ALL IS NORMA

Mild Weather For New Year's With Heavy Rain Extending Far Into Interior

New Year's Eve sees heavy rain throughout Prince Rupert district, extending for a distance of three hundred miles into the interior as far as Burns Lake, according to the Government Telegraphs daily weather report.

Transportation and communication facilities in and out of Prince Rupert are normal in contrast with conditions which are reported from the south of the province where deep snows have paralyzed some services.

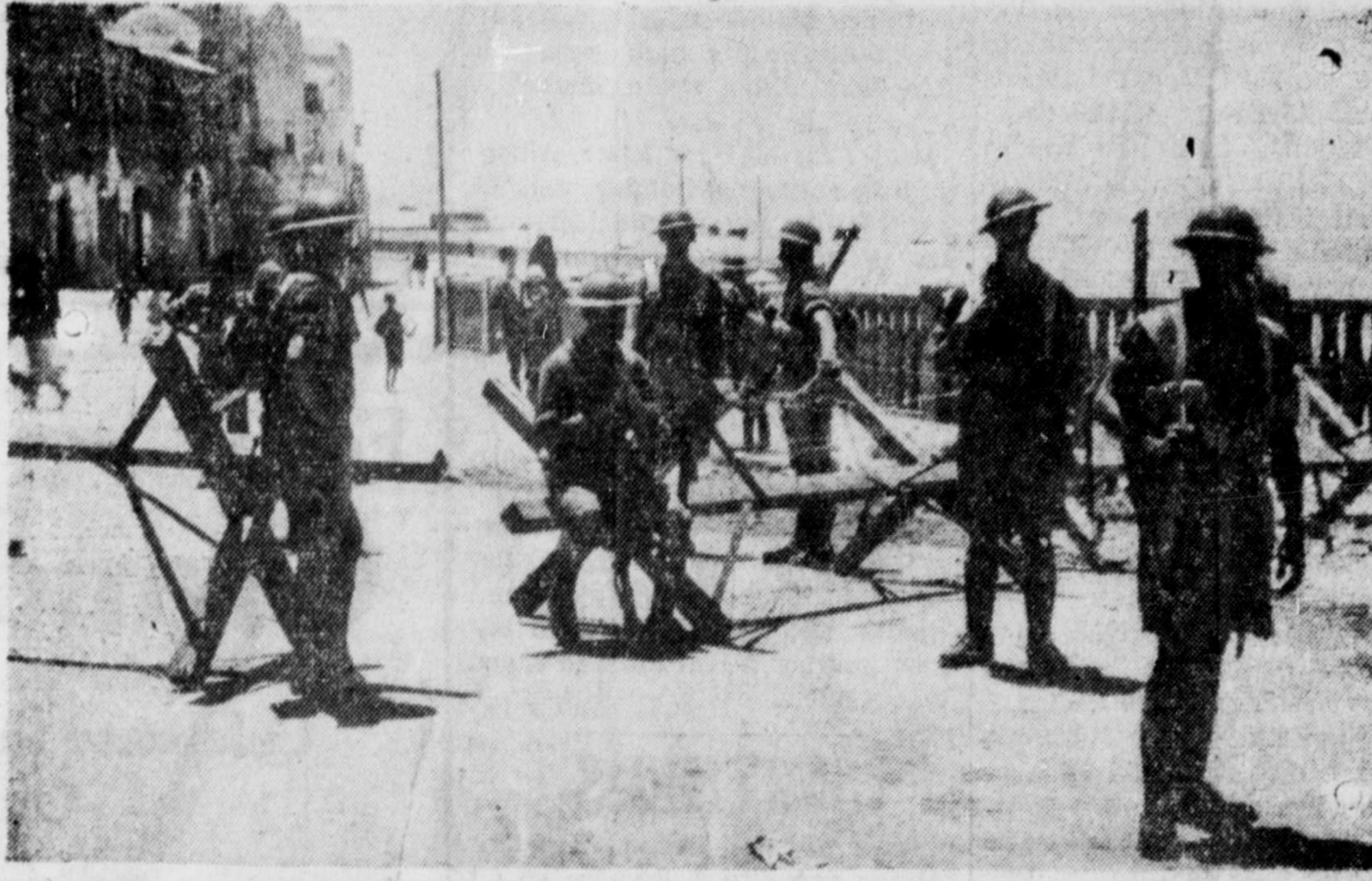

BRITAIN SENDS "IRON MAN" TO CURB PALESTINE VIOLENCE



With two British soldiers of the famous Black Watch regiment dead from Arab gunfire directed at them in the streets of Jerusalem, tension in the Holy Land again becomes acute. It was the first serious outbreak since September 26 when L. Y. Andrews, British Commissioner in Gallilee, was assassinated at Nazareth at the height of widespread Arab demonstrations against the British plan for partitioning of Palestine.

LEVEL OF PRICES UP

Various Factors Indicate Healthier Canadian Business—Dividends Reach Record

TORONTO, Dec. 31: (CP)—Despite sharp declines in some commodity prices the Canadian wholesale price level at mid-December was 6.2 per cent higher than at the same period of 1936. Narrow declines have been more general since July.

Canadian National Railways net revenue of \$13,959,438 in the first 10 months of 1937 exceeded the net in the comparable 1936 period by 42 per cent but the increase in the gross revenue was only 3.4 per cent.

Bank debits in 10 months up to Oct. 31 registered a minor decline, the result partly of a sharp drop in stock market operations. Banks, however, report a substantial increase in current loans, an indication of industrial expansion.

A HAPPY NEW YEAR

It is easy for most of us to have a happy new year. It is largely a matter of mental attitude. The year will be as happy as we make it. Under normal conditions most of us can be happy if we go about it the right way. If we lived in China and our families and homes were blown up by Japanese shells, it might be rather difficult to be happy or, if we lived in Spain and our homes were ruined by the Fascist forces, there would be an excuse for unhappiness. In Russia too, if we were suspected of being in disagreement with the powers that be, we might be unhappy in a prison camp or we may be happy or the opposite in the spirit world. These are extreme cases. It is also rather difficult to keep happy if we are out of a job in this country and our families find it difficult to acquire the necessities of life. Yet there are many people on relief who appear to be quite happy and are not the least anxious to get a job which means real work. Where there is sickness or death in a family, unhappiness is likely to follow for at least a brief period. Under normal conditions of life we can enjoy every day if we wish to.

OUR WISH TO ALL

Our wish to all our readers is that they may so adjust themselves to conditions that every day throughout 1938 may be a happy day. We hope all will be kept busy so that they may not have time for repining or grumbling or fault finding. We hope they may all have a reasonable amount of money paid regularly so that they may secure for themselves and their dependents the necessities of life and a few luxuries, not too many. We wish them a happy home life, if they have homes. We hope that the city will make substantial progress during the year but, if it should not, we trust it will be from no fault of any of us and that we may accept the situation and carry on, making the best of what we have.

We all hope that in the coming year we may see a beginning made on the construction of a pulp mill but, if not, we shall still have a good city here. We hope the big defense program of the department of defense will get underway. We hope that before very long we shall be connected by highway with the rest of the world and that we shall be connected with the Peace River country by rail but our happiness is not dependent on any of these things although many think we would be happier if we obtained them.

Some of us think our happiness depends upon the success of our churches but it does not. Happiness is largely an individual matter. Some of us need excitement to keep us happy while others of us can be happy with a few feet of ground in which to plant a few poppies.

Finally we wish you all the power to adjust your outlook to the needs of the times, we wish you steady growth—mental, physical and spiritual. We wish for you all steady growth in wisdom with a spirit of co-operation and a large measure of toleration in your homes, your city, your province, your country—moving steadily toward a better and brighter and happier world.



Waterfront Whiffs

Waterfront Progress During 1937 Leads Way in Community—New Construction and General Improvement—Has Also Been Better in Business Way

From the standpoint of new construction and general improvement, the Prince Rupert waterfront can look back upon the closing year of 1937 with a measure of satisfaction. A year-end ramble from Westview to Seal Cove impresses one with the fact that this vital section of the local community has made definite progress in this regard

during the twelve-month that ends today. Possibly the rest of Prince Rupert has not kept pace with the waterfront this year. Notable among the new structures which have made their appearance during 1937 have been the provincial government's ore sampling plant, the new Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve building and the Prince Rupert Shellfish Co.'s cannery. The early part of the year marked the completion of the new unit of the Northern Fishermen's Cold Storage Co. plant as well as the extensions to the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. Recently commenced, the construction of the new fuel station of the Standard Oil Co. of British Columbia is now well under way. Also to be listed in the year's new work are the new gravel bunkers of the Armour Salvage Co. and the new building of the W. R. Love Electric Co. The waterfront here is gradually filling up, indicating the permanence of the port and the importance of its maritime activities. Another development of the near future will be the construction of the gun shed just west of the Ocean Dock for the artillery training school of the 102nd Battery. In addition to the new undertakings, there has been a good deal of general maintenance and improvement work during the year. Comparing the general appearance of the Prince Rupert waterfront today with what it was a year ago New Year's Eve, it may be said that 1937 has been marked with more change and improvement than has been the case for many previous years—all of which is a good and encouraging sign as far as the future of the port is concerned.

From a general business standpoint, too, it is but a conservative comment to make that there has been a continued improvement as far as the waterfront is concerned. This, of course, has been due to the improvement in the fishing. While the salmon canning may not have been of the volume or profit of some years, better conditions in the halibut and salmon trolling industries more than made up for this with the result that the fishermen themselves and the dependent industries are in a better position today than they were a year ago. Analyzing general conditions, there appears to be no reason but to anticipate that this improvement may continue in 1938. Signs are not lacking that Prince Rupert's fishing

Sunderland, and "Refrigerator Car Tests" (No. 3) by O. C. Young. Each of these articles contains valuable information based upon latest findings of scientific research work.
