CROWNING OATH IS REVISED

Changes Approved by King And Privy Council to Erase Irritants To Church and State

LONDON, April 29: (CP) -Even the most ancient of English constitutional usages may be modified to meet changed condi tions, as instanced by the devisions effected in the Coronation

These changes have become necessary since the status of the Dominions has altered constitu tionally since the coronation of George V in 1911 at Westminster

The oath has a history extend ing back to the eighth century but in its modern form goes back to the settlement after the revolution of 1688. The latest altera tions in the first section of the oath have been made after discussions with the governments of the Dominions.

The first part of the oath as originally administered referred only "to the people of this King dom of England and the Dom inions thereto belonging." It had to be modified to meet the unior with Scotland, and now has had to be modified again to meet the present composition of the Overseas Empire—the recognition of Indian and of the new status of the self - governing Dominions since the Statute of Westminster! was passed.

The Dominions have now taken their place as co-equal members the British Commonwealth "the free association of which the crown is the symbol."

In the old form of the oath, the Archbishop put the question to the King:

Will you solemnly promise and swear to govern the people of this United Kingdom of Great Bri tain and Ireland and the Dommions thereto belonging, according to the Statutes in Parliament agreed on, and the respective laws and customs of the same? And the King made answer: "I

solemnly swear so to do." In the new form the Arch-

bishon's question is: Will you solefnly promise and swear to govern the peoples of Great Britain, Ireland, Canada. Australia, New Zealand and the Union of South Africa, of your Possessions and the other Terrifories to any of them belonging or pertaining, and of your Empire in India, according to their res

pective laws and customs? And the King will make an swer: "I solemnly promise so to

It is noteworthy the new oath takes no special cognizance of the constitutional difference between the Irish Free State and Northern Ireland, Both, seemingily, are in cluded under "Ireland," thus! comprising a form which could hardly give offence to Free State susceptibilities, as it ignores the present "partition" of the coun-

The second part of the oath, ir which the King answers the Arch bishop's question: "Will you to your power, cause law and justice in mercy, to be executed in al your judgements?" stands as it

Prior to the consummation of union in 1925, the Presbyterian and Methodist churches nag, co-operated for years in missionary activity in the four western provinces. So successful was that co-operation that there was very little overlapping and many local union and community churches were formed in which the people worshipped and worked harmoniously under the leadership of a minister of either of the parent churches.

That co-operation in the Home Mission areas was an important factor in the forming of the United Church by the union of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches in June 1925 and accounts for the fact that the part of the Presbyterian Church which did not concur in the union was left without Home Mission fields.

In pursuing the aggressive policy of establishing missions regardless of what churches serve the area is to turn the clock back many years. The great preaching mission which was held in the United States last fall in which many denominations co-operated revealed to the church leaders that the people are much nore ready for co-operation and unity than are the church leaders themselves. The same would seem true of Canada.

Can any sane person see a reason for opening another church in the Stewart area when at present there is an Anglican minister resident in Stewart and the United Church minister at Anyox spends two weeks of each month in that area holding services at Stewart. Premier and Big Missouri? Each of the churches is paying over one hundred dollars a month of missionary money to maintain their work in that area and now the Presbyterian Church is to spend a

like amount. Is it justified? It is quite true that Mr. Hollingworth had communications from persons in Stewart who are dissatisfied with the churches there. But there is dissatisfaction in our churches in Prince Rupert, some of which is due to us ministers. But what kind of a church is it that capitalizes on dissatisfactions in

other churches? Had Mr. Hollingworth conferred with the superintendents of mis-Social Credit, Dr. R. H. Surely the Board of Home Missions of the Presbyterian Church is not fully conversant with the situation or else has an abundance of mission-

In the minds of the people the scandal of Protestantism is in its divisions.


