A NEW REBEL GOVERNMENT IS FORMED IN CHINA

SALE OF SECTION TWO PROPERTY BROUGHT CLOSE TO \$600,000

Property Averaged a Little Over \$1,000 a Lot---Proposal to Recognize the Services of the Auctioneer With a Present of Two Lots Proved Very Popular

The five hundred and eighty lots sold in section two by the G.T.P. fetched nearly \$600,000. Expectations of those who predicted that the lots would fetch half a million were bettered by \$73,335, the sum total of the prices bid being \$573,335.

The two best lots in the section lots 10, block 6 and 78, block 20, commanding the entrance to Second, Atlin and Moresby Avenues in section two went for \$5,200 and \$6,575, being bought by V. Casley of the Empress Hotel and Wilfrid Grattan of Vancouver.

At the end of the sale the last two lots offered, lots 101 and 102 block 20, were withdrawn, the idea being that the G.T.P. heads at Montreal be informed of the suggestion made by Ald. Clayton and heartily approved by the assemblage of buyers, that these two lots be either presented to Auctioneer Frank Ellis or sold to him at the upset price of \$700 in recognition of his undoubtedly excellent services at the sale. THE STEAMER TEES IS RESCUED

Was Located by the Tug William Joliffe in Kyuquot Sound Late Saturday Afternoon---Crew and Passengers Are All Saved LIFEBOAT WAS PICKED UP IN THE FOG

Crew Were Trying to Reach the Estevan Wireless Station, But Lost Their Way in the Fog---They Piloted the Joliffe to the Stranded Ship---The Tees Had Stripped Her Propellor in Striking Rock---Passengers on Short Rations

(Special to The Daily News)
 Victoria, Dec. 4.—The steamer Tees is afloat and all on board are well. They are now on their way here on the tug William Joliffe. Late on Saturday afternoon the William Joliffe after gaining entrance to Kyuquot Sound, picked up the lifeboat and crew of the Tees who on Wednesday morning left their ship to get to Estevan wireless station. They had lost their way in the fog and been without food since and were all in bad shape. They piloted the Joliffe to the stranded ship.

It appears the Tees injured her propellor and bent her rudder post on Wednesday while passing Clay Pits. She struck a submerged rock, then slid off and anchored. After the first call of distress the wireless ceased to work. Her crew and passengers were put on two meals a day as rations were low. The passengers were transferred to the tug Salvor and will reach here during the day.

THE CHINESE REBEL ARMY HOIST FLAG OVER NANKING

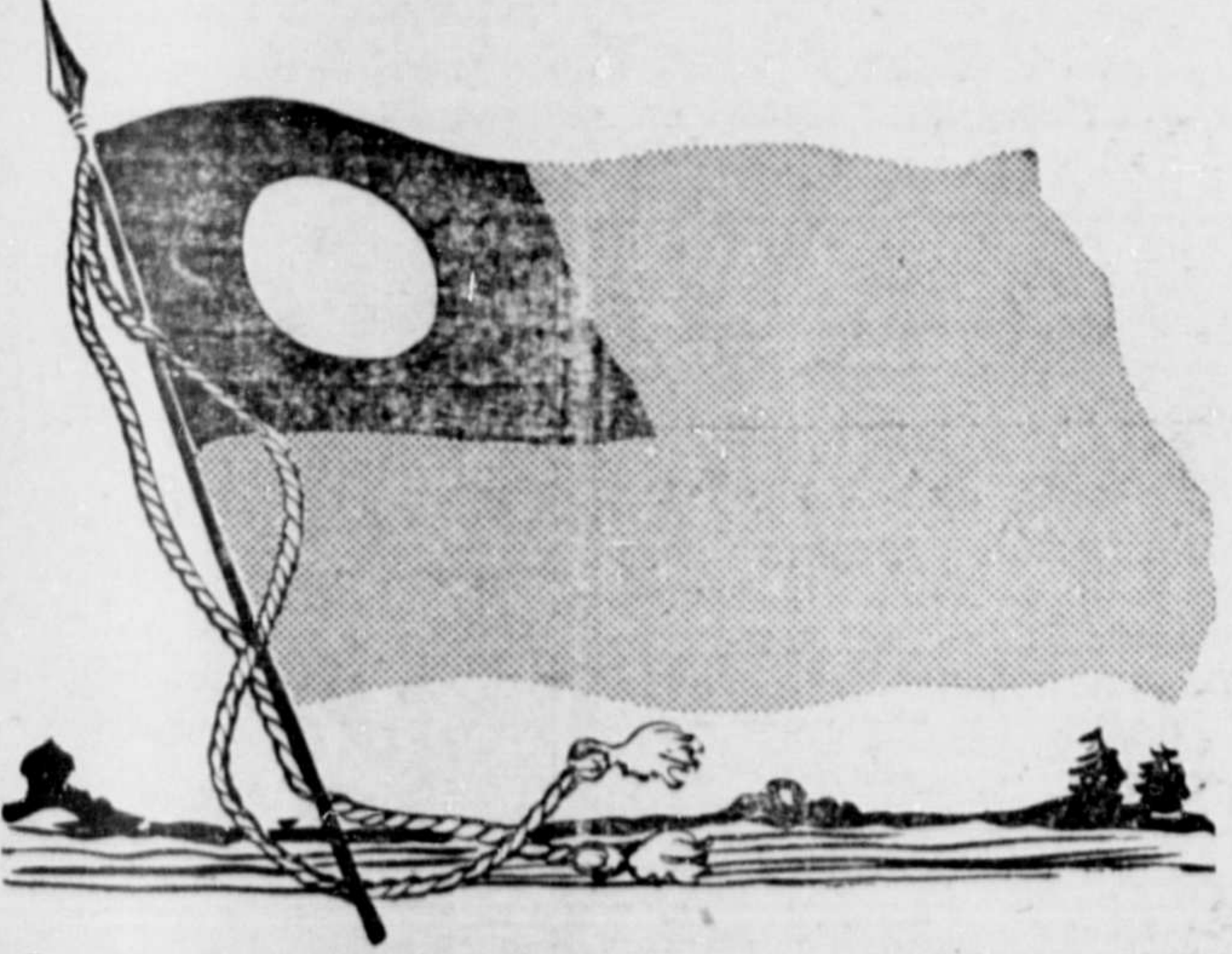
Have Formed a Government with Premier and Council—Imperial Viceroy and General Take Flight—Japan Will Intervene

AN EXPRESSION OF CONFIDENCE IN RUPERT

The sale of section two property evoked the best expression of confidence in the future of Prince Rupert that has yet been shown. Sentiment in the mouths of the multitude is often a cheap thing, but there is always sincerity in the act of the real estate purchaser who plunks down his dollars and lets them speak his mind for him.

The satisfactory prices received and the continued stiffening of the market during the sale showed that the market was not keyed up by momentary excitement or passing enthusiasm. 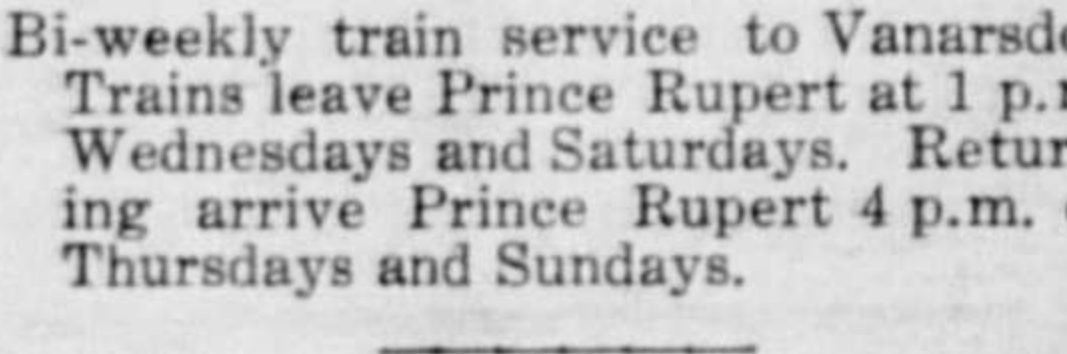

A MEDAL WANTED.

Dear Sir: In 1908 the Minister of Education told the chairman of the Chilliwack School Board that the Governor General's bronze medals were given "where there was the most or the greatest competition at the high school entrance examination."

Last July Prince Rupert passed eight pupils at this examination and its best scholar got 685 marks, yet it got no medal. Lady-smith passed seven pupils and its best pupil got only 634 marks, yet it got a medal. Cumberland passed only six pupils and its best scholar got only 672 marks, but it also got a medal.

This proves that Prince Rupert had a better claim to a bronze medal than either of those places.
