They had planned getting along further but snow and low ceiling forced them to call it a day. From here they will take off as soon as conditions permit for Aklavik. NEW PACT SOON

OTTAWA—Political observers expect that a new trade agreement between Canada and United States will be ready for submission to Parliament at the next session which it is anticipated will be called early in the year. Direct negotiations with United States officials will be started next month and, if these succeed, the pact should be ready to go before Parliament.

DEMANDS COLONIES

BERLIN—Chancellor Adolf Hitler once again yesterday voiced the demand of Germany for the return of colonies of which she was deprived following the Great War. In a vigorous speech, Hitler predicted that, within five years, Germany would have colonies again.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 22: (CP)—Mrs. Julia Willmothe Henshaw F.R.G.S., authority on native flora of British Columbia and author of several books on the subject, died at her home in the Caulfield residential area of West Vancouver.

Mrs. Henshaw was sixty-eight years of age and had suffered from heart ailment for some time but had been carrying on her work as a columnist and a book reviewer for The Vancouver Sun. She was a prominent worker among the Canadian troops in wartime and had been often decorated. She came to Vancouver in 1891.

BRUSSELS PARLEY AT WORK YET

But Chief Delegates Have Left And There is Little Hope of Anything Decisive Being Done

Japs Walk In On North China

Resistance Appears To Be at Point Of Collapse—May End in Civil War

SURRENDER URGED

SHANGHAI, Nov. 22: (CP)—Japan urged General Chiang Kai Shek, President of China, to surrender in a message dropped to him by Japanese airmen making their first flight over Nanking since the Chinese government announced transfer of its capital to Chungking about 1000 miles further inland. No bombs were dropped—only a message urging a cessation of hostilities.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 22: (CP)—British and American delegates remaining at the nine-power conference here are working on the drafting of a new statement on the Sino-Japanese conflict for submission to the conference today at what it is believed will be the final session. As the leading delegates have already left Brussels, little hope is now held out for any decisive action.

It is generally conceded that the conference has failed owing to the unwillingness of any of the nations to take a lead against Japan.

Dr. Wellington Koo, chief Chinese delegate, over the week-end was making a final effort to have the conference effect some sort of aid to China. With this end in view he visited Paris to confer with Foreign Minister Yvon Delbos of France and also had conversations with representatives of other nations here. There is no indication, however, that he obtained any satisfaction.

Advance Continues

SHANGHAI, Nov. 22: (CP)—Advance of the Japanese continues in China with almost amazing celerity. Soochow was occupied Saturday after a heavy bombardment. There was practically no resistance and only a handful of tired soldiers was found when the Japanese entered the city.

Japanese today reported the capture of Wushih, one of the last strongholds of China's Nanking defenses. Japanese land and air forces began a concerted drive against entrenched Chinese on a line north from Wushih to Kiangyan on the Yangtze River. The Japanese declared the drive would bring troops to the gates of Nanking before the end of the week.

Political friction and military incompetence are held largely responsible for the virtual collapse of the Chinese defence. However, it is predicted that any move to accept Japanese terms to end the war would virtually split China wide open with civil war.

Bank of China. The customs is also being taken over with Japanese replacing Chinese officials.

It is the intention, Japan has given notice, to completely suppress all anti-Japanese activities and, if the international authorities in Shanghai fail to do so, the Japanese are ready to take military action even against foreigners.

France Not Helping

The French government has banned the use of the French Indo-China Railway for the transport of munitions to China. Japan had been accusing France of cooperating with the Chinese in delivering munitions of war.

NEW SPEED MARK MADE

Paul Codas Experiments With Hazardous Altitudes in His Latest Atlantic Flight

PARIS, Nov. 22: (CP)—Paul Codas, famous French long distance flier, left Paris on Saturday for Buenos Aires and last night landed at Natal, Brazil, after making a new speed record for Atlantic crossing. The object of the flight was to experiment in flying at altitudes which are generally considered as the most unfavorable. Codas also chose unfavorable weather for his experiment. The time from Dakar, Senegal, to Natal was 11 hours and 15 minutes.

RESULT OF HIS VISIT

German Foreign Minister Coming to England—Daily Herald Sees Capitalistic-Nazi Alliance

LONDON, Nov. 22: (CP)—One of the important results of the visit of Viscount Halifax to Germany last week will be a return visit of Baron von Neurath, German foreign minister, to London at an early date to continue the conversations. This became known following the return of Viscount Halifax to England yesterday. Last summer von Neurath was to have visited England but the visit was cancelled owing to differences between England and Germany over the Spanish civil war.

Viscount Halifax stated that he had high hopes of better relations between Great Britain and Germany being fostered as a result of the conversations.

In Berlin it was reported that Chancellor Hitler had told the British Lord President of the Council that the anti-communist agreement between Italy, Germany and Japan would have to be accepted in any settlement of international affairs.

Before leaving Berlin Saturday for home after his visit in Bavaria with Chancellor Adolf Hitler, Viscount Halifax was the guest of General Herman Goering, Hitler's right hand man.

Labor Suspicious

LONDON, Nov. 22: (CP)—The Daily Herald, Labor's organ, claimed yesterday that British capitalists and German interests were working together in insurgent Spain. They were endeavoring to exploit labor with longer hours and lower wages. This was bringing London financial interests in close contact with the insurgents.

WINNIPEG WHEAT PRICE

WINNIPEG, Nov. 20: (CP)—Winnipeg wheat futures dropped 2 1/2c to 3 1/4c Friday. November closed at \$1.16 1/2. Reports on Saturday that frost damage to the Argentine wheat crop was greater than had at first been anticipated resulted in sharp advances ranging from 2 1/2c to 2 3/4c.

FISHERIES MENACED

Japan has been operating 26 floating canneries off the North American coast this year, according to Harry Stuhr, representative of the Alaska Fishermen's Union in placing the facts before the State Department at Washington says the Victoria Times. These floating canneries have been taking the salmon that would normally return to British Columbia and Alaska rivers to make up the runs on which Canadian and United States land canneries operate. The Japanese are now beginning to cut in on the halibut banks off our northern coast upon which are based the fishery industries of Prince Rupert and other ports.

But Canada and United States are not alone in being subjected to Japanese invasion of their fisheries. Australia faces a similar threat to her pearl and trochus shell industries. The extent of Japanese poaching operations has resulted in the Australian government commissioning a patrol vessel. Off the Australian coast as in these northern waters, it has been found poaching has been carried on in an organized, large-scale manner, that indicates it is not without the knowledge and even the active support of the Japanese government.

Australia has been moved to protest diplomatically at Tokyo. Labor organizations along this coast have taken the lead in rousing the public to the menace to one of our chief industries. The Canadian and United States governments should not be found lagging in any efforts to safeguard our coastal fisheries.

Japan has already moved to forestall protests from this side, continues the Times. On behalf of the Japanese Department of Agriculture, Dr. Seiji Konda has proposed a plan for the United States and Canada to join with Japan in a scientific investigation of the North American fisheries. Only too well has The Seattle Times described it as a "remarkable proposal." For in such an association of three nations, Japan's interest in these fisheries would be recognized, and Japan's interest, as we are very well aware, is not purely scientific.

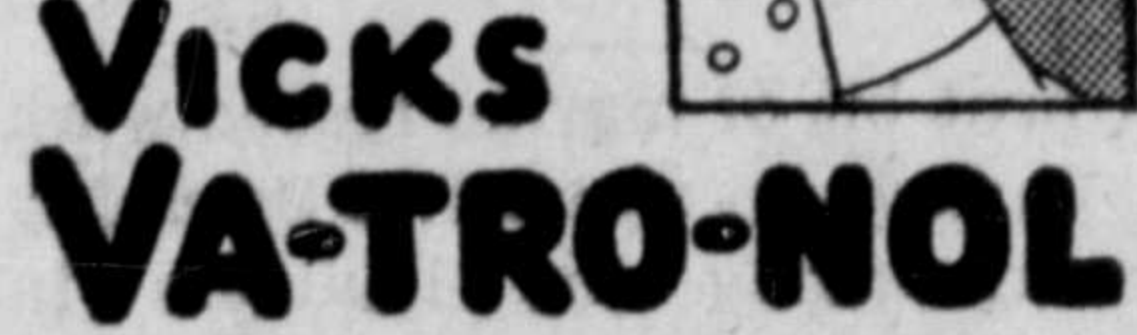

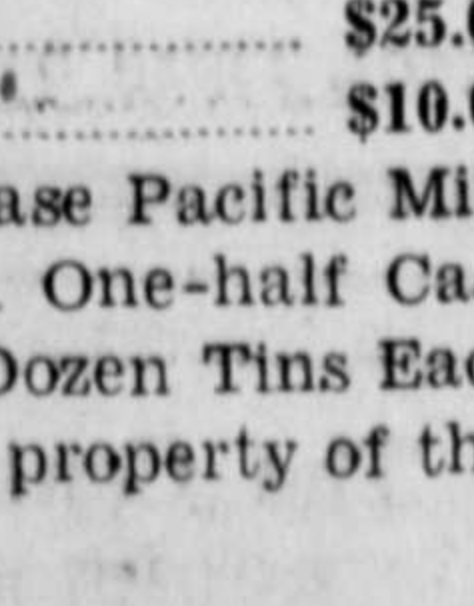

WHIFFLETS

From the Waterfront

Neat Piece of Rescue work Effected Near Here — Shell Fish Plant About Ready — Oil Construction Man Arrives.

A neat bit of marine rescue work was carried out about 6:30 Saturday evening among the boulders in front of Garden Island near the entrance to Metlakatla Passage when Lino Colussi of Georgetown risked his own boat Marjell to pick up Orme Stuart's Columbia River boat which had broken down with pump trouble and was perilously close to being swept ashore in the shoal during a storm which was on about that time. Colussi was coming in from Georgetown when the flashing of a light was seen, indicating a boat was in distress. As the Marjell approached, it touched the bottom itself but did not go fast aground. It was able to give a line to the distressed boat and towed it into port. On board with Orme Stuart was L. H. Haworth. They had been on a hunting trip to Georgetown, having left there at noon Saturday. It was a bad week-end for Orme who was aground on the mud flats while at Georgetown and, after returning to port struck a rock near the Yacht Club.

C.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. Neil McLean, was having a rough voyage south from Prince Rupert to Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands at the end of the week. At 8 o'clock last night the vessel was still stormbound in the lee of Tow Hill. She had made her calls in Massett Inlet on Saturday and was on her way to Queen Charlotte City.

Capt. Dan McKinnon returned to the city on the Catala last evening from Vancouver to resume duties here as resident pilot. As far as is known, the next ship coming here which will require the services of

a pilot is the British motorship Moorby which is due next month to load a full cargo of grain for the United Kingdom or Continent.

The fish packer Marguerite, Capt. H. R. Coulter, of Ketchikan, arrived here yesterday and left today on its return north. It was here on business.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 6 o'clock last evening from the south and sailed at 8 p.m. for Port Simpson, Stewart, Anxox and other northern points whence she will return here on Tuesday southbound.

F. M. Hofer, construction engineer for the Standard Oil Co. of British Columbia, arrived in the city on the Catala last evening from Vancouver, being here in connection with the erection of the company's new plant on the local waterfront.

By the end of this week it is expected that the contractors, John Currie & Son, will have completed construction of the new shellfish cannery on the local waterfront just west of the Imperial Oil Co. plant. Machinery has been installed and the plant is almost ready to be taken over by the Shellfish Packing Co. and put in operation. Supply of shellfish has been organized and the company has already been packing in the old cannery at Sourdough Bay, Seal Cove Crabs, shrimps, clams and oysters will be canned.

A meeting of the city council is called for Wednesday morning for the purpose of authorizing agreements for the sale of lot 52, block 17, section 1 and lot 9, block 4, section 8 as well as the exchange of lot 22, block 46, section 7 for lots 1 and 2, block 16, section 7. Further exchange of old bonds for refunding issue will be authorized and accounts will be passed. A meeting of the school board will be held immediately after the council meeting. City Commissioner W. J. Alder sits at both as city council and school board.
