Terrific Battle In Spanish Civil War

Colorful Internationalism Pervades Unique Banquet In Honor of Kaiwo Maru's Visit

Couched in a colorful international atmosphere which pervaded practically all its features, a banquet given Saturday evening at the Boston Hall under the auspices of the Prince Rupert Japanese Association and the Skeena Fishermen's Association in honor of the captain and officers of the visiting Japanese training ship Kaiwo Maru was one of the most unique social affairs ever held in Prince Rupert.

MRS. SERVICE DEAD VANCOUVER—Mrs. Robert Service, 83-year old mother of Robert W. Service, the Canadian poet who gained fame as chronicler of Yukon and Great War tales, died here Sunday.

TEST CRICKET PLAY LONDON—New Zealand had scored 282 for nine at the close of the second day's cricket test match today in response to the Mother Country's first inning total of 424.

STRIKE IS BREAKING CLEVELAND, Ohio—John L. Lewis' Committee for Industrial Organization fought in the courts and along the picket lines Sunday to save its strike against Little Steel. The four concerns involved in the month-old strike—Bethlehem Steel Corporation, Inland Steel, Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company and Republic Steel—contended the walk-out was broken and that more men were returning to work every hour.

CALIFORNIA HEAT SAN FRANCISCO—A heat wave pushed mercury readings above the hundred mark in California's central valleys over the week-end. It indirectly caused the death of one person, left three prostrated and broke a 61-year record in San Francisco.

SCULPTOR ARRESTED CHICAGO—Robert Irwin, 29-year old sculptor, was arrested here Sunday by New York police officials who said that he had admitted the "Gedeon slaying" in New York last Easter Sunday. He had been the object of a nation-wide search since the bodies of Veronica Gedeon, 20, her mother and Grace Brunes were found in the Gedeon's New York apartment.

CENTRE OF ATTRACTION

Exhibition of Sail Handling Aboard Kaiwo Maru Yesterday Was Unique Display

The exhibition of sail handling staged aboard the Japanese training ship Kaiwo Maru yesterday afternoon drew a thousand or more people to the waterfront. For many it was the first time such a sight had ever been seen. The agility with which the sailors scaled the masts and clambered along the yards and the skill and precision with which the canvass was first unfurled and then furled was a revelation.

On Saturday afternoon the Kaiwo Maru was open to public inspection and many took advantage of the opportunity to see around the very interesting ship. Officers, cadets and men were courtesy personified in receiving the visitors.

Yesterday afternoon an interesting affair took place aboard the Kaiwo Maru when an "At Home" was held for Japanese callers, these including numerous visitors from the Skeena River. There was national entertainment and refreshments were served. Owing to the many guests from the canneries who had to get away soon on account of the impending opening of the sockeye salmon canning season, the "At Home" was given only for Japanese.

Loyalists Use Tanks To Slaughter Rebels In Bloody Encounter

Italians Driven Back by Superior Gun Power And Manoeuvring Ability—British Foreign Secretary Still Striving For Peace

MADRID, Spain, June 28.—A terrific tank battle took place near the Jarama River, fifteen miles southeast of the capital Sunday. The loyalist tanks, with small field guns above their forward gun turrets, travelled at a speed of nearly forty miles an hour and were reported driving the Italian tanks back by a superior gun power and manoeuvring ability.

MARKETING SCHEME IS ENDORSED Votes in the plebiscite as to whether halibut fishermen shall come under the Provincial Marketing Act scheme for control of production were counted yesterday. The Prince Rupert fleet went strongly in favor of the scheme—191 for and 36 against—while the Vancouver fleet voted 40 against and only one in favor.

Dispatches from Valencia said the Spanish coast between Sagunta and Castellon was heavily shelled today from the sea. Various sources attributed the shelling to German or insurgent warships. Damage was slight.

Peace at Any Price LONDON, June 27.—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, mapped his "peace at almost any price" with Britain's hopes for a quick end to the Spanish crisis, which is hinging upon the ability of Germany, Italy and Russia to get together. Eden had in mind three immediate steps to ease the tension of Europe and a sub-committee meeting of 27 nations for a non-intervention was called for Tuesday to consider them.

Reject Proposal ROME, June 28. (CP)—Germany and Italy will turn thumbs down on the Franco-British proposal to take over their share of non-intervention control off Spain, Virginio Gayda, authoritative Fascist commentator, said in Gironale d'Italia today. Seven German warships passed through Dover Straits eastward tonight, apparently having quit Spanish waters for good.

Gold Mines

A Canadian humorist, who is also something of an economist and was for many years a university professor, says there will be little change in the price of gold. The man is Shephen Leacock, well known to most Canadian readers. He says he does not mean to infer that gold mines are safe as an investment. He admits that the management of a mine may be honest or not and that a mine may have gold in it, may, perhaps, have gold in it, or it may certainly not have any gold in it. These are chances the investor must take. For that reason he suggests that no person should invest more than one-third of his money in gold mines.

Let us go a little further and suggest that one-fourth of a person's money might be invested in mining in this north country and that they choose British Columbia mines in preference to those far away. What an impetus it would give to the gold mining industry! The Portland Canal district would develop at a tremendous rate and there might soon be shipping mines on Queen Charlotte Islands, Porcher Island, along the Skeena Valley, in the Bulkley Valley and in the Babine Mountains.

Then, of course, someone with a wet blanket will come along and suggest that what the investor wants is an investment and not a speculation. The investors have to be shown that mining properties really have the ore that is claimed for them although when they want a sure thing they may invest in South American bonds or Texas oil stocks or rainmaker securities or perhaps Alberta bonds.

The Holidays

The school children are having a longer holiday than expected this summer and, while they like it, the parents are not so pleased, judging by the remarks heard. The schools, besides helping to give the children an education, also help to relieve the parents of responsibility for their conduct during school hours.

Now that there is to be no more school this summer, parents are planning how to provide desirable holiday conditions for their offspring. and the Coronation. The commander of the Kaiwo Maru then alluded to the possibilities of trade between Japan and Canada. There were raw products in Canada which the highly industrialized nation of Japan desired. Foreign trade was essentially of importance to both countries. Prince Rupert was the closest port on this coast to the Orient and, with its great hinterland, was bound to play a part of importance in trans-Pacific affairs of the future. It was his pleasure to hope that commerce between Prince Rupert and Japan would expand in the near future that there would be lasting friendship and goodwill between Canada and the Japanese people and that the best of international relations would prevail.

After solos by Dr. R. G. Large accompanied by Dr. H. N. Brocklesby, and a picturesque Japanese novelty interpretative dance in picturesque Japanese costume by Miss R. Kameda, with a strange accompaniment by Mrs. H. Kameda, F. A. MacCallum, in his capacity as vice-president of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce in the absence of the president, J. J. Little, extended the greetings of that body. He felt sure that the visit of Kaiwo Maru would prove of benefit to this port. It was an event of importance. He, too, mentioned trade possibilities and extended the good wishes of the Chamber of Commerce.

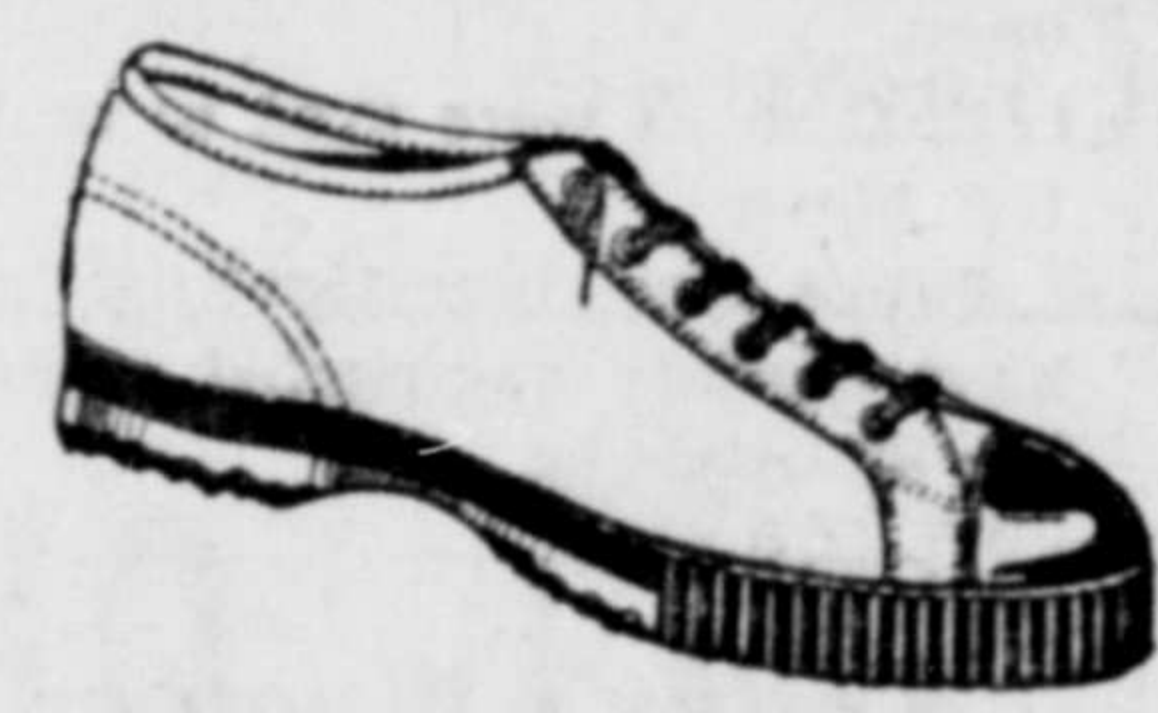

Synopses of Mining Laws

MINERAL ACT

Free Miners' Certificates

Any person over the age of eighteen, and any Joint Stock Company is entitled to enter upon all lands of the Crown and upon any other lands whereon the minerals other than coal are reserved to the Crown and its licensees with specific reservations for the purpose of prospecting for minerals, locating claims and mining. The fee to an individual for a Free Miners' Certificate is \$5.00 for one year. To a Joint Stock Company for a year is \$100.00 or less than the fee for a year is \$100.00; if capitalized beyond this the fee is \$100.00. Miners' Certificates run from date of issue and expire on the 31st of May next after its date or some subsequent 31st of May. Certificates may be obtained for any part of a year terminating on 31st of May for a proportionately less fee. Free Miners' Certificates are also applicable to the Placer Mining Act.

Mineral Claims

Size: 15.45 acres.
Recording fee: \$2.50 per claim.
Representation: Assessment work to the extent of \$100.00 must be done each year and reported on or before the anniversary date of record of the claim. Cash in the sum of \$100.00 may be paid in lieu of the assessment work. Fee for assessment work: \$2.50. If the required assessment work is not performed within the year but not recorded within that time a free miner may within thirty days thereafter file a statement of assessment work upon payment of an additional fee of \$10.00. The actual cost of the survey of a mineral claim to an amount not exceeding \$100.00 may also be recorded as assessment work. As soon as assessment work to the extent of \$100.00 (or cash paid of a like amount) is recorded and a survey made of the claim, the owner of such claim is entitled to a Crown Grant on payment of a fee of \$25.00, and giving the necessary notices required by the Act.

PLACER MINING ACT

Four types of placer claims: Creek diggings; bar diggings; dry diggings; and precious stone diggings. (For details see Part II, Placer Mining Act.) Representation: A placer claim must be worked by the owner or someone on his behalf continuously as far as practicable during working hours. Lay-overs and leaves of absence may be declared by the Gold Commissioner under certain conditions. To hold a placer claim for more than one year it must be re-recorded before the expiration of the record or record.

Placer Mining Leases

Size and method of staking, etc.
Eighty acres in extent, staked along a "location line" not more than one-half mile in length. In this line one bend or change of direction is permitted. Where a straight line is followed two posts only are necessary, i.e. an "initial post" and a "final post". Where there is a change of direction a legal post must be placed to mark the point of the said change. The leasehold is allowed a width not in excess of one-quarter mile. The locator is required within thirty days after the date of the location to post a notice in the office of the Mining Recorder setting out the name of the applicant, the number of his free miners' certificate, the date of location; the number of feet lying to the right and left of the location line; and the approximate area or size of the ground.

Dredging leases on rivers for five miles below low-water mark are also granted.
Fees: Annual rental on placer mining lease, \$30.00; annual development work required to be expended, \$200.00; annual rental on dredging lease, \$25.00 per mile; annual development work required to be expended, \$1,000.00 per mile; the value of any new plant or machinery employed to count as money expended in development work for recording certificate of work, \$2.50. Lease fee, \$5.00.

Provisional Free Miners' Certificates.

Department of Mines Act
Among other things, these Acts provide for the staking and representing of mineral claims without payment of fees, and assistance to prospectors by free assays, etc.

A detailed synopsis of the above Acts; also the "Mines Development Act"; "Mineral Survey and Development Act"; "Iron and Steel Boulders Act"; and "Phosphate-mining Act" are available at the Department of Mines, Victoria. Complete copies of the Acts may be obtained from the King's Printer, Victoria.

Synopsis of Land Act

PRE-EMPTIONS
VACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement.
Full information concerning Pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria, or any Government Agent.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland. Land carrying over 5,000 feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre west of that Range.
Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner.
Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.
Pre-emptions carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted.

PURCHASE OR LEASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

As a partial relief measure, reverted lands may be acquired by purchase in ten equal instalments, with the first payment suspended for the first year, provided taxes are paid when due and improvements are made during the first two years of not less than 10% of the appraised value.
Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased on leased conditions including payment of stumpage.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 400 acres may be leased by one person or a company.
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under grazing regulations amended from time to time to meet varying conditions. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in grazing privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

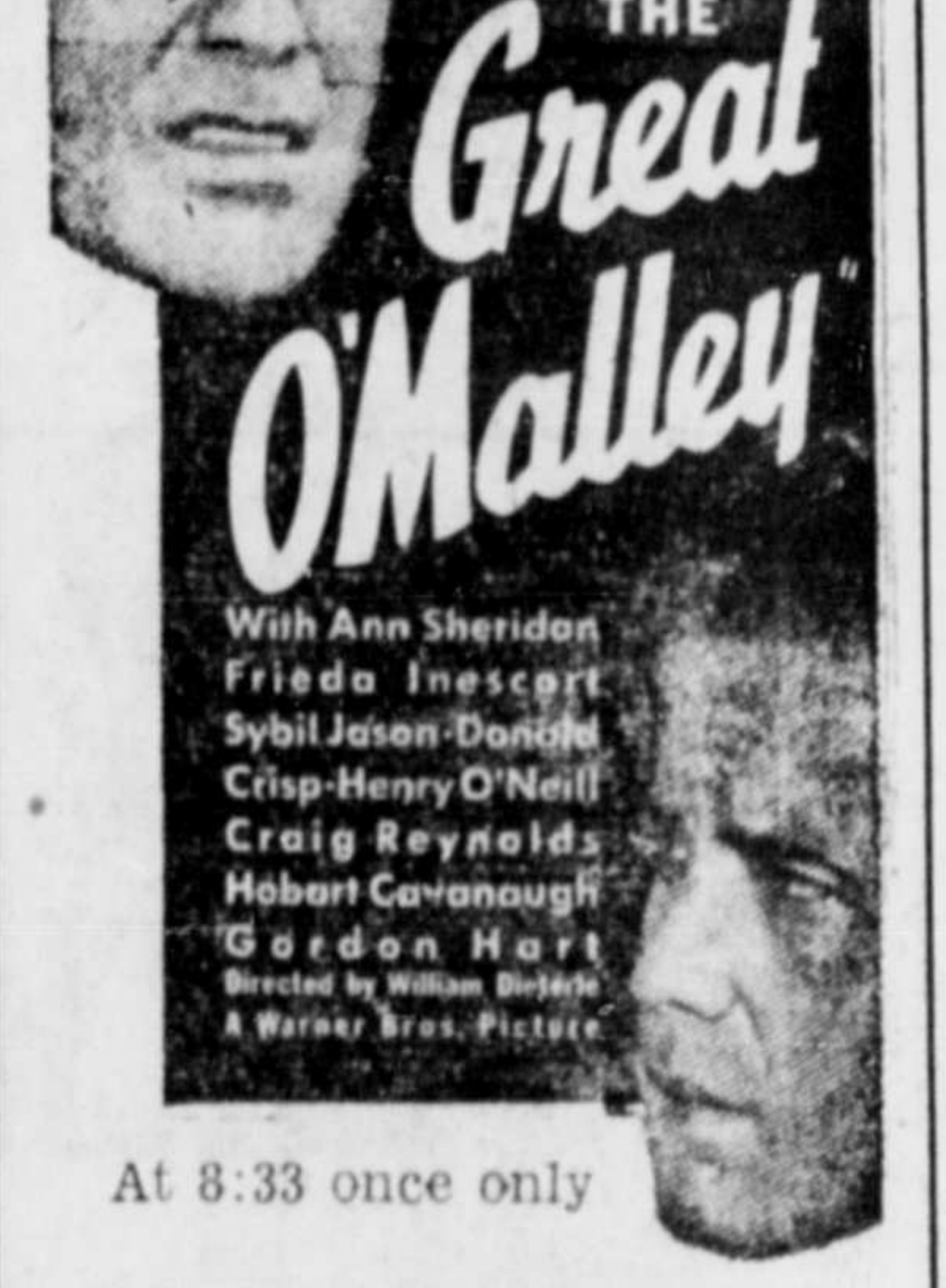
