PROPOSED TO DIVIDE THE CITY INTO THREE WARDS

SUFFERED DEATH WOUND ON THE HUNTING TRAIL

STRENUOUS ATTEMPT TO RUSH MUSIKE, A YOUNG MONTENEGRIN, INTO HOSPITAL BY TRAIN TO SAVE HIS LIFE PROVED OF NO AVAIL—ACCIDENT UP RIVER.

Hurried into the hospital from the afternoon train yesterday with a serious wound in the abdomen caused by the accidental discharge of his rifle, Musike Rajkovich, a young Montenegrin who resided in the Cetinje Hotel, died last night.

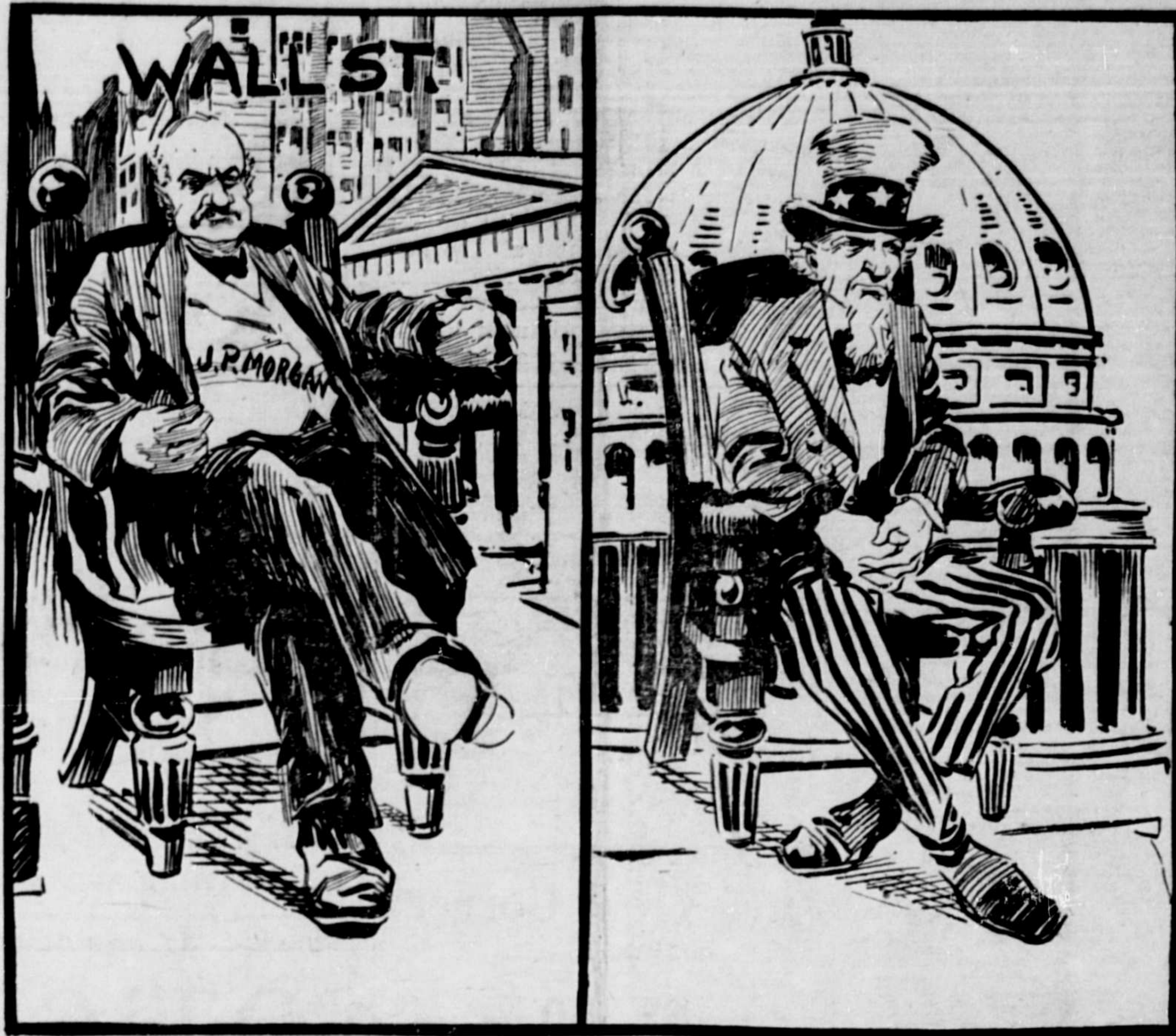
He had gone up river to hunt not far from the G. T. P. and was accompanied by a fellow countryman. While going through the brush carrying his rifle the trigger caught and the gun went off, the bullet tearing an ugly wound in the lower part of the hunter's

body. With difficulty he was packed to the railway track and the train was flagged to take him into Rupert.

At the general hospital no hope was held out from the first for his recovery, though he was a young man of splendid physique. He had no known relatives or very near friends in Rupert, having come here recently from Alaska. The body lies at E. L. Fisher's funeral chapel. An inquest may be held.

A NEW SEWER IS PROPOSED

Mayor and City Engineer to Address Ratepayers in Presbyterian Hall Tonight.

Following the defeat of the late trunk sewer bylaw, the Mayor and the City Engineer are contemplating a new sewer scheme that may be acceptable to the residents of Hays Creek. What the scheme is no one as yet knows.

Tonight in the Presbyterian Hall the Mayor and the City Engineer will address a meeting of the residents of Sections 5, 6, 7 and 8 and outline the new scheme. In addition the question of the purity of Morse Creek water for drinking purposes and the question of how to raise money for building plank roads in the outlying sections will be discussed.

GEORGE BLACK GETS GOOD JOB

Well-Known Vancouver Lawyer, and ex-Yukoner, Is Made Commissioner for the Yukon.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Vancouver, Dec. 8.—George Black, a well-known lawyer and a former resident of Dawson 1898, will be the next commissioner for the Yukon when the resignation of Commissioner Henderson comes into effect on December 17th. Black is now in Ottawa and his appointment is certain.

The Indemnity Bylaw.

At last night's Council meeting the Indemnity bylaw, providing for the payment of the indemnity to Mayor and Aldermen for their attendance at Council during the year, went through its first and second readings. It will come up again on Monday night for final consideration.

PANIC-STRICKEN ACTING MAYOR

"For God's Sake, Don't Try to Work," Said Vernon Smith to S. P. McMordie During Strike.

"For God's sake, don't try to work," are the actual words used by Acting Mayor Smith to S. P. McMordie in connection with the contractor's efforts to start up his contract during the strike. This was stated by S. P. McMordie under oath this morning as witness in the case of Watson vs. City, still proceeding.

City Solicitor Peters suggested that the change in police chief had ended the strike by the method of making a determined stand to stop the trouble.

"The war in short was quick and bloody," suggested the City Solicitor.

"Had it been a little quicker it might have been much less bloody," replied the contractor.

AUSTRALIA IS SEEKING RECIPROCITY TREATY WITH THE UNITED STATES

Mr. Neil Neilson, Member of the Federal Parliament of Australia, is Now in America on a Mission to Negotiate a Reciprocity Treaty With our Neighbors

(Special to Daily News.)

San Francisco, Dec. 7.—Neil Neilson, a member of the Federal House of Australia, has arrived here on the liner Sierra on a mission to negotiate a reciprocity treaty with the United States. He is empowered with full authority by his government and will proceed at once to Washington.

REALISE THE ADVANTAGES.

Mr. Neilson states that the people of the Commonwealth realise the great commercial advantages that would follow to them if they could arrange a satisfactory reciprocity treaty with the United States, which is the nearest white neighbor to Australia.

WILL STUDY IRRIGATION.

Mr. Neilson, who is also interested in irrigation problems, will make a study of United States methods of irrigation and attend the National Irrigation conference in Chicago this month. He believes that great areas of land in Australia can be reclaimed for agriculture by scientific irrigation.

CITY OPENS UP ITS DEFENCE IN THE CONTRACTORS' SUIT FOR DAMAGES

Supt. of Works, in His Cross-Examination, Admits That the Dump Was Often Ahead of the Retaining Wall Gangs—Witness Described Police Protection as a Farce

Supt. of Public Works M. J. McNeil was the principal witness for the defense examined in this morning's hearing of the case of Watson vs. City. His evidence principally went to show that in his opinion the construction of retaining walls by the city did not hinder the contractor. He would not swear that lumber taken off the contract by the city had been measured by the city or any city

employee, and said that the only time he had had any difference with Watson was when he had threatened to strike him, and then it was witness' fault.

Cross-examined by Mr. W. E. Williams, he admitted that Watson had an end dump some distance ahead of the retaining walls, but this, he maintained did not mean that the retaining wall was hindering the work.

John R. Morgan, contractor, gave clear evidence to show that it was more difficult for a contractor to dump for retaining walls than straight ahead. He described all the evidence of the Superintendent of Public Works as "ridiculous" and said the city's attempt at police protection was a farce.

NINE BIRTHS; ONE DEATH

Last Month Showed How Healthy a Place Prince Rupert Is.

Prince Rupert is in a healthy condition, as usual, reports the Medical Health Officer. Last month there were nine births and five deaths, four of which were cases brought in from outlying places up river.

INDIAN GIRLS WARNED

Five Port Simpson Natives Charged With Being Disorderly

Five Indian girls were this morning arraigned before Magistrate Carss, charged with doubtful conduct. They were warned to leave the city and return to Port Simpson or pay the penalty of fine or imprisonment. One case was withdrawn though the girl was warned against late hours and bad company.

COAL PROBLEM UP AGAIN; CONTRACT TO BE CANCELED

CHEAP COAL DECIDED ON FOR LIGHT PLANT AFTER DISCUSSION RECENTLY REFUSED BY SUPT. LOVE—NEW TENDERS TO BE CALLED FOR.

The Council coal problem is up again. The present light plant coal contract is to be canceled and new tenders called for.

E. Love, superintendent of the light plant, wrote last night to the Council complaining that the coal now being delivered is of too poor quality to serve the purposes of the plant. The coal is full of slack, says Mr. Love, and in wet weather weighs so much more than tons are lost to the city. Love also said that the scales are never in the same

place on the wharf where he can get them, and on one occasion he found them off balance.

Mr. Love asked the Mayor to cancel the contract for this coal, and Alderman Hilditch accordingly moved that Mr. Kelly, the contractor for the coal, be notified to stop delivery.

The City Solicitor suggested that the contractor should be ordered to pay the difference in price between the poor quality coal and the right stuff. Tenders will be called for 225 tons of steam coal at once.

'BEST BOOSTER' HAS GONE BACK

T. D. Pattullo Left for Victoria on the Prince Rupert This Morning After Doing Good Business.

Ex-Alderman T. D. Pattullo was on eof the passengers who left for the south on the Prince Rupert this morning. "Duff," who is known as one of Prince Rupert's best boosters, has a thriving business in Victoria that is calling him, but his heart and his best hopes are all for Rupert.

He came north with a big wad of Victoria money—rumors say that it was in the neighborhood of \$100,000—to invest in Prince Rupert. He bought several of the best corners in Section 2 at the sale, and several since, in addition to picking up some nice properties in the other sections for his clients.

LEGISLATURE TO MEET ON JAN. 11

Early Holding of Session Is Taken to Presage an Early Winter Provincial Election.

Victoria, Dec. 8.—The Provincial Legislature has been called to meet on January 11th.

The Legislature is being called much earlier than usual this year. This act is in conjunction with statements made by Premier McBride recently, and the general success of Provincial elections lately for the Conservative party is taken to indicate that the Government will announce a railroad policy and at once go to the electors.

M'NAMARA MADE FOOLISH BOAST

Said That He Could Not Be Convicted—This Caused McManigal to Turn Against Him.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Los Angeles, Dec. 8.—"I've got hundreds of thousands of dollars and the American Federation of Labor back of me. It took only \$30,000 to clear Vincent Altman at Chicago, and if they could not convict him they cannot convict me."

This boast, attributed today by James McNamara on the train from Detroit to Chicago while under arrest on the night of April 12th, caused Ortie E. McManigal, then also under arrest, to become angered with McNamara for his indiscreet statement and led McManigal to break from his companion, said Detective Malcolm McLaren in his evidence given today before the Grand Jury.

CITY MAKES A BAD ERROR

Discovered That All the Local Improvement Assessment Advertising Will Have to Be Done Over Again—and Paid For.

The discovery of an error in the method of calculating the local improvement assessment schedules that are being advertised in the Journal necessitates the redating and readdressing of the schedules and the postponement of the Court of Revision until January 4th. The error was made at the City Hall, so the re-advertising will have to be paid for. The original contract ran to over \$1,000. The Journal is to be congratulated.

A SOLEMN WARNING TO THE JOURNAL.

Ever since the day that the Journal accommodated The News with mechanical assistance at a time when we were reorganising our plant, The News has had a soft spot in its heart for the Journal. Any little differences of editorial opinion we all have are looked on with calm, nay, generous, emotions.

But there comes a time when it is necessary to sacrifice friendship on the altar of duty. The Journal is free to plead for higher pay for the City Solicitor, or to chide us for not growing enthusiastic over the virtues of the aldermen. We will stand for it without a murmur. But when the Journal announces its recent Sunday edition as "December 26, 1911," it is clearly time to call a halt. This is one of the boldest pieces of misrepresentation that has ever appeared in the Journal.

It is of no use for the editor of the Journal to plead that he had a "morning after" feeling and guessed it was the 26th. Such an explanation ill becomes a good Methodist. Coming so closely after his being honored by a position on the Conservative executive, the public will not be so easily satisfied that the incident is not part of some political plot to deceive the electors.

But the electors will not be deceived. The plot, though daring in conception, and carried out with a bold effrontery worthy of a better cause, will be doomed to defeat. The children who now sit round with copies of the Journal of "Dec. 26th, 1911," in one hand and tear-laden handkerchiefs in the other—mourning the fact that Christmas has passed and Santa Claus has failed to put in an appearance—may dry their tears. The plot has failed.

The Journal still is entitled to a warm place in our affections. It can borrow a galley of type or a monkey wrench or our umbrella at any time without notice. But it must not attempt to bluff the people of Prince Rupert out of their Christmas.
