## CONTRACTOR WATSON SAYS THAT HE WAS DELAYED BY THE CITY ENGINEER

Says That the Engineer Told Him to Stop Work on Contract Until the City's Retaining Wall Gangs Could Catch Up With Him---Damage Suit Still in Progress---Judge Will Visit the Contract

"I think that we had better drop all attempt at defense on the ground that there was no six months' clause in the contract, but, mind you, I am not surprised that the contractors should bring in this, considering that the city has attempted to charge this strike delay against them."

Mr. Watson said there was continual trouble with the city because he was moving rock too fast for their retaining wall laborers. He calculated he lost about nine days over delay in the building of the retaining wall by the city. Delay was also caused owing to the building of a culvert across Second avenue, near Bob Ross's house.

Here City Solicitor Peters interrupted, calling the Court's attention to the clause in the contract providing that the city should be allowed all freedom to construct culverts, etc., over ground covered by contractors' operations. Mr. Peters was sharply reprimanded by the Judge for interruptions and remarks to plaintiff's counsel. In this case, however, the Court considered his contention.

During the strike he made five different attempts to start work and calculated that he lost \$50 per day at least, nothing at all was accomplished during the strike—it was impossible. Twice witness had written the Council demanding a copy of the final estimate on his contract, but it was never forthcoming.

Cross-examined by Mr. Peters, witness denied very emphatically that he ever signed a contract with a six months' time limit in it, though he admitted that a contract signed by him existed. If there was a six months' clause in it then it must have been put in later.

Mr. Peters produced a document purporting to be the original specifications of the contract signed by the firm and containing the six months' clause. Over this document there arose discussion and altercation between counsel. The document was a surprise. Counsel for plaintiff, Mr. Williams, insisted on seeing it, but the Judge ruled that the cross-examination could not stop for that purpose.

Witness represented that he lost at least nine days through having to alter tracks to suit the city engineer's orders for delivery of rock for retaining walls. He was engaged delivering rock for retaining walls for three months and claimed wages at \$3 a day per man for eighteen men against the city for nine days delay. He described in detail his plant involved in the delay so caused. The value ran into several thousand dollars.

Mr. W. E. Williams desired that the Judge should pay a visit to the scene of the contract before the end of the case, and to this Judge Clements said he was quite agreeable. "Provided counsel will allow me," he added with a smile.

Mr. Peters concluded his cross-examination of witness William Watson this morning and Mr. Williams proceeded to re-examine Mr. Watson this afternoon.

## LIFE SAVING PATROL FOR THE DANGEROUS WEST COAST

GOVERNMENT WILL EQUIP STEAMER NEWINGTON WITH WIRELESS AND ESTABLISH LIFEBOAT STATIONS AT BANFIELD, CLAYOQUOT AND UCULET.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Victoria, Dec. 7.—The Dominion Government is preparing an efficient life saving patrol for the west coast of Vancouver Island. The steamer Newington is to be equipped with wireless and placed in the patrol service as the parent ship for three life-boats in service at Banfield, Ucuelt, and Clayoquot.

Life saving crews will be taken to any vessel in distress along the coast line by the Newington which will be in constant communication with a chain of wireless stations. Shelters are to be built at various danger points on the coast and a coast guard service will be established.

### TRIUMPH FOR LLOYD-GEORGE

His Insurance Bill Passes Houses of Commons by 324 to 21. (Canadian Press Despatch.) London, Dec. 7.—Mr. Lloyd-George's famous and much discussed Third Insurance Bill passed its third reading in the House of Commons last night by a vote of 324 to 21. The passing of the bill by such a majority in the face of bitter attacks upon it is looked on as a great triumph for the Chancellor.

### POLICE PARTY "MUSHING IT"

Heavy Ice on Naas River Prevented Rover From Forcing Passage to Ayansh—Indians Reported Peaceable Now.

Returning last night from a ticklish trip up the Naas estuary with the Provincial police detachment sent to look after the Indian disturbance at Ayansh, Captain Norman Broadhurst mentions that the ice is thick and heavy on the Naas at present. He was unable to force the Rover farther up river than Black Point, some thirty miles from Ayansh. Here the party of constables, headed by Chief Owen, and well provisioned, started out to "mush it" to the scene.

News of the party will not be available for a day or so, and they will have a tough trip, as the snow is thick and the ground ice-bound. Meanwhile, information has reached the city that the Indian disturbance, due principally to "hooch," has quieted down, but the police will have work enough to trace the source of the hooch supply. Indian Agent C. C. Perry was a member of the party.

### EARL GREY IS COMPLIMENTARY

Tells London Audience That Canada is the "Belle of the Ball" and Ranks No. 1 Hard.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, Dec. 7.—Earl Grey, who was last night the guest of the Canadian Club, in replying to the toast of Canada said the Dominion was the "belle of the ball," and as evidence of this one had only to look at the number of bouquets she was receiving. He said he had spent seven happy years there and recognized that Canada, like her wheat, was "number one, hard."

### VISITED WIRELESS STATION

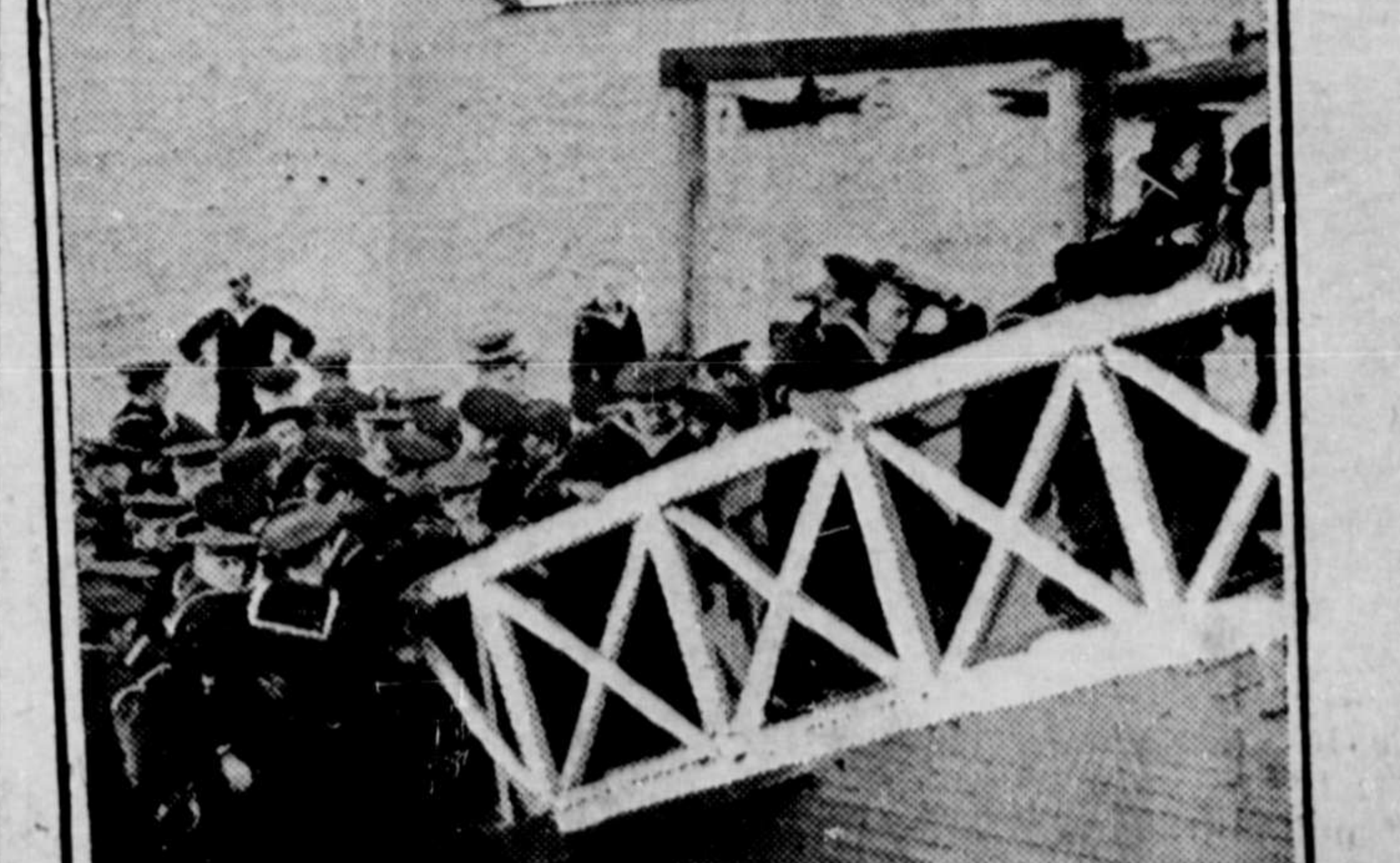
