"THINKING BOX"

A Lancashire-made box which can "almost think" is Aid Elect Its one of the marvels of the most important traffic control system in the world, which has been installed in and around Picadilly Circus, London, to do the work of about twenty point-duty policemen.

Piccadilly Circus, with six busy traffic arteries leading into it, and two intersections only a few yards away. presents the most complex traffic problem ever encountered. It is not sufficient for traffic to operate the rubber pads which change the lights. The volume of traffic passing every point must be measured, and the "green" and san "red" times must be adjusted accordingly. Hence the mechanical 'master mind' which has been installed near the junction of Piccadilly and Regent Street, London.

Three mechanical "spies" have been installed at the entrance to Regent Street. Shafteshary Avenue, and the Orderion corner. 



PRE-EMPTIONS

TACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement.

Pull information concerning Pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information. Victoria, or any Government Agent. Records will be granted covering only tand suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and \$.000 feet per acre west of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emptions carrying part time condi-

tions of occupation are also granted. PURCHASE OR LEASE Applications are received for purchase vacant and unreserved Crown lands, being timberland, for agricultural


