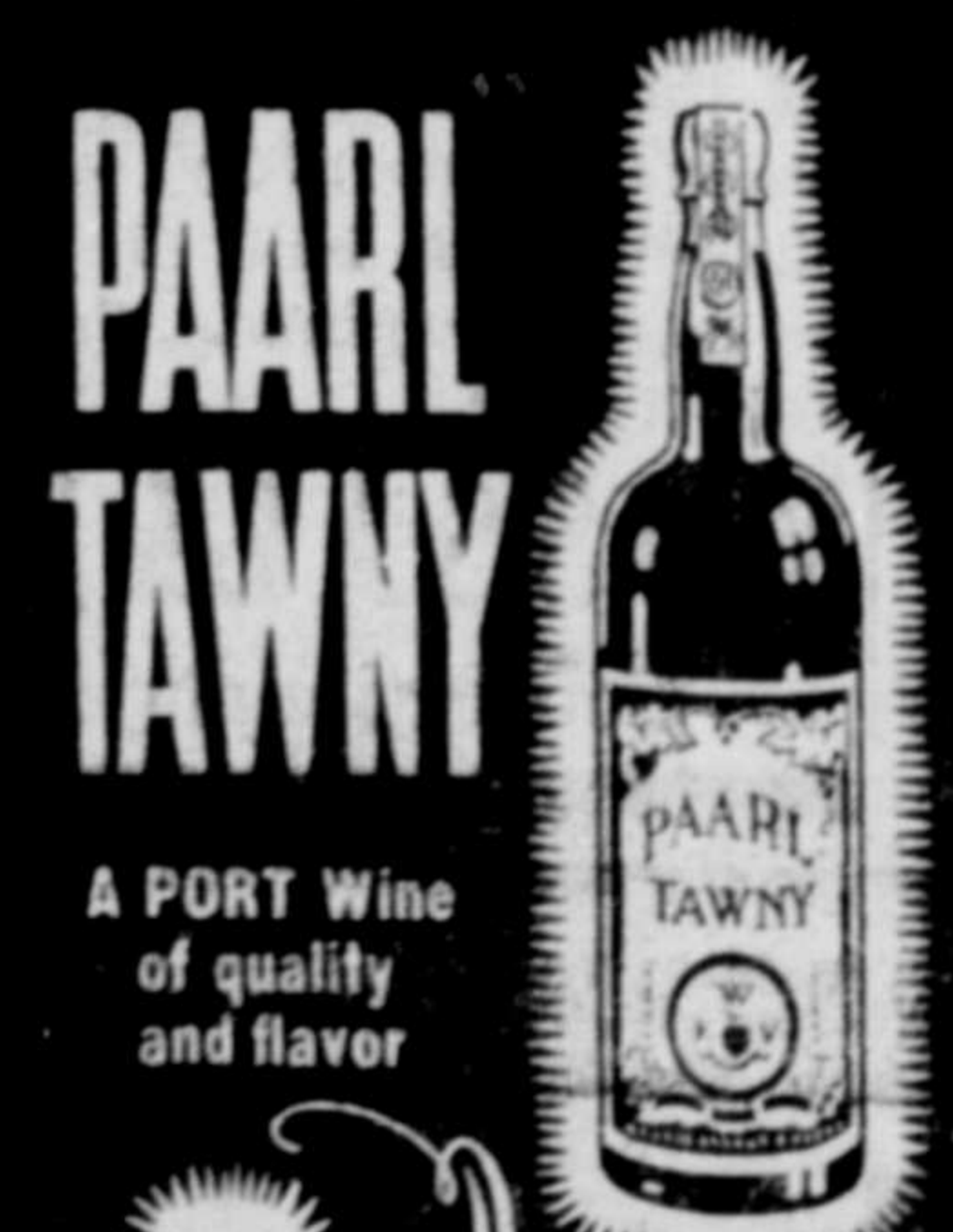

Synopsis of Land Act

VACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaration of intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement.

Full information concerning Pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B. C.; Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria, or any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i. e., carrying over 5000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 1500 feet per acre west of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emption carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted.

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre.

Further information is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

As a partial relief measure, restricted lands may be acquired by pre-emption on equal payments, with the first payment suspended for two years, provided taxes made during the first two years of not less than 10% of the appraised value.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stampage.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 200 acres, may be leased as homestead conditions may apply, a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under grazing regulations administered from time to time to meet varying conditions. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in grazing privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

Their Majesties, Queen Mary, the Duke and Duchess of Kent, the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester and perhaps one or two close relatives, will dine together on Christmas day in the traditional family manner in the house Edward VII bought as a "home" for his lovely Queen Alexandra, the Danish Princess.

Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret Rose are to figure in the important ceremony of the Christmas tree and are hoping that they may be allowed this year to assist in its decoration.

Each year during King George V's reign a huge evergreen tree was cut and set up in the big Sandringham drawing room. WARY OF COLONIES

Lord Cecil Not Inclined to Trust Germany With Negro Masses

NEW YORK, Dec. 4: (CP)—Viscount Cecil of Chelwood, one of Great Britain's elder statesmen and recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize for 1937, favors a general settlement between the "have" and the "have-not" powers in the interests of peace. Seated before a wood fire in the home of Thomas Lamont, financier, Lord Cecil discussed with reporters the problems offered the world by Germany and Japan and guardedly suggested an examination of the colonial problem.

The attitude of the present regime in Germany to racial questions, he said, would constitute an obstacle to the return of colonies as it differs from the liberal policy of British administrations. "I would be reluctant to see the transfer of masses of negroes back to Germany today," he said. "I would favor the return of colonies being discussed and some solution aimed at," he added, "possibly the abolition of individual ownership of these undeveloped territories."

Waterfront Whiffs

Fur Flying Here—Liberty Loving Spec-ies Moving From Ethiopia and China —Alberni Near Completion of Overhaul

These may be quiet days as far as fishing in concerned but all is not dull along the Prince Rupert waterfront. Now we think of a certain grocery store which has become something of a fur trading centre and may well be called Prince Rupert's fur exchange. Here it is that the fur flies as the buyers vie with each other to beat out even the New York prices. Here it has even been said you may go in with the idea of buying yourself a pound of tea, coffee or butter but, if you haven't got your wits about you, you may find yourself coming out instead with a first class fur. Yes, fur is the thing these days. And, talking about furs, the buyers had the surprise of their lives a few days ago when a bunch of very strange skins was brought in. They were known to naturalists as Ethiopian civit cats (the Abyssinian variety of skunk to you, dear readers). In all earnestness, the trapper responsible for this catch is reported to have said that even the liberty-loving civit cats no longer relish the fertile plains of Ethiopia. The next we will be hearing, we suppose, will be that the musk deer, also known for their perfume giving propensities, will be moving out of North China. Yes, Prince Rupert is indeed making a name for itself as a fur centre, to say nothing of tall stories and flights of imagination.

Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, sailed Thursday night on the Prince George for Vancouver. He, with members of the staff of the Nanaimo Biological Station, will give a course of lectures for fishermen at Port Alberni. Dr. Carter's subject will have to do with the preservation of fish after being caught and before delivery to shore. He is due back here about the middle of December and, with John Dybhavn, will be leaving on December 7 for Ottawa to attend the annual meeting of the Biological Board of Canada.

Albert Farrow, steamboat inspector, arrived in the city on the Princess Adelaide yesterday afternoon from Vancouver to complete inspection of the lighthouse tender Alberni which has been at the local dry dock for the past month or so undergoing repairs and annual overhaul. Mr. Farrow will be returning to Vancouver about the middle of next week.

Capt. Lorne Godfrey has assumed duty as pilot of the steamer Cardena which was in port last evening.

Jeffrey White of Massett, who was in Vancouver with his fishing boat Waterfall, figured in an attempted rescue incident during the thick fog at Vancouver on Tuesday evening of this week and nearly lost his own life as he attempted to save that of another man. Frank Myers, watchman for the Canadian Fishing Co. at Vancouver, had fallen from the fog from the company's dock at the foot of Gore Avenue. Terribly injured, Myers feebly called for help and his cries were heard by White, who was on his boat moored nearby. White, after calling for help, proceeded to assist Myers and himself missed his footing and fell into the water. A constable caught him by the hair of his head and brought him ashore. White was none the worse for his experience.

Myers died of the spinal and internal injuries which he sustained.

Announcement is made of the appointment of M. J. K. Allen, prominent Vancouver shipping and business man, as vice-president of the Union Steamships Ltd. Mr. Allen figured prominently in a recent change in ownership of the company. Harold Brown is president of the company.

Owing to last night's storm, C.N.R. stamer Prince John, Captain Nell McLean, did not sail until 9:30 this morning for Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Sea, Capt. A. W. Nickerson, is due in port tomorrow from Ketchikan, bringing in a couple of carloads of frozen fish for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways. This will be the first call here of the North Sea following the recent week's tie-up of the vessel at Seattle owing to a strike of cooks and waiters.

Kitkatla Girl's Funeral Held

Funeral Rites Last Saturday For Irene Innes Who Died Recently

KITKATLA, Dec. 4.—The late Miss Irene Innes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Innes, who passed away recently was laid at rest Saturday under the auspices of the Kitkatla Excelsior Club. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. C. H. Goodreed. The Kitkatla Concert Band also took part in the rites. Four members of the Kitkatla Excelsior Club and two visitors from Massett acted as pallbearers. Many floral tributes were sent by friends and various societies of the village. The boat Quinisa was used to take the funeral party to Cemetery Island.
