WHY "STATION GANGS" ONLY?

If the Board of Works wants to have day labor on the waterworks, why not come out honestly and say so, and fight for day labor in the open?

COMPENSATION CASE

Frank Miller Secures Damages From J. E. Bostrom.

Before Mr. Justice Clement yesterday mornig in the Supreme Court Frank Miller sued J. E. 2nd Ave. between 10th and 11th Sts Bostrom for damages. The Judge dismissed the case in common law, but assessed compensation under the Workmen's Compensation Act at \$10 per week during disability, total damages not to exceed \$1,500.
