## THREE DIE IN CRASH

Provincial Airplane Meets Disaster When Attempting to Off in Dense London Fog

LONDON, Nov. 27: (CP)—Encountering to take off in a dense fog last night, a German airplane crashed and burst into flames, three occupants being killed. For the second night London and other parts of England were blanketed by one of the heaviest fogs in years. The great fog still curtailed half of England today, choking transportation and endangering motorists and pedestrians for the third day. Weather officials, saying that this was one of the worst fogs ever recorded in the country, predicted it would continue over the week-end.

At least ten deaths were attributed to the fog up to today. In addition to those who perished in the crash of the German plane as it attempted to leave fogbound London airport, other fatalities included three falling into reservoirs and rivers and four motorists being in a suburban London crash.

## CONDEMNED TO DEATH

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Nov. 27: (CP)—Five convicts were found guilty by a jury here late yesterday of the first degree murder last member of Warden Clarence Larson of Folsom Penitentiary. The verdict automatically involves imposition of the death penalty.

## Electric Light Plant Turned On

Streets of Port Simpson Are Now Illuminated

Last night at Port Simpson the new electric light plant was opened with about sixty-five 100 watt street lights in place. This will be increased in a few days to about 85 lights.

Shortly, some halls, church, and some houses will be connected up. There is ample capacity to take care of about sixty homes.

A new pole line of about 100 poles has been completed in the village and the wires are in place. All was done by voluntary native labor in good shape. The concrete foundation for the plant, addition to the building and the placing of the plant on the foundation was also taken care of by the villagers.

The plant is a full diesel four-cylinder 38 h.p. Lister (English) engine, directly connected on one base to a Canadian Westinghouse 25 K. W. 125 volt D. C. generator with control switchboard and various circuit control switches.

Tom Moorehouse, engineer of the Indian Department boat Naskaena, made the test run for the engine and the electrical installation was made by W. R. Love, Hoffer's Ltd. of Vancouver supplied the plant.

Tom Gosnell, chief councillor of the village, personally was in charge of the large number of native workers who did such a complete job in connection with the installation of the work.

## Resignation Is Accepted

But Dr. Hjalmar Schacht Remains as Power in German Financial Affairs

BERLIN, Nov. 27: (CP)—Official acceptance by Chancellor Adolf Hitler of the resignation of Dr. Hjalmar Schacht as minister of economics was announced last night. Dr. Schacht will, however, remain as president of the Reichsbank, minister without portfolio and personal adviser to Hitler.

FARMERS BEING ADVISED TO WINTER STOCK—HEIFERS AND COWS BEING SOLD  
VANCOUVER, Nov. 27—There is practically no demand for steers on the Vancouver cattle market and ranchers are being advised to winter them. Yesterday forty-five head were sold here, heifers bringing from \$3.50 to \$4.25 and cows from \$2.50 to \$3.50.

CANTERBURY, England, Nov. 27: (CP)—Frank Woolley may retire from first-class cricket after next year. Playing for Kent County club since 1907, he performed in 52 consecutive test matches—29 against Australia.

## HIS ATTEMPT TO LEAVE PALESTINE BLOCKED

## OLD MAN BYLAW IS EXECUTED WITHHELD

APPEAL TO MILITARY GOVERNOR OF PALESTINE ON BEHALF OF AGED ARAB FAILS  
JERUSALEM, Nov. 28: (CP)—A final appeal to the British military governor on behalf of the 60-year-old Arab, sentenced to be hanged on a charge of terrorism, failing, Shiek Farhan Saidi, alleged trouble maker of the Holy Land, went to the gallows today in the ancient fortress of the Crusaders at Acre, the first to face capital punishment under the new military court martial to curb terrorism. Saidi had been hunted for more than a year. Evident determination of the British authorities to make an example is not expected to relieve the present tenseness in Palestine.

## Former President Of Cuba Arrested

GENERAL MACHADO TAKEN INTO CUSTODY ON EXTRADITION WARRANT IN NEW YORK  
NEW YORK, Nov. 27: (CP)—General Gerardo Machado, former president of Cuba, was arrested yesterday in a New York Hospital on an extradition warrant charging him with murder, embezzlement and other offences in Cuba. The extradition hearing will take place shortly. Machado had been living in exile in Canada before coming to the United States for medical treatment. The charges against him have been laid by the present Cuban government.

## STEAMER IS GONE

Only Jettisoned Cargo of British Steamer Nollington Court Still Remains Afloat

MIAMI, Nov. 27: (CP)—Floating logs and other bits of jettisoned cargo were the only trace left yesterday of the British freighter Nollington Court, bound from Vancouver to Shanghai, which sank after having struck a submerged object off the Island of Haiti earlier in the week. The vessel ripped a great hole in her hull. The tug Killereg made rescue of seventeen members of the crew who had remained aboard the Nollington Court after eighteen others had been rescued by the British steamer Chagres. The vessel floundered in the rough seas.

## NATIVE RIGHTS

"Flying Bishop" Sees Better Deal For Indians Following Conference in Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 27: (CP)—Following a conference yesterday with Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King and Hon Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, Rt. Rev. Gabriel Brynart O.M.I., known as "The Flying Bishop" of Mackenzie, expressed confidence that early action would be taken by the federal government to remove present prejudices against the Indians of Canada and to establish them in their own trades.

## CONTROL EXTENDED

All Communication Facilities of Shanghai Now Taken Over by Japanese

SHANGHAI, Nov. 28: (CP)—The Japanese yesterday took over control of all communication facilities hitherto held by the Chinese government in the international settlement as well as native parts of the city.  
Post offices, telegraph, radio administrations and broadcasting stations were placed under Japanese rule but it was not indicated whether Japan planned to establish cable and radio offices communicating with foreign countries. Nor was it indicated whether there would be a postal censorship.  
Great Britain's Rights  
LONDON, Nov. 27: (CP)—The British ambassador to Tokyo, Sir Robert Craigie, was today instructed to make clear to the Japanese government that Great Britain insists that her rights be consulted in any arrangements the Japanese may make regarding Chinese maritime customs. It is understood that France and the United States are taking similar action.

## Wheat Market Came Too Easy

Miss Cora Hind Gives Some Frank Talk in Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, Nov. 27: (CP)—Miss Cora Hind, well-known agricultural writer, who recently made a world tour, reminded the annual meeting of the United Grain Growers that while Canada grows the best wheat in the world, the world does not have to buy Canadian wheat.

Answering the question as to what could be done about it, Miss Hind suggested Canada's great trouble was that following the first export shipment of wheat almost 53 years ago, the matter of obtaining an export market had been too easy a conquest.  
There had been no steady campaign to keep the world thinking it must have Canadian wheat. Moreover, Canada had not kept posted on what the other countries were doing by way of improving quality and yield of its own wheat.  
It was significant, said the speaker, that one of their methods was by crossing the best quality of domestic winter wheats with Canadian Marquis and Reward varieties. In Roumania, as in other countries, the goal aimed at was to beat No. 1 Manitoba Hard Wheat.

## Aged Woman Eludes Mob

Death of Young Bride Led to Belief A Spell Had Been Placed on Her

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana, Nov. 27: (CP)—The death of a bride of three days resulted in the mobbing of a 71-year-old woman here. The cortege was gathering for the funeral of Mrs. Mavis Shervington, who died three days after her marriage, when Stephanie Cummings, 71, was compelled to run for safety.  
She was pursued by a mob which alleged that she had "thrown powder" on the bride as she was entering the church. The old woman took refuge in a house 100 yards from the scene of the funeral. She was rescued by Sergt.-Major D. N. Hughes of the police who rebuked the people for their behavior and escorted the woman to safety.

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EDITORIAL

THE STOCK MARKET AND GAMBLING

As long as people are able to buy and sell stocks there will be market slumps with plenty of sore speculators and there will be times when people can make money buying securities. The bears and the bulls will take their turns at being active and, after the bulls, will always, sooner or later, come bears. For every move up, there is always a move down.

People who play the stock market are betting against the world. It is a species of gambling which is no more injurious than horse racing because the market is tempered by the large number of serious investors who buy securities for the dividends they get with the possibility of selling when they need the money.

Merchants who stick strictly to their own business and do not play the market also have to gamble. Last spring some local merchants bought summer goods on the chance of being able to sell them. As there was no summer to speak of they were left with much of the goods on their hands. It was a bear market. They speculated and lost. Another time a merchant may stock up heavily on a rising market and make a killing. He is then simply a winner in a huge gamble. Naturally, good judgment also enters into transactions of trade and commerce but chance is a large factor for success or failure.

When a man buys life insurance he is betting against the life insurance companies that he will die before he has paid in enough money in premiums to pay for the amount of the insurance policy. If he dies he wins. If he lives to be an old man, the insurance company wins. Fire insurance is somewhat similar. When I insure my house I am betting with the insurance company that the house will burn down and the company bets it won't. As usually the house does not burn down, the chances are strongly with the company. That is why fire insurance is so cheap.

It matters little to the average stock gambler that the stock market may be manipulated by a pool of large investors. These are the chances taken when the stocks are purchased. Every stock gambler would pool the market if he could. Just now we do not know why securities are cheap with money also cheap but it is a fact and nobody seems to wish to take a chance on it. That is what keeps the prices down. People for the time being have lost confidence. They fear the prices may go yet lower and they may be right. No one can say what will happen but there is always a lowest point.

Oyster Farm is New Fisheries Venture—Construction of New Oil Plant on Local Waterfront Starts—Herring Fishing Slows Up

An interesting fisheries venture in Prince Rupert district about which not a great deal has been heard is William Brown's oyster farm on Stephens' Island, outside of Prince Rupert Harbor, which this week made its first shipment of oysters to the Shellfish Packing Co. of Prince Rupert. It was about three years ago that this undertaking

was commenced. The oysters, it is stated, have thrived there and henceforth it is expected to make regular consignments to Prince Rupert. Capt. Vic Markland is packing the oysters in. The venture is the first of its kind in the Prince Rupert district and its progress will be followed with interest. Later some of the product will be canned in the new plant of the Shellfish Packing Co. at Prince Rupert. The oysters arriving this week were disposed of on the local retail market.

W. E. Drake, local manager of Edward Lipsett Ltd., expects to be leaving towards the end of next week for his annual business trip to Vancouver and Seattle. He will be accompanied by Mrs. Drake.

A start was made this week on the fuel station of the Standard Oil Co. of British Columbia on the Prince Rupert waterfront. The first part of the construction work to be carried out is the erection of buildings on the shore in connection with which the contractors, Armour Salvage Co., are being assisted by Mitchell & Currie.
