BOMBING ATTEMPT

Steel Employee Makes Confession—Would Force Election

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., July 6:—State police late today disclosed an attempt to dynamite a Pennsylvania train as it moved past the strike harrassed Bethlehem Steel Corporation plant here. State officers said they arrested Ernest Layton, 21, of Johnstown, who allegedly admitted throwing three sticks of dynamite under the moving train early today. Although the fuses were burned, the dynamite did not explode. Layton's alleged confession implicated two other men. Police said Layton told them he had been a Bethlehem employee until this spring.

Windsor's Vicar Is In New York

Rev. A. H. Jardine Charges Archbishop With "Political Rather Than Spiritual" Views

NEW YORK, July 6:—Rev. A. H. Jardine, former vicar of Darlington, who conducted Church of England rites at Monts, France, when the Duke of Windsor and Mrs. Wallis Warfield were married, arrived here yesterday for a lecture tour of the United States. He said that, if he had to do it over, he would not hesitate to again conducting the marriage. He charged the Archbishop of Canterbury with taking a "political rather than a spiritual" view of the matter.

KILLED BY HEAT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6:—One man dropped dead as San Francisco's mercury soared to an all-time high record. M. C. Aceveda, 45, Santa Clara rancher, collapsed in the doorway of a hotel at 619 Pacific Avenue. He was pronounced dead from a heart attack, induced by heat, on arrival at one of the local hospitals.

GENOVESE WINS OUT

Gordon Wallace Fails in Attempt To Regain Canadian Welterweight Title

TORONTO, July 6: (CP)—Gordon Wallace failed to regain the Canadian welterweight crown here last night when he dropped a split ten-round decision to Frankie Genovese, Toronto Italian, who had dethroned him more than a month ago.

Fans booed the decision which the judges apparently gave Genovese on stamina and cleaner hitting in the last couple of rounds. The referee found in favor of Wallace.

Gordon Wismer Is Sworn In

New Attorney General of British Columbia Took Over Office Yesterday

VICTORIA, July 6:—Hon. Gordon S. Wismer K.C. of Vancouver Centre, took the oath of office as attorney-general yesterday from Lieutenant Governor E. W. Hamber. The swearing-in took place in the presence of members of the cabinet and benchers. Mr. Wismer takes over the attorney-generalship from Premier T. D. Pattullo who had been in charge of the department since the resignation some months ago of Hon. Gordon Sloan to join the British Columbia Court of Appeals bench.

All Time High Temperature In So. Saskatchewan

MOOSE JAW, Sask., July 6:—An all time record for heat in Moose Jaw was recorded yesterday when the thermometer ascended to 106 above. The previous high temperature reading here had been 105. Extremely hot weather prevails throughout Southern Saskatchewan with Alberta and Manitoba becoming more moderate at 80.

BOY LOSES LIFE

VANCOUVER, July 6:—Reuben Rhodes, 16-year old Langley Prairie boy, is dead from injuries sustained when struck in the abdomen by a log in a logging camp. He passed away in the Vancouver General Hospital to which he had been brought after the accident.

TWO SHIPS OVER POND

Successful Survey Flights in Anticipation of Trans-Atlantic Service

BOTWOOD, Nfld., July 6: (CP)—Two trans-Atlantic air liners landed at opposite sides of the Atlantic Ocean today after charting air routes between North America and Europe in anticipation of the new trans-Atlantic service.

The Imperial Airways flying boat Caledonia completed a westward hop of 1900 miles when it landed here from Foynes, Ire., her crossing time being fifteen hours and nine minutes. Later the Caledonia will visit Western Canada cities.

The Pan-American Clipper III, flying in the opposite direction, landed at Foynes after a twelve-hour and forty-minute survey hop from here.

Neither plane carried passengers or cargo.

The Caledonia Sunday completed the first leg of the trans-Atlantic survey flight by making the 351-mile hop from Southampton to Foynes airport.

FRANCES IS CRITICIZED

Gentleman From Georgia Does Not Think Much of Labor Secretary

WASHINGTON, July 6:—Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins has been accused of being ignorant of the dignity of constitutional authority and of raising the Red Flag of revolution over the Labor Department. The statement was made by Representative Cox, Democrat of Georgia, because of Miss Perkins' assertion that no evidence has been shown that the Committee for Industrial Organization is irresponsible and her suggestion that the steel operators and Union leaders be forced to settle their disputes through legal process.

Hearst Denies Chicago Rumor

No Deal or Change in Connection With Herald and Examiner Newspaper

CHICAGO, July 6:—William Randolph Hearst announced in the Chicago Herald and Examiner today that the paper will not be consolidated with any other newspaper nor is it for sale. Hearst's statement was: "Please stop in their tracks hostile rumors being circulated in Chicago. The Herald and Examiner will not be consolidated with any other paper. It will not be changed in style, character or form. It will continue to be published as heretofore. It is not, of course, for sale."

FIREWORKS KILL NONE

Motor Accidents and Drownings Responsible For Most of 563 Fourth of July Deaths

NEW YORK, July 6: (CP)—Lives lost during the celebration of Independence Day in the United States reached 563 with auto accidents responsible for more than half. There were 292 motor fatalities and seventy from drowning. Up to last night not a single fatality as a result of fireworks had been reported.

Widespread Search By Three Nations Carried Out For Lost Aviatrix

United States, British and Japanese Craft Co-operate In Scouring Sea—Confidence Beginning to Wane In Purported Radio Messages

HONOLULU, July 6: (CP)—Vessels of three nations joined in a widening search today for Amelia Earhart after a meteor was mistaken for flares from the missing plane. This morning the coastguard cutter Itasca reported no information from the missing plane. An amateur radio operator at Oakland said that he had picked up a message from the aviatrix this morning saying that she was down 281 miles north of Howland Island in a sinking condition and unable to hold out much longer.

WASHINGTON, July 6:—The new compromise Supreme Court Bill, authorizing the appointment of one new justice each year for every justice retained on the bench after the age of 75, was introduced in the Senate by Senator Robinson. It marked the official death of President Roosevelt's original Supreme Court Bill authorizing the appointment of six new justices.

HAROLD WINCH HOUSE LEADER

Will Head C. C. F. Legislative Group For Time Being

VANCOUVER, July 6:—The Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, at its convention here yesterday, by a vote of 75 to 29, elected Harold F. Winch, youthful member for Vancouver East, head of the party's legislative group. The appointment of a permanent leader was deferred until after the first session of the New Legislature in view of the uncertainty as to whether the C. C. F. or the Conservatives will form the official opposition.

Retired Anglican Rector Passes On

Rev. Charles B. Clarke Died Yesterday in Vancouver

VANCOUVER, July 6:—Rev. Charles B. Clarke, rector of Holy Trinity Anglican Church here for many years prior to his retirement last October, passed away yesterday at the age of 74. He was formerly at Central Park and Sardis.

MAY IT REST IN PEACE

The Townsend Plan, which promised two hundred dollars a month to all people in the United States over sixty years of age, is dead. The scheme was wrecked by its founders and supporters and also by the extravagance of its promises. A proposed convention of its supporters has been called off, the staff of its weekly organ is on strike and people are quarrelling over the prize money offered by that paper. All that the movement now needs is decent burial. The next funeral of this kind may take place in Alberta or it may not. Everybody seems to be expecting it.

LESSON IN PSYCHOLOGY

There was added interest in the outcome of the voting in the five Halifax seats in the general election in Nova Scotia because of the vigor of the campaign waged against the government by The Halifax Herald, says the Victoria Times.

Premier Macdonald launched into open attacks on the Herald, labelling it as "Nova Scotia's public enemy No. 1." Some persons feared the Premier had made a tactical blunder in thus attacking and arousing against him the bitterness of the most widely circulated newspaper in the Maritimes. However, the results prove the Premier understood his public for he and his four Liberal running mates in the Halifax ridings were returned with large majorities.

There would seem to be a lesson in this for newspapers as well as public men. It is the same lesson that was offered last November in United States when, with the big newspapers of the country almost unanimously against him, President Roosevelt and the Democratic party won the most complete victory in the history of United States elections. The public no longer votes as the newspapers say—if it ever did. In fact, in recent years the public has veered around to the point where newspaper attacks on a public man, instead of injuring him with the public, actually build support for him. There is reason to believe that some of our own public men in British Columbia have sensed this apparent anomaly and have not been slow to take advantage of it.

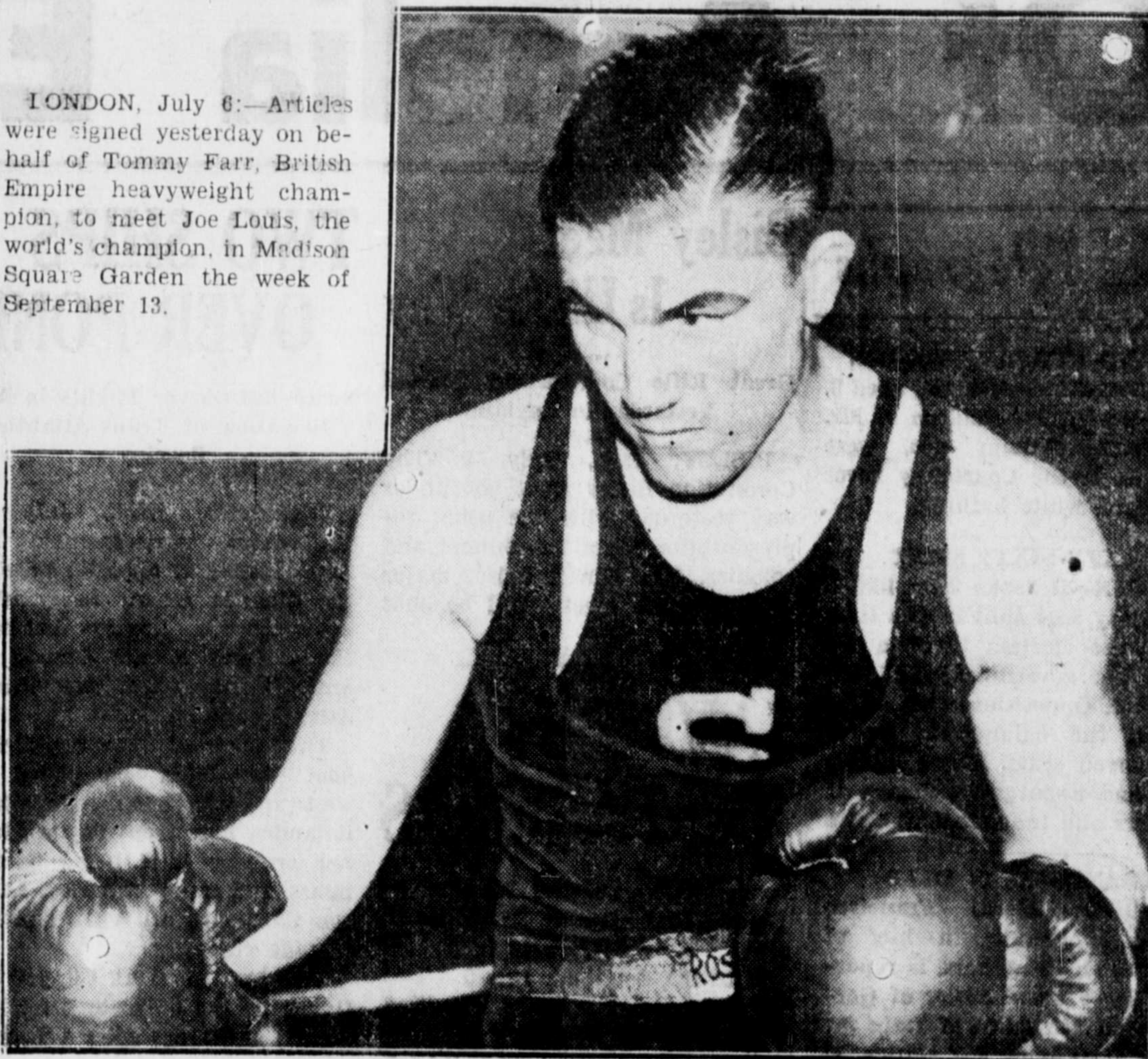

SPORT CHAT

Don Budge and Alice Marble of the United States won the All-England mixed doubles championship at Wimbledon on Saturday, defeating Yvon Petrard and Simone Mathieu of France 6-4, 6-2. Mme Mathieu of France and Adeline Yorke of England, in winning the women's doubles championship, defeated Mrs. Phyllis Mudford King and Joan Pittman of England 6-3, 6-3. Don Budge and Gene Mako, United States, scored 6-0, 6-4, 6-8, 6-1 over George Patrick Hughes and Clifford Tuckey of England to win the men's doubles. Winning of the women's title by Dorothy Round marked the culmination of a successful comeback campaign by the 1934 champion after two years of tennis obscurity. She entered the final by defeating Mme Mathieu of France 6-4, 6-0 in the semi-final. The other finalist, Jadwiga Jedrezejowska, Poland, had disposed of Alice Marble of California in the semi-final, 8-7, 6-2. Enroute to the title relinquished by Fred Perry on turning professional, Don Budge of the United States dropped only one set to Frank Power in the semi-finals. For Baron von Cramm of Germany it was the second defeat in Wimbledon's final. He lost to Perry last year 6-1, 6-1, 6-0. Queen Mary was among the spectators who saw Budge beat von Cramm in this year's final. Some spectators paid as high as \$30 for seats. Budge completely dominated von Cramm in every play.

The triumph of United States over Great Britain in the Ryder Cup team golf championship at Southport, England, marked the first time that either side had won on the other's home grounds and brought the standing in the series begun in 1927 to four matches for the Americans and two for the British.

The 1937 racing season in Vancouver is now on and Lansdowne Park is daily the centre of attractions for large crowds. In fact, the attendance at the races, which commenced last week, is said to be the largest in the history of racing in Vancouver.

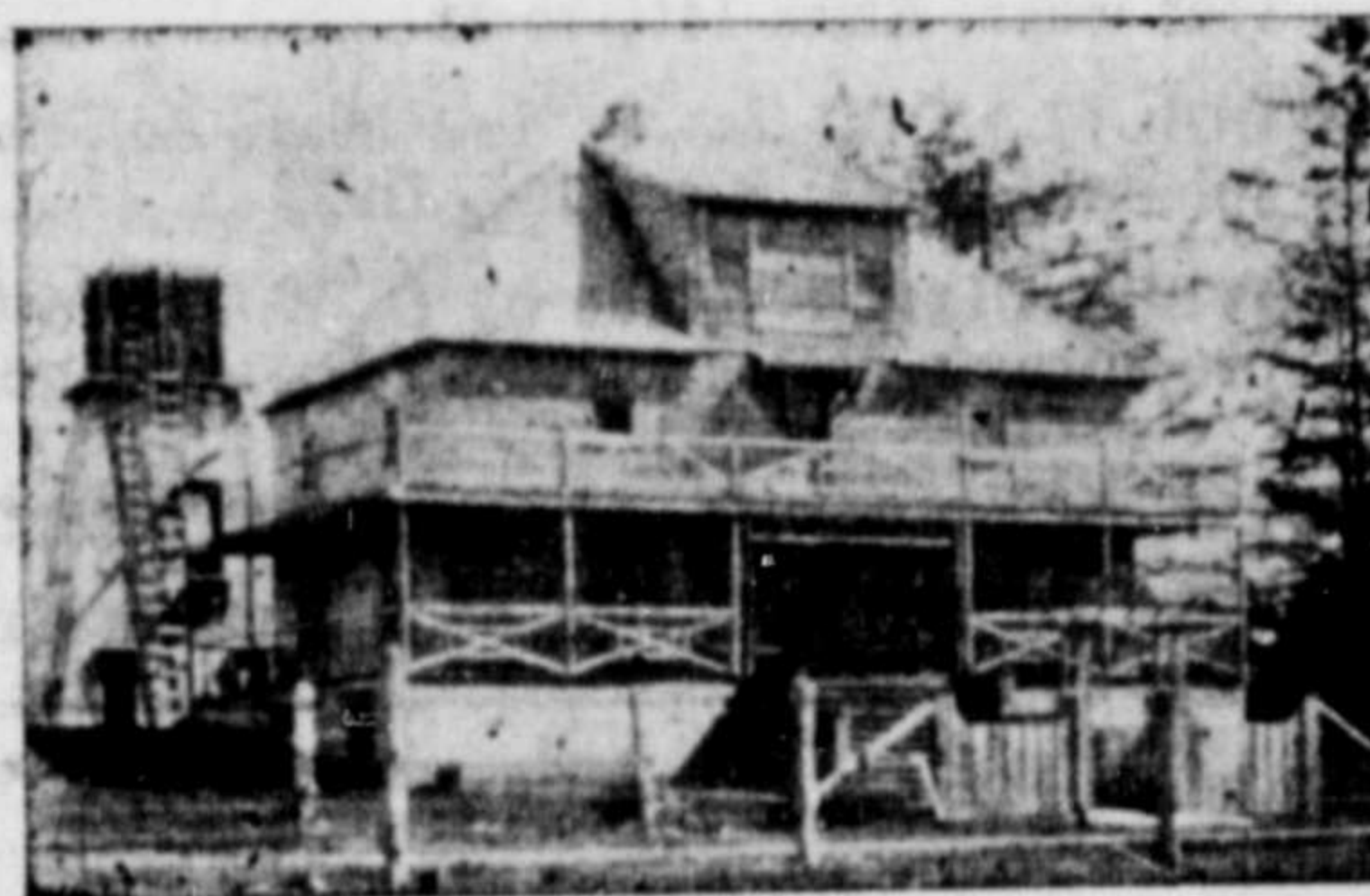

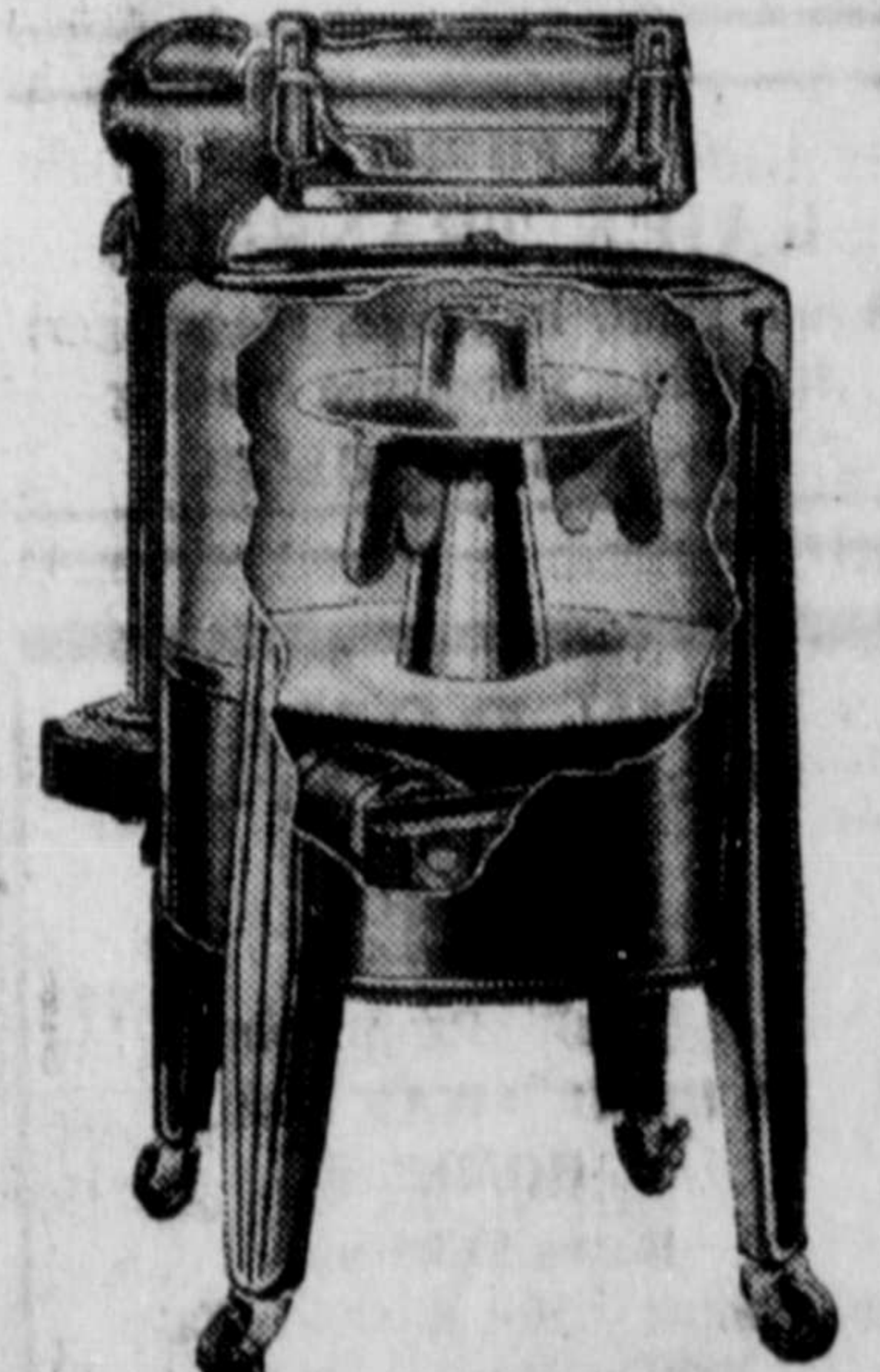
