TROUBLE WITH NAAS RIVER INDIANS REPORTED

BRITISH TORPEDO FLOTILLA WENT OUT TO SINK GERMANS

SENSATIONAL STORY TOLD BRITISH PRESS BY COL. SETON OF THE NATIONAL SERVICE LEAGUE—WERE WITHIN AN ACE OF ANGLIO-GERMAN WAR.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
London, Dec. 5.—Col. Seton, honorary organizer of the National Service League, has caused a sensation by stating that during the recent crisis with Germany that the Germans had a torpedo flotilla outside the Firth of Forth and that a British torpedo flotilla went out each night with direct orders from the Admiralty to sink the German flotilla on sight if it came across it during its patrol. At the same time a British fleet lay inside the Forth with lights extinguished, nets down and guns and torpedo tubes loaded. A British torpedo flotilla was also cruising off the German coast.

NEW WING NEEDED NOW FOR GENERAL HOSPITAL

BOARD WILL CALL FOR COMPETITIVE PLANS FROM ARCHITECTS IN CITY—SUCCESSFUL DESIGNER WILL DO WORK. GOVERNMENT TO BE ASKED FOR \$10,000 GRANT.

The most important item in the business of the hospital board yesterday afternoon was the proposal made that the Government be approached to grant a contribution of \$10,000 toward the building of a new wing to the present hospital, and the city be asked for another \$10,000, the hospital board holding themselves responsible for the furnishing and equipment of the new wing.

Mayor Manson was present and assured the board that he believed the Government would most assuredly give a handsome grant and that he would use his own best influence to get the \$10,000 to be asked for. As for the civic grant he was not prepared to say much beyond that he believed the city could afford next year to give, say, \$8,000 or \$10,000 and that the new wing would cost less than the present building.

A committee of the board will arrange to call for competitive plans from the architects of the city.

A motion by Messrs. Palmer and Scott thanking Mr. Dennis for his unsparing services in getting subscriptions and organizing the establishment of the John Houston ward was passed unanimously.

Applications were received from Misses H. Campbell of Big Bar and Lillian McLeod of Seattle for posts as probationers. These were referred to the house committee. The matter of the scale of salary to be paid the janitor during his illness contracted while at work was a matter of discussion postponed until later.

RAILWAY BRIDGE BEGAN NEAR HOLE-IN-THE-WALL

Fine Steel and Concrete Bridge Will Span the Exchum-sicks River—Johnson, Carey and Helmers Will Construct the Bridge

At "Hole in the Wall," Mile 59, work has begun on the G. T. P. railway bridge over the Exchum-sick river. The sub-contract for the work has been secured from Messrs. Foley, Welch & Stewart by Messrs. Johnson, Carey and Helmers, bridge building engi-

neers of St. Paul. A start was made last week on the casings for the concrete piers. There will be three of these to span the river. The bridge will be a strongly built steel affair of handsome design something similar to the permanent bridge that now spans Zanardi rapids.

ALD. NEWTON QUITS THE COUNCIL

Says He Will Leave Them Now to do "Their Own Crooked Business in Their Own Crooked Way," and Marches from Room

TROUBLE OVER A LUMBER CONTRACT

The Alderman Accused the Board of Works of Not Purchasing from the Lowest Tenderer, and When Advised by Ald. Hilditch to "Take a Dose of Salts", Says He Will Not Stay to be Insulted at the Council Table

The long delayed but inevitable thing has happened. Alderman Seville Martineau Newton has finally broken from his colleagues, and withdrawn from the City Council. The parting took place last night. "I will leave you to do your own crooked business in your own crooked way," he said as he stalked from the council board. He also intimated that he would take "other means" to let the people know what he thought of the council.

Row Over Contract.

The trouble arose over the letting of a contract for lumber for the city and fire halls. The contract was awarded, without Ald. Newton's knowledge to the Lester David Co., of Vancouver, who were higher on some items than some of the other tenderers, but who quoted for the complete bill as instructed. The Swanson Bay Sawmill Co. sent a letter of protest against the manner in which the contract had been awarded.

Ald. Newton worked it out that the Westholme Co., who were only \$28 behind on a 90,000 ft. lum-

The Trouble Started

"Oh, Mr. Mayor, don't let him waste our time with these harangues of his. Show him the figures and let him understand. He is only talking by hearsay," interrupted Alderman Hilditch.

"It's all very well for you to talk of waste of time when anyone tries to criticise your doings," retorted Alderman Newton. "I am ready to sit at this council board from Monday morning to Saturday night if I can get anyone to sit with me in order to give plenty of time to consider these matters of city business." He went on talking about the lumber.

A Dose of Salts.

Alderman Hilditch corrected some of his figures and said to Alderman Newton directly: "You just want to take a dose of salts." "We are not here to discuss doses of salts," replied Alderman Newton, angrily, and then turning to the Mayor: "Mr. Mayor, will you not stop that man from insulting me with his dirty insin-

uations regarding doses of salts at this council board?"

"The one of you seems to me as bad as the other," said the Mayor.

Left the Chamber.

At this Alderman Newton, boiling over with indignation, rose and departed from the council table, saying he was done with the council. "I leave you to do your crooked business in your own crooked ways," he said, "and will take other means of informing the public."

Alderman Hilditch, explaining his figures, said the Lester David Co.'s tender was lowest in the lump sum, and Alderman Kirkpatrick remarked that the committee had wished to give the contract to the Westholme Lumber Co. because they were located in the city and paid rates, etc., but had abandoned the idea lest people would accuse them of favoring the Westholme people. Alderman Morrissey said that graft charges or no graft charges he thought the Works Committee in this case had acted squarely in the interests of the city.

WHY "STATION GANGS" ONLY?

From its inception the hydro-electric scheme, an excellent enough project, has been under suspicion of being used as a tool for political purposes. The promoters of the scheme again and again act so as to excite instead of allay suspicion. The latest incident is the decision to have the pipe trench cutting done "by station gangs only."

It is a matter of indifference to the average ratepayer how the work is done so long as it is done expeditiously and economically and without injustice to the workmen engaged. For that reason the unusual stipulation that the work is to be done by station gang only, and that the station gangs are to be prohibited from engaging laborers, sounds like a scheme to bar out both the contractors and the station gangs from doing the work.

Despite the provision that the work is to be done by station gangs only, it is understood that the City Engineer is to be allowed to tender. It does not matter how much he undercuts the station gangs, for the citizens will have to make good any deficit on his tender, just as they are now making good his deficit over the retaining walls, which the City Engineer reported could be built for \$8,000.

The whole scheme looks like one more desperate effort to fool the station gangs and the citizens and inaugurate a civic day labor payroll for January. If the work is to be done by "station gangs only," why is the City Engineer, whose tenders are irresponsible, to be allowed to compete? If the City Engineer is to be allowed to compete, then why not the contractors, also? Their tenders are responsible tenders.

If the Board of Works wants to have day labor on the waterworks, why not come out honestly and say so, and fight for day labor in the open?

EAT LESS AND GROW FAT

That is the Theory of a Food Reform Advocate in Toronto.

How would you like to do without your breakfast for six years? Not as a punishment or a penance, but as a voluntary act with a view to improving your health and incidentally adding to your avoirdupois.

Mr. F. C. Wilson of the Toronto Food Reform League says he has done without his breakfast since the spring of 1905, and, as a consequence, has felt stronger, added to his weight and his brain worked better.

Mr. Wilson gave his reasons. The human machine was more than the mere physical body; it was an aggregation of living, conscious cells, and each organ of the body was a separate, performing a life duty of its own.

If one kept the stomach constantly working it would get tired and rebel. It had no opportunity to recuperate. It was not a calamity, as some people supposed, for the stomach to become empty and idle. The stomach was not a furnace to be eternally stoked.

With two meals a day, he said, the assimilation was more complete. He said he gained twenty-five pounds in the first five weeks of the no-breakfast period.
