Billion and a Half to be Dropped From C. N. R. Balance Sheet Under New Bill

OTTAWA, Feb. 1: (CP)-Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of transport, has introduced in the House of Commons a bill designed to remove some \$1,500,000,000 from the "liabilities" side of the Canadian National Railways balance sheet.

The government will abandon claim to some \$350,000,000 in advances to meet deficits and \$495,000,000 for interest payments.

It is provided, however, that some \$635,000,000 representing federal government loans to railways for capital purposes and appropriations for Canadian government railways capital investment will be placed in an owners' equity trust to protect its prior claim against future profits of the system.

NOW OVER

Ships Being Prepared to Resume Service-UnionMen Favor Return to Work-Win Demands

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 1:-With the Pacific Coast maritime workers' strike unofficially over, officials of steamship companies have begun preparations to get their ships back into commission after the three months' tie-up. Ending of the strike is, of course, contingent upon the approval by a union vote of the tentative agreement which has been reached between the shipowners and union representatives. This tentative agreement has been approved by five out of seven unions, only marine firemen and cooks and stevedores unions having not agreed. That the agreement will be ratified by the strikers is conceded. All union ballots must be in by Wednesday noon. Unions have won their major demands including control of hiring halls, eight-hour day and cash overtime. It is estimated that it will take two weeks to get the ships ready for sea again. A total of 287 vessels have been tied up on the Pacific Coast—85 at San Francisco. 31 at Los Angeles and 20 at Seattle. The loss as a result of the strike to date is estimated at \$650,000,000.



Synopsis of Land Act

PRE-EMPTIONS TYACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown V lands may be pre-empted by British

subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement. Full information concerning Pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information. Victoria, or any Government Agent. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., earrying over 5,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and \$ 000 feet per acre west of that Range. Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed, forms obtained from the Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value . \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultirating at least five agree, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emptions carrying part time condi-PURCHASE OR LEASE Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 10. Land Series, "Purchase and Lease

lands may be acquired by purchase in ten are paid when due and improvements are made during the first two years of not less than 10% of the appraised value. factory or mdustrial sites timber land, not exceeding 40 acros, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stampage.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding to acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed. For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 600 acres may be leased by one person or a company. Under the Grazing Act the Province be range administered under grazing regulawarying conditions. Annual grazing per-mits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in grasing privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock-owners may form associa-
