TORONTO, December 21 (Canaan Press)-Ontario's refusal to support the St. Lawrence Waterways project, the subject of correspondence between the Dominion and United States governments was set forth in confidential correspondence made public by Premier Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario yesterday.

In a letter to Prime Minister William Lvon Mackenzie King on November 23 Premier Hepburn said that Ontario power requirements were taken care of for many years to come and "we, therefore, are not in need of more power nor, in my opinion, an additional avenue of transportation."

Premier Henburn's letter was in reply to a letter from Prime Minister King dated November 12 in which the latter said that the Dcminion government had been asked by the United States government if it was prepared to take up a new St. Lawrence matter "and. allied matters among which were mentioned the Niagara position and possible developments in Northorn Ontario affecting the levels of the Great Lakes."


