GERMANS EXPEL

Ten Saboteurs and Espionists Suspects Are Deported—No Advice on Others

MOSCOW, Feb. 25: (CP)—Two Germans, who were arrested on suspicion of sabotage and espionage in November of last year, will be deported from Russia immediately, the Soviet government has informed the German embassy. The embassy declares that it was "not advised" on the status of 34 other Germans known to be held in Russia.

Investigation Into Death of Writer Now On

PALM SPRINGS, Cal., Feb. 26: (CP)—Investigation is proceeding into the death of Humphrey Pearson, prominent film writer, who was found shot dead in bed at a desert cottage here at midnight Wednesday. Pearson was shot twice through the chest and had been dead for more than an hour before the butler summoned the police. His wife was in the same bed with him when the tragedy was discovered.

Correspondence Club is Active

Twenty Students Exchange Letters With Those in Other Lands

The "Correspondence Club" of King Edward High School held a meeting on Wednesday afternoon to arrange a number of activities for the coming weeks. This club comprises a group of about twenty students who are conducting a correspondence in English with students of similar age in various parts of the world including India, New Zealand, Austria, England, Siam, Switzerland, Australia, East Indies, Philippines, South Africa, Mexico, Burma, Holland and Sweden. By means of the exchange of letters these students obtain an intimate knowledge of conditions in foreign countries and the problems and interests of other students.

To assist in making their correspondence interesting, the local students plan to make themselves familiar with local activities and institutions. Next Tuesday they plan to visit the Biological Station, a privilege extended to them by the director, Dr. Neal Carter. They have a competition for the best snapshot of a local view. Naval Patrol Is Renounced

LONDON, Feb. 26: (CP)—Soviet Russia and Portugal have renounced participation in the naval blockade of Spain's coast scheduled to begin March 6 in connection with non-intervention efforts of twenty-five other nations.

Holiday With Pay For All Workers Plan

LONDON, Feb. 26:—Premier Stanley Baldwin expresses favor for a plan whereby all employees in Great Britain would receive an annual holiday with pay. The possibility of putting such a plan into actual operation will be investigated.

FEARFUL OF ARMS

British League Member Warns That Volume Encourages Strife

BIRMINGHAM, Eng., Feb. 26: (CP)—Necessity of a new and early European settlement was urged in a speech here by Lord Allen of Hurtwood, member of the executive of the League of Nations. "Public opinion," Lord Allen continued, "is watching with anxious goodwill the valuable exchange of speeches between Mr. Eden, M. Blum and Herr Hitler. There is little doubt that Europe is reaching a situation in which the sheer volume of international rearmament will make it increasingly difficult to avoid a sudden explosion which no nation desires. Hitherto the time-lag in armed preparedness has prevented dangerous incidents from leading to catastrophe. It is imperative therefore, that the nations should reach a new European settlement during the next few months. There seems little chance of any precise answer from Germany if European problems are approached in isolation from each other. Economic demands, territorial claims justifiable or unjustifiable—and colonial prestige have all become entangled in a web of emotion.

Will For Peace

"Nothing short of a comprehensive peace offer can bring to light whether there is a genuine will to peace, or whether we must not accept the fact that the pursuit of power politics overshadows legitimate claims. British opinion is most anxious to welcome Germany back to the League on a basis of absolute equality. Isolated concessions are difficult and dangerous, but it would be possible to examine every claim and counter-claim with a real prospect of success, and with a desire for give and take provided it was known that the new settlement would include Germany as a member of the League of Nations, accepting its rights and obligations.

STILL SEES NEW ORDER

Aberhart Plans Five-Year Road Building Program, Marketing Board, Drought Relief

EDMONTON, Feb. 26: (CP)—"Further enactment regarding the establishment of a new economic order will be presented for your consideration," according to the Speech from the Throne read by Chief Justice Harvey, Acting Lieutenant Governor, at the opening of the Alberta Legislature yesterday. The Speech, prepared by the Social Credit government of Premier William Aberhart, forecast a heavy legislative program including a five-year road building plan, establishment of a provincial marketing board, new debt legislation and assistance to dried out areas. Premier Aberhart also intends to ask the federal government for a loan of \$15,000,000 to meet bond maturities and other obligations as well as \$5,000,000 on natural resources and \$10,000,000 on trust lands.

GOVERNOR IS COMING

Lord Tweedsmuir to Pay Visit To Prince Rupert This Summer

The Governor General, Lord Tweedsmuir, will pay a visit to Prince Rupert this summer in the course of a western tour, it was announced today. There will be a trek south from Burns Lake through Tweedsmuir National Park to Bella Coola whence the party will proceed to Prince Rupert enroute east. On the way west the vice-regal party will go north from Edmonton to Aklavik.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 26:—Innes Hopkins, formerly manager of the B. C. Marine and Engineering Works, died here yesterday.

LONDON, February 26: (CP)—Seventy-one lives were saved in 64 launches of lifeboats to vessels in distress, says the report of operations on the English coasts in January—the busiest January in 24 years.

SANDON IS HARD HIT BY SNOW; SMALL GIRL IS KILLED BY SLIDE

SANDON, Feb. 26: (CP)—Avelyn Stewart, six-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Stewart was killed in a snow slide here early Wednesday. The slide demolished the home, the parents and two others escaping as the slide missed the kitchen in which they were sitting. The town is cut off from the outside world by heavy snow and slides and there is danger of a food shortage.

TARIFF CHANGES UNDER NEW ANGLO-CANADIAN AGREEMENT ON TRADE IS ALL-ABSORBING

OTTAWA, Feb. 26: (CP)—Without increasing taxation in any form and with numerous downward revisions of the tariff schedule, Hon. Charles A. Dunning, minister of finance, yesterday budgeted for an over all deficit of \$35,000,000 for the fiscal year 1937 with the hope that next year he would be able to present a balanced budget. The estimated deficit for the coming fiscal year compares with a deficit of \$87,395,000 estimated for the current fiscal year ending next March 31.

Canada retains all the advantages secured under the 1932 pact. Reciprocal benefits to the United Kingdom are assured by reductions in British preferential tariff on 179 items including textiles, glass, sawware, iron and steel including machinery, vacuum cleaners and sewing machines, enamelled ware and electrical goods. Reductions are also made on leather, boots and shoes, on many paper products, paints and varnishes, earthenware, canned fish, soaps, brushes and silverware.

Britain is guaranteed against preferential tariff increases on 246 items of Canadian tariff and against a decrease in preferential margin on Lumber, canned salmon, apples, dairy produce, tobacco and patent leather while British duties are cut on natural silk stockings.

An increase in duty on Canadian automobiles and parts is guaranteed against. The Dominion continues to be given a chance to expand exports of hams and bacon up to 280,000,000 pounds per annum. The agreement, which assures Canada of \$3,000,000 annually of free exports to the United Kingdom, will remain in force until August 20, 1940, and thereafter subject to six months' notice by either government. Reduction in duty on United Kingdom products becomes effective as from midnight last night.

MONTREAL, Feb. 26:—Speaking here yesterday, Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia, made an appeal for financial assistance for church and missionary work in the Peace River Block which is part of his diocese of Caledonia.

MOST GOES TO ALIENS

Further Interesting Figures Issued in Regard to Relief Disbursements Here

A further abstract of city relief disbursements shows that up to the end of February this year a total of \$33,443.11 has been issued to 49 foreign born able-bodied fishermen, carpenters and laborers as compared with \$6,962.61 to 14 British born, \$660.05 to 11 Canadian born and \$400.60 to six British Columbia born.

As for the British born, it is pointed out that of the total of \$6,962.61, no less than \$4,468.16 has been received by one case alone, this being a married man with wife and ten dependents.

For the month of February relief disbursements classified as follows: foreign, \$1097.55; British born, \$232.95; Canadian born, \$202.50; British Columbia born, \$119.10.

CASE OF INDIANS

Editor, Daily News:—When Olof Hanson M.P. found the incredible conditions under which the Indians are forced to exist, though it was not his duty, he investigated the reason why the Indians should receive such small rations in relief and this was the reply he received: "The Indians live tax free on their reserves. They have free medical attendance and schooling. They are clothed by the Department. Their houses are repaired when necessary. They also have land for gardens and are supplied with seeds. They can fish and hunt and are supplied with ammunition."

If we, the Indians, are tax free on our reserves, why don't they refund all taxes we pay indirectly on everything we buy? If we are getting free schooling, why are our children compelled to work like men in school for their board and allowed only half a day's schooling? If we are getting free medical attention, why don't they take honest steps towards checking tuberculosis among the Indians? Would you call giving tubercular Indians a couple of spoons of cod liver oil per day and a few pills to other sick Indians medical attendance? If we are supplied with clothing, seeds and ammunition and if our houses are repaired, I'm from Missouri, they'll have to show me. Yes, we can fish and hunt but the provincial police might put us in jail for illegal hunting and fishing.

On top of all this and after impressing us that they were giving us relief, what have our guardians done with all our trust fund? I thank you for your valuable space.

Hon. William Smithe, Premier of British Columbia, January 29, 1883, to March 29, 1887. During the Hon. Mr. Smithe's term of office, much was accomplished. The controversial question of the Island Railway was settled and the line built. The Provincial Government also gave a grant of 6000 acres of land in the vicinity of Vancouver in order that the Transcontinental Railway would extend its lines to that point. Redistribution of legislative representation was also brought about, and the question of Oriental immigration into British Columbia was placed under Federal jurisdiction.
