Chinese Sink Japanese Warship

Artillery Duel At Sea Near Amoy As Scene Changes To Southward

Official Inquiry Proceeds Into Panay Affair—No Doubt That Incident Was Deliberate Declares Commander Of Sunken Vessel

HONG KONG, Dec. 18: (CP)—Chinese coastal batteries sank a Japanese destroyer in an artillery duel with attacking warships near Amoy, Fukien Province port, it was reported here today. Amoy is three hundred miles north of here and action there indicates that the Japanese are moving their campaign southward as had been predicted. Fochow and Swatow are other coastal points of China which the Japanese may now have their eyes on, it is believed. There is also evidence that Hankow, the new capital of China, may be an early interior objective. Troops, it is reported, are being withdrawn by the Japanese from Shansi Province in the north to other sectors and, as they go out, the Chinese are moving in again. From Nanking come reports of looting and terrorism by the Japanese troops. On behalf of fourteen American missionaries who are still there, an appeal has been sent for aid.

Investigation Proceeding

SHANGHAI, Dec. 18: (CP)—The official investigation by a United States naval court of inquiry into the Japanese attack which sank the United States gunboat Panay on Sunday and destroyed three Standard Oil Co. tankers, all laden with refugees, is being pushed aboard the flagship Augusta. The Japanese, at the same time, announced they were undertaking another thorough investigation of the incident. The Japanese public has so far been kept in ignorance of the alleged machine gunning of the Panay as she was sinking after being bombed. Evidence taken at the United States inquiry indicates that there could have been no mistake about the sinking of the Panay being deliberate. Lieut. Commander J. W. Yeath of the Panay declared that his conviction. At the inquiry yesterday he went so far as to assert that the Japanese had fired on refugee-laden boats as they were endeavouring to escape after the sinking. The decks of the sinking vessel had been sprayed with machine gun fire both from Japanese ships and aircraft. Japanese officers had boarded the Panay but they offered no help to save the refugees. Informed sources in Tokyo say that Vice-Admiral Koyoshi Hasegawa, commanding the Japanese naval forces in the war with China, has assumed full responsibility for the Panay attack and had offered to resign. Informed persons said the resignation had been refused but rumors persisted that he had been or would be relieved of the China command and given another post.

PROVINCIAL LIBRARY ARE ROYALTY ARE VENERABLE

More Than a Dozen Dead, Thousands Homeless and Damage Extensive—Censorship Applied

ROME, December 18 (Canadian Press)—Troops have been called out to reinforce thousands of men in the struggle to keep the rampaging River Tiber from inundating central Rome. The river is sweeping through the city at the highest level in sixty-seven years. More than a dozen are known drowned, thousands of Romans have been forced from their homes and damage is extensive. Continued steady rains give rise to fears that there may be even higher water yet. Strict censorship in regard to the flood situation has been applied by Premier Mussolini in order to prevent undue public alarm. Sending out of flood pictures is banned and newspapers of Rome are publishing but meagre reports of the situation.

Succeeds In Mercy Flight

Ted Dobbin Completes Rescue of Postmaster of Kyuquot

VICTORIA, December 18—Pilot E. C. W. Dobbin of Air Travel and Transport has been able to get back after a flight to the West Coast of Vancouver Island with Dr. W. E. M. Mitchell, called to attend I. E. Gilmore, general merchant and postmaster of Kyuquot who is seriously ill. A boat was sent from Kyuquot, a distance of fifteen miles, to pick up the doctor. Bad weather had seriously hampered Capt. Dobbin in making the flight. On his return he brought in the 70 year old Gilmore who is now in hospital here.

BUDDY BAER IS WINNER

Scored Knockout Over Eddie Hogan Last Night and Earns Shot at Louis' Title

NEW YORK, Dec. 18: (CP)—Buddy Baer, younger brother of Max Baer, former world's heavyweight boxing champion, knocked out Eddie Hogan of Waterbury, Connecticut, in a third of a scheduled ten round bout at Madison Square Garden last night, thus earning a promised shot at the champion, Joe Louis. Baer weighed 243 pounds and Hogan 222½ pounds. In another bout on the same card Glen Lee won over Harry Balsimo.

Australia Wins Over Uncle Sam; Budge Is Beaten

SYDNEY, Australia, Dec. 18: Adrian Quist of Australia beat Gene Mako of United States 6-0, 6-4, 6-4 to give Australia the victory in a tennis exhibition tournament here. Jack Bromwich, rising young Australian star, sprang a big surprise by upsetting Donald Budge, Wimbledon champion. 6-2, 6-3, 8-10, 6-4 in the final game today. Australia won four matches to one. In doubles Budge and Mako were beaten by Quist and Bromwich.

FISHERMEN ARE SAFE

Seven Dories, Each With two Men, Return to Schooner on Grand Manan Banks

BOSTON, December 18 (Canadian Press)—After seven dories each presumably manned by two men, had been reported missing the schooner Richard Nanan of Portland, Maine, in advices received by coastguard headquarters here today, reported all safe on board. The schooner was fishing in the vicinity of Grand Manan Banks.

Walter Thompson Will Look After Air Publicity

MONTREAL, Dec. 18—The president and directors of the Trans-Canada Air Lines have announced the appointment of Walter S. Thompson as director of publicity for the company. Premier DuPlessis Has Explanation To Make Regarding Sensational Speech

QUEBEC, December 18 (Canadian Press)—Premier Maurice DuPlessis of Quebec says in a verbal statement that he was misquoted in his address Wednesday at Shatinigan Falls. "I did not say that the Maritime Provinces were included in an alliance of eastern provinces," he explained. What he had said was that he "hoped" an "economic agreement" just concluded between Ontario and Quebec might be extended to the Maritimes.

TWEEDSMUIR'S MOTHER DIES

Mrs. Helen Buchan Passes Away at Feebies, Scotland, At Age of Eighty

PEEBLES, Scotland, December 16 (Canadian Press)—Mrs. Helen Buchan, mother of Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor-General of Canada, died here today at the age of eighty. She visited Canada in June of last year to see Lord Tweedsmuir. Mrs. Buchan was a devoted worker in the cause of the sick and the poor and was a keen supporter of the Scottish League of Wives and Mothers.

SESSION IS INTERESTING

Matters of Importance Expected To Come Up in Federal House

OTTAWA, December 18 (Canadian Press)—Political observers prophesy that the session of Parliament which Premier W. L. Mackenzie King has announced will open January 27 will be one of the most interesting in recent years. Speculation on the Parliamentary program includes the possibility that during the session preferences in the British market enjoyed by Canada since 1932 Imperial Conference may be at stake in trade negotiations between United States and the United Kingdom and also that there may be a decision on the requests of Ontario and Quebec for permission to export surplus electric power to United States customers which permission was recently refused by the Prime Minister.

DAWSON CREEK, Dec. 18:—One man is dead and another beaten up and in hospital as a result of an early morning affray in a lane here. Morley Keir of Dawson Creek was found by Constable Devlin lying in a pool of blood in a lane near his shack. He was badly battered and frozen and died soon after admission to hospital.

HEPBURN CHARGES

Mackenzie King Denies Scheme to Force Ontario Into St. Lawrence Waterways Project

TORONTO, December 18 (Canadian Press)—Premier Mitchell Hepburn charged yesterday that the "Made in Washington" policy of the Dominion government, designed to force Ontario into supporting the St. Lawrence Waterways development scheme, was responsible for the inability of the province of Ontario to export power to the United States. He charged that an agreement existed between Ottawa and Washington that Ontario be now allowed to divert more water at Niagara Falls until the province becomes a party to St. Lawrence development. King's Denial OTTAWA, December 18 (Canadian Press)—Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King last night denied the charge that there was a scheme between United States and Canada to force Ontario to join the St. Lawrence Waterway project. "Such a charge is utterly without foundation," declared Mr. King who said that no agreement had been entered into with the United States and that none was contemplated. The federal government power export policies followed those of previous administrations and were not dictated by any agreement with the United States or associated with Ontario's stand against the St. Lawrence deep waterways project, Prime Minister King said.

ASSISTING PRAIRIES

Regina Board of Trade Proposes Extensive Program of Federal Aid

OTTAWA, Dec. 18: (CP)—A great federal credit corporation to take over all farm mortgages would be a great aid to the farmers of the prairies, declared a brief from the Regina Board of Trade presented to the Rowell Royal Commission on intergovernmental matters. This was one of the principal solutions proposed for social and economic problems of the prairies. Contributory unemployment and health insurance schemes along national lines were also proposed. Hon. Newton Wesley Rowell K.C., chairman of the commission, observed that Ottawa should not be considered an unlimited source of means for the financing of all manner of relief measures. Amalgamating Provinces Premier Patterson, in appearing before the Commission, expressed the belief that no economies could be effected by amalgamation of the three prairie provinces although it might improve their status and prestige. Greater representation in the Senate for the west was advocated before the Commission. Having concluded the session here, members of the Commission were last night on their way back to Ottawa for Christmas. Sessions will be resumed in Ottawa on January 17.

Record War Budget For Italy Again

ROME, December 18—Italy's war budget for this year is \$16,000,000 more than last year when it was an all time record.

LABOR VIEWS STRUGGLE IN ORIENT

Agitation for a boycott of Japanese goods as a protest against the brutal slaughter of non-combatants in China is being carried on in Great Britain and the United States says the Canadian Unionist.

The great capitalist industries of Japan are heavily dependent on export trade. An effective boycott would soon weaken its economy.

SOCIAL CRATER

Japan is a social crater, continued the labor journal. A volcanic eruption is overdue. A parasitic landlord class absorbs half the crops of the rice farmers.

When the depression quickened unrest among the Japanese masses, the ruling caste started a diversion—the invasion of Manchuria.

The ruling caste, however, did not hand over the government to the popular parties. Some changes in the personnel of the government were made, but occasion for a bigger war and more intensive chauvinist propaganda was sought as a means of checking the rising democracy.

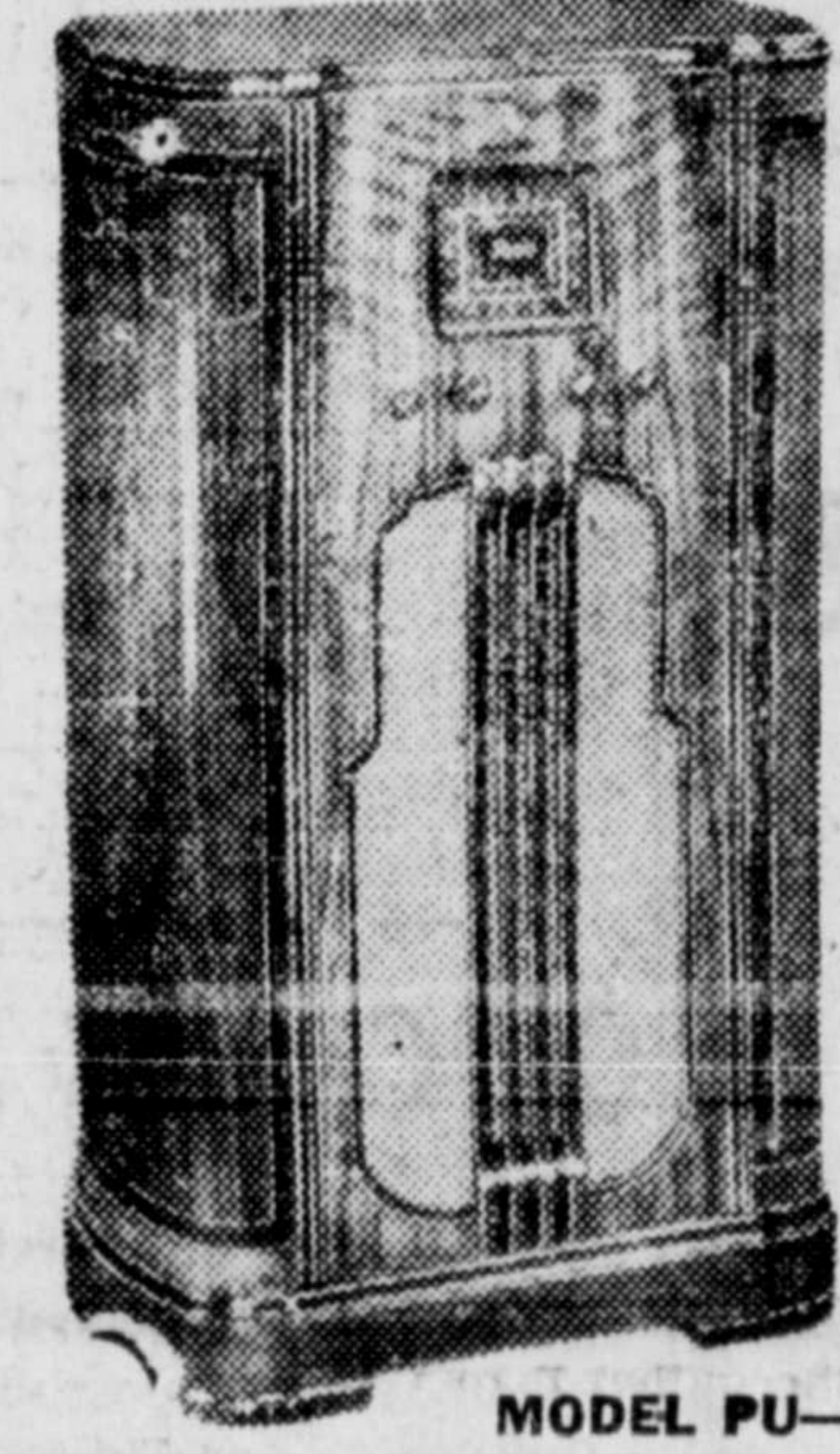

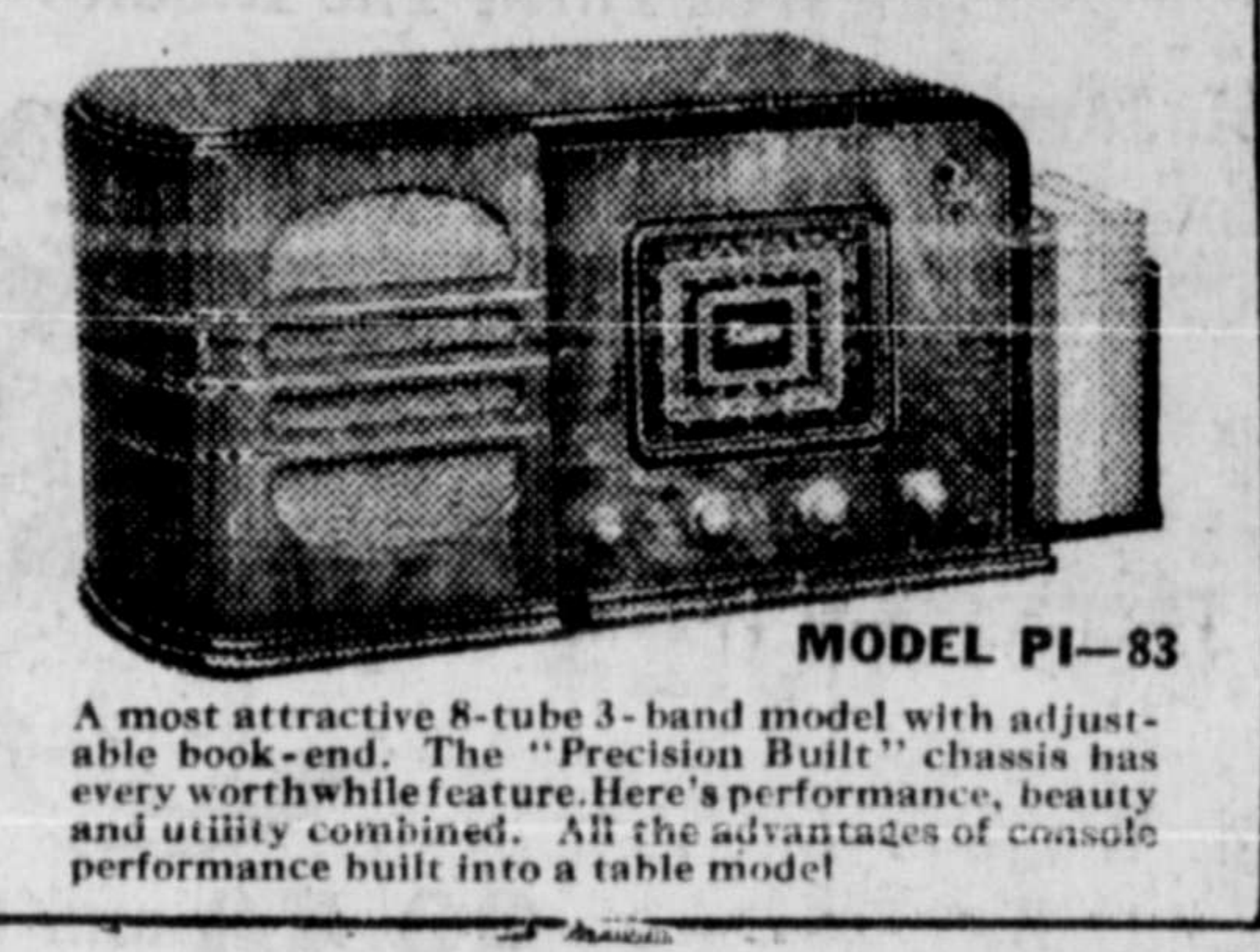

## EXPRESS PARCELS

Advantages in Sending Christmas Presents This Way Pointed Out

MONTREAL, Dec. 18:—Low rates on Express parcels weighing up to 15 pounds with free pick-up and delivery service at 1045 points across the Dominion in effect by the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Express companies will prove quite an advantage when many thousands of small sized parcels are being shipped as Christmas presents, according to I. M. Harper, Chairman of the Express Traffic Association of Canada.

On such shipments the charges vary according to the weight of the package and the distance over which it must be handled. Commencing at a very low minimum charge, the cost of forwarding a parcel to any Express point in the nine provinces throughout Canada is so proportionately rated that the cost to even the farthest point is still very moderate. These shipments are called for and delivered promptly without extra charge at any address within designated limits at all principal cities and towns throughout the country.

"To cope with the enormous amount of express shipments just prior to Christmas Day calls for such special effort on the part of the express companies but adequate preparation for this has been made well in advance and whether the parcel is large or small, the safe and speedy conveyance of it by express assures prompt delivery in good condition," stated Mr. Harper.

## Synopsis of Land Act

**PRE-EMPTIONS**  
 VACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement.

Full information concerning Pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria, or any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying less than 200 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 5000 feet per acre west of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land is situated, or printed forms obtained from the Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emption carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted.

**PURCHASE OR LEASE**  
 Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre and second class (grazing) land, \$1.50 per acre. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

As a partial relief measure, reverted lands may be acquired by purchase in equal instalments, with the first payment suspended for two years, provided taxes are paid when due and improvements are made during the first two years of not less than 10% of the appraised value.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

Unreserved areas, not exceeding 10 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, the lease being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under grazing regulations amended from time to time to meet varying conditions. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in grazing privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits available for visitors, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

# Waterfront Whiffs

Herring Seining in Harbor is Closed—Norco Here With Fish From Ketchikan—Grain Boat Approaching

Herring seining in Prince Rupert Harbor is being closed as from 6 o'clock this evening until further notice, it is announced at the office of the Department of Fisheries. The order is made so that there will be no danger of depletion of the fish, it being considered that sufficient herring has now been taken from the harbor for all reasonable purposes. It is not expected that the closing of fishing for herring in the harbor will seriously interfere with the supply of fish for the reduction plants and other purposes. The fish, it is expected, will be available in nearby outside waters. During the past few weeks the herring have been taken for the reduction plants at Port Edward and Tucks Inlet as well as for bait supply of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. and Northern Fishermen's Cold Storage. The Bacon Fisheries have also been taking the fish for kippering. The deepest seines that have been used in the harbor for herring seining have been thirty fathoms, it is officially stated.

Northland Transportation Co.'s motorship Norco, Capt. B. I. Joyce, arrived in port at 9:40 this morning from Ketchikan and, after discharging one carload of frozen fish for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways, sailed in continuation of her voyage to Vancouver and Seattle. The Norco, which has not been here for some time, is taking the run of the teamer North Sea between Seattle and Alaska.

C.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. Neal McLean, is due in port at 11:30 tonight from a special voyage to Anyox and Stewart and will be sailing tomorrow morning for Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Capt. Dan McKinnon arrived in the city on the Princess Adelaide yesterday afternoon from Vancouver, being here to act as pilot of the British motorship Moorby which is coming early next week to load a full cargo of grain from the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator for the United Kingdom or Continent. The Moorby is coming here from

the Atlantic Coast via Panama Canal where she passed December 3. A second grain boat is due here December 28 but her name is not yet available.

Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd. seining boat Western Star, which has been fishing herring in Prince Rupert Harbor for some time, sailed yesterday on her return to Vancouver. The vessel took down the coast with her a load of herring which will be dropped off at the B. C. Packers' reduction plant at Namu.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. S. K. Gray, arrived in port at 4:30 yesterday afternoon from the south and will sail at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

## LOCAL NEWS

C. H. Mickelson, school teacher at Sunnyside, was among those sailing on the Cardena yesterday afternoon for Vancouver to spend the Christmas and New Year holidays.

Sitting in his capacity as a city councillor yesterday, City Commissioner W. J. Alder authorized the refunding of \$2000 more of old city debentures for new, leaving only \$2000 still to be converted of the city's entire refunding operation. First reading was given to a bylaw authorizing the payment of interest at the rate of five per cent per annum on advance payments of city taxes. November accounts totalling \$28,776.90 were passed for payment.
