EDMONTON, Feb. 26: (CP)-"Further enactment regarding the establishment of a new economic order will be presented for your consideration," according to the Speech from the Throne the opening of the Alberta Legislature yesterday.

The Speech, prepared by the Social Credit government of Premier William Aberhart, forecast a heavy legislative program including a five-year road building plan, establishment of a provincial marketing board, new debt legislation and assistance to dried out areas.

Premier Aberhart also intends to ask the federal government for a loan of \$15,000,000 to meet bond maturities and other obligations as well as \$5,000,000 on natural resources and \$10,000,000 on trust lands.




