#### THE UNKNOWN

We are all accustomed to the present condition of affairs and we have no experience to guide us in any except in Russia, Italy, Germany and a few other less important countries. In Italy and Germany they still have capitalism although their government is controlled by the so-called National Socialist party. In Russia they have another dictorship which followed a revolution in which the Communist Party took charge and tried to work out a form of government. This has gradually changed since the beginning. Those who refused to change to a form of state capitalism being now dubbed Trotskyites or wreckers and are shot or sent to prison camps. In neither country is there that equality for which the originators hoped.

The result of the experiments is that today people are fearful of any form of socialism because of the danger of its leading to a dictatorship in which regimentation becomes oppressive. In this country the Communists object Phone 18 and 84 to National Socialism but they still cling to the idea that the form of government now in force in Russia is a good Free Gift Tokens one. They refuse to recognize that it is not socialism and not communism and that the people are little better under it than they formerly were under Czarism. Some people are better off and many people are much worse

In bringing about changes in government or forms MUSSALLEM'S of government we are all groping in the dark. Everyone would like a better system were it not for the danger of getting something worse instead of better. It is easy to sit back and work out a system but putting it in practice is a totally different task.




