Premier Aberhart Getting Rid Of His Attorney General-Bank Control Mearure Passed

EDMONTON, August 7: (Canadian Press)-Hon. J. W. Hugill K.C., Attorney General of Alberta since the present government took office nearly two years ago, has been asked by Premier Aberhart to resign, according to announcement of a government spokesman. An official statement by the Premier is expected during the day. Yesterday the legislature passed all legislation presented by the government, including the act to regulate banks and vest authority over them in the government, and then prorogued. The bank regulation measure was formally assented to by the Lieutenant Governor.

Bombing Protested

LONDON, August 7: (Canadian Press)-Great Britain today dispatched a note to Spanish insurgents at Palma, Mallorca, protesting at yesterday's "mystery" plane attack on the tanker British Corporal. The protest followed a report from the British consul-general at Algiers that the machine gun and bomb attack had "probably" been executed by anti-government air-

At Algiers Franco Solari, captain of the Italian steamer Mongioia, died of injuries suffered when his vessel was air bombed about the same time as the British Corporal. The Italian vessel was reported last night to be missing following the bombing but she turned up safely at Algiers today.

JAP PASSES

Clarence S. Obata Dies Early Today Following Lengthy Illness

Clarence S. Obata, one of Prince Rupert's best known Japanese citizens and for years one of the leaders of the local Nipponese community, passed away at 2 o'clock this morning at his home on Third Avenue after having been ill for some time. For years a resident of Prince Rupert and formerly secretary of the Prince Rupert Japanese Association and the Skeena Fishermen's Association, Mr. Obata was well known and esteemed not only by his own countrymen but by citizens generally. His passing will be widely regretted in the district.

Mr. Obata is survived by his widow and one son, Roger. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.



In the last election very few Moslem candidates were elected as Congress' distrust of the safeguarding this very much to heart. He has always argued that communal strife in India owes it origin to quarrels among the members of the middleclasses over the division of government appointments. The masses, he insists, have only one concerntheir poverty, which affects Moslem and Hindu alike.

Trying Times Ahead

Trying times are ahead for the governors of the Indian provinces after the Nationalists Party forms ministries.

The ministries of Liberals and Moderates that have been in office in the United Provinces, Bihar, Central Provinces and Madras have resigned and the Orissa ministry cannot hold out much longer, while in Bombay Presidency, Congress is ready to overturn the present ministry when the House meets shortly. All indications are that India will have Congress ministries at work in six out of 11 provinces and in the provinces where Congress has a majority the present ministries will not be loath to go. With small rollowings in the legislatures since the 1936 elections they have realized all along that they were stop-gaps, existing only until the Congress Working Committee permitted its provincial adherents to accept office, which it did this month.







Synopsis of Land Act

Full information concerning Pre-emp-

tions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information. Victoria, or any Government Agent. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre west of that Range. Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of

the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received. Pre-emptions carrying part time condi-

PURCHASE OR LEASE Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, being timberland, for agricultural (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and secondclass (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 10. Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

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





With the closing of gillnet fishing for sockeye on August 13, however, the canneries are expected to commence closing down, only a few remaining open to pack fall varieties.




