SHOULD HOME WORK BE ABOLISHED?

Every responsible medical man is agreed that brain work is more exacting than muscular work, especially in the case of young and growing children.

Every laboring man, as well as every medical man, is agreed that the practice of working overtime continuously is injurious to the worker, and should be penalised by higher to apply for permission to purchase the following rates of pay.

But in spite of the recognition of these two facts, the school children in many of our towns and cities are obliged east, thence 65 chains south to point of comto work overtime at nights at lessons. This is not only a piece of inhumanity to the children, but, according to the testimony Pub. Nov. 2. of some of the more advanced cities which have abolished home work for scholars, is a piece of pedagogical foolishness. A child's brain can do better work in the few hours of the school day than it can in the same hours plus an extra hour or two at night. The tiring effect of the night work unfits the tender brain of the child to do its best work in the daytime.

"A device to help out a lazy teacher" is the definition of more or less. home work given by one of the most brilliant of advanced edu

That which it is impossible to cram into a child's mind during school hours it is barbaric to make it attempt to selfcram after school hours.

Already many conscientious advanced school teachers in Canada have abolished home work for their classes with good results. Toronto has abolished it in toto, by order of the Chief Inspector of Schools, Mr. J. L. Hughes. A system of day and night training that we would not use in training a full-grown man for a pugilistic encounter for fear of over-training, is manifestly unfit for developing the brains of children.

The Prince Rupert School Board might very well distinguish itself by insisting that home work be abolished and the tuition of the scholars be confined to the daytime, to school hours and school supervision.


