Ohio and Mississippi Flood Dead Toll Has Reached 300

More Than One Million Are Already Rendered Homeless As Estimated Damage Exceeded Over Four Hundred Million Dollars

CINCINNATI, Jan. 28: (CP)—The flooded Ohio River crashed against weakening levees on its cresting descent to the Mississippi today and the list of known dead stood at 293 while the number of homeless has passed the million mark.

Slowly receding waters lapped idly at empty houses in empty towns and fresh dangers cropped up by the dozens as the crest of the flood swung south at Paducah, Kentucky, the next crisis point.

United States Army and Red Cross officials hurried to evacuate thousands in advance of the flood peak. Plans were going ahead to move half a million people out of the Mississippi Valley in an area one hundred miles wide and one thousand miles long.
