### SELLS SHIPYARD

Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Transport, has recently been responsible for the sale of the Sorel Shipyards owned by the Dominion Government to a private company and is said to have saved the government an annual loss of \$400,000. If this in an indication of the general policy of the government it may mean that it will look with favor on the disposal of the Prince Rupert drydock and shipyards provided it can be sure that the dock will be kept in operation and that a proper shipyard will be maintained at this point as a defense measure.

### PREMIER IS MODERATE

The communication of Premier Mackenzie King to Premier Aberhart is very moderate considering the importance of the question at issue. It seems probable that the provincial premier will refuse to await a decision of the supreme court, in which case the recently passed legislation in Alberta may be disallowed.

In view of the importance of the Alberta movement it is wonderful how careful Ottawa has been not to interfere with the Social Credit experiment in any way. Both former Premier Bennett and the present head of the federal government have taken similar attitudes in regard to the matter.

### PLENTY OF GRIT

For a girl to paddle her own canoe six hundred miles or thereabouts from Seattle to Prince Rupert with side trips enroute is a feat that few would care to undertake, even in these days of women's independence. The frail craft in which Miss Lowman made the trip is one that a man would not care to navigate across Queen Charlotte Sound or in the rough waters of the long reaches of the interior waterways. For a woman, it indicates a daring that is still unusual in the "weaker sex." Had she been drowned in Douglas Channel, we should probably have said she was foolish, but she succeeded and she becomes a heroine. ### POINTS TO BROCKVILLE

Editor, Daily News:

An editorial in your paper of July 30th—"A Soulless Corporation" has been brought to our attention. We recognize this "very interesting editorial" as you call it as being an example of the propaganda turned out continually to blind the people to the real facts regarding the public ownership of public utilities. The editorial you quote shows that under private ownership 100 kwh, as an example, of electric current would cost \$6.50. Below we quote an article taken out of a newspaper of recent date which shows that under public ownership in this case 100 kwh of current costs but \$1.20 which is more than five times cheaper, not three more as your editorial states power would be under private ownership. Although it is long I quote article in full. You quoted extensively from your interesting editorial so expect you won't mind as those who have to dig down and pay the bills will find this article even more interesting.

"Brockville, Ont. This city which operates its own electric, gas and water plants, has just announced another 10 per cent cut in light rates. For the first 40 kwh the domestic rate becomes 1.8 cents; after that the charge is eight tenths of one cent per kwh. The rates are said by officials to be so profitable that for the past ten years Brockville has rebated back to its consumers 16 per cent of the consumers yearly total of bills paid, and for three of the ten years the yearly rebate has been 25 per cent."

We thank you for the editorial. We are putting it away for future reference as it is not only a good argument in favor of public ownership but also shows to what a disgusting extent most newspaper editors will disguise the truth to win favor from the vested interests.

## WHIFFLETS

From the Waterfront

C.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. George Cole, is due today from the south. This trip north the Prince John made a call at Margaret Bay Cannery to pick up W. W. Trotter, manager of the cannery there, and crew and take them to Lagoon Bay Cannery on the Queen Charlotte Islands which is being opened for fall fishing. The Prince John also made a call at Cumshewa Inlet on the way here. The vessel has on board a party of passengers who will transfer to the steamer Prince George here today to make the round trip to Anxox and Stewart and thence to Vancouver.

With a large list of passengers, including a goodly number of tourists, C.N.R. steamer Prince George, Capt. Edward Mahbo, arrived in port on time at 10 o'clock this morning from Vancouver. Powell River and Ocean Falls and sails at 1 o'clock this afternoon for Atlixor and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening southbound.

Having on board another capacity list of passengers, consisting principally of round trip tourists, C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. E. K. Gray, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway and other Alaska points whence she will return here next Wednesday afternoon southbound. There were an even two hundred passengers aboard the Princess Louise. One disembarked from the vessel here while one took passage on her for the north.


