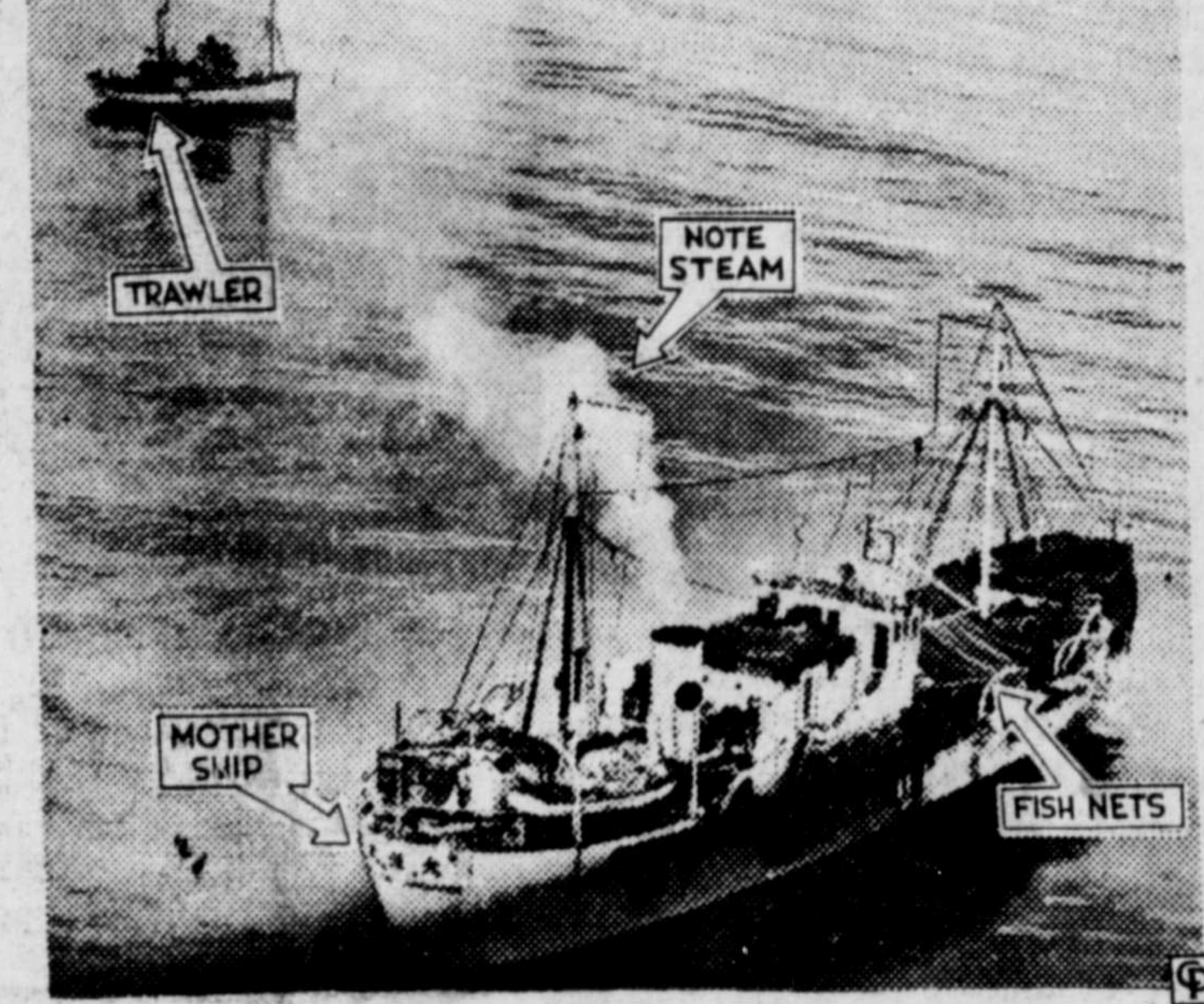
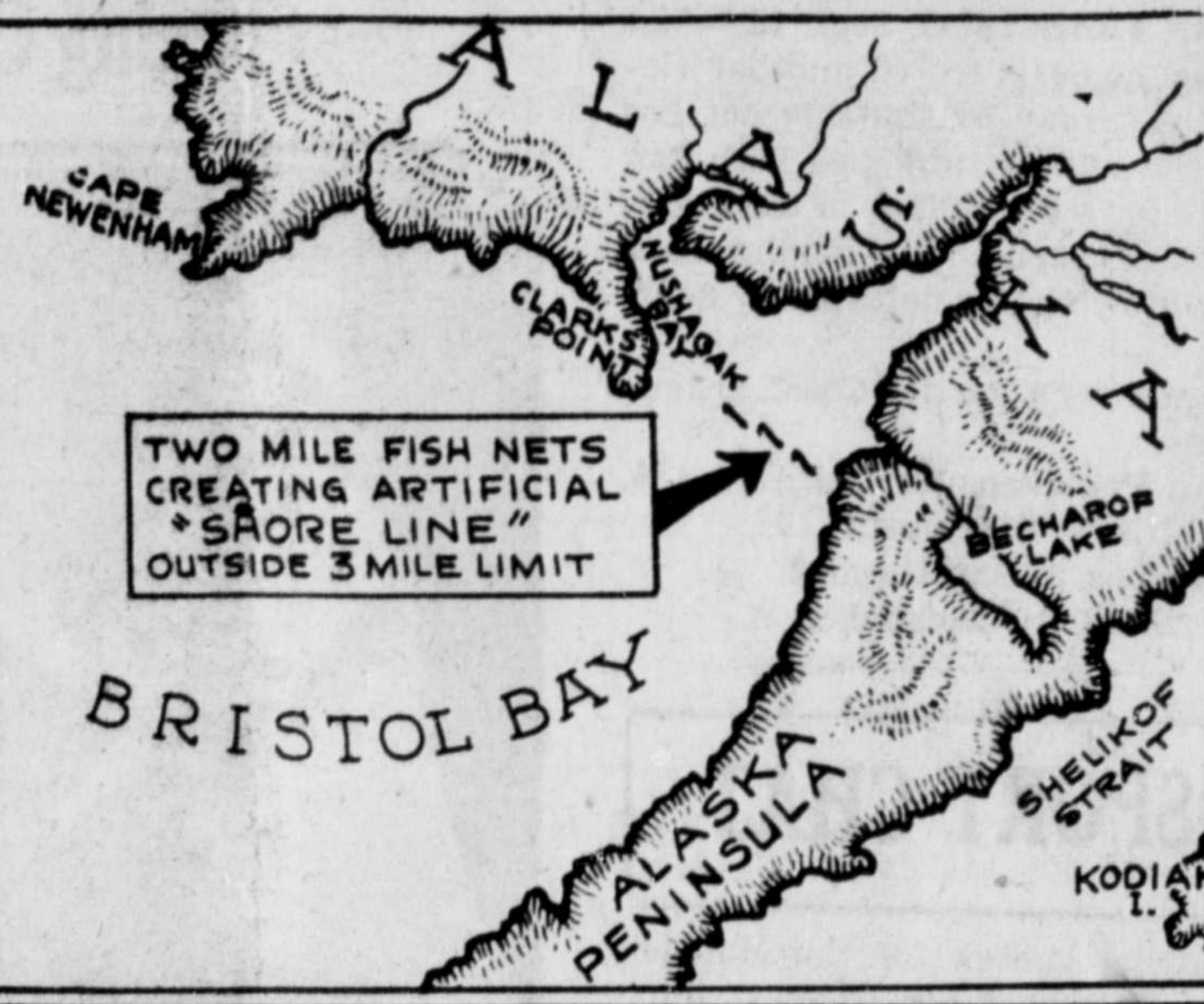

THE RIGHT TO CRITICIZE

Democratic government involves the right of every man to criticize that government and the right of the press to tell what that government is doing and to criticize or comment as the case may be. Take away the right of criticism and you take away democratic government. By criticism error is rectified and excesses are prevented.

Criticism by individuals who hold no public office or who have no record of service to the state has less value than criticism by prominent people or by organizations representing groups of people. These people have to be more careful of their criticism because people have learned to rely on their judgment and are apt to be influenced by what they say. A sense of responsibility goes with the position they hold. If they criticize when it is not justified they lose prestige in the community, which it takes time to recover. So it follows that people in prominent positions or who are representatives of others through being members of organizations should be very careful before they make public utterances designed to influence others for or against any person or policy. The success or failure of democratic government depends to a very large extent on the manner in which democratic principles are carried out.

Owing to the failure of democracy in Prince Rupert in the past, the affairs of the city had to be taken out of the hands of their elected representatives and placed in the hands of a commissioner, whose duty it is to set right, so far as he is able, the mistakes of the past. While he is not above criticism he does not have to take particular note of the critics, who have forfeited their right through failure of their representatives to keep the affairs of the city on an even keel. It is his duty to use his best judgment in doing this. Doubtless he will make mistakes, for which he may fairly be criticized but for which he does not have to answer to the people of the city. He does not represent them. They forfeited their right to direct representation when their affairs went into the hands of a receiver.

When a company fails to pay its debts any shareholder may ask for the appointment of a receiver and the affairs of the company are then placed in the hands of some person who administers them for the benefit of both the shareholder and the people to whom the company owes money. In such case the defaulting company is said to be bankrupt. A city is in very similar position to a company. It is an incorporated group of people conducting its own affairs, only when they run into debt it is difficult for the creditors to sell the assets in order to help pay the debt. Instead of that a commissioner is appointed to administer affairs until the debt is paid.

When Prince Rupert borrowed money to build its schools and roads and sidewalks and sewers it pledged the assets of the city that the money would be repaid as agreed upon. The people of the city were glad to get the money at the time so that they might keep up to date in modern conveniences. When they failed to keep their pledge the commissioner took over the asset which had been pledged and administered them for the benefit of the creditors but also with an eye to being just to the defunct shareholders, who still retained an interest in the city. In fact the city would have no value without the people who live in it.

San Francisco Still Winning

Seals Now Tied With San Diego For Second Place In Pacific Coast League

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—San Francisco Seals scored another victory yesterday by shutting out Los Angeles and are now tied with San Diego for second place in the Pacific Coast League. The leading Sacramento club was defeated by Seattle.

SPORT CHAT

Batting honors for the Marylebone Cricket Club team's tour of Canada, brought to a close in Montreal early in September, went to Nigel Wykes, tall left-hander, whose consistency at the wickets was an outstanding feature of the series of 19 matches played in six provinces.

The Essex and former Cambridge University player who now is a master at Eton, batted 18 times for a total of 674 runs. He was not out on one occasion, giving him an average of 39.64. Although he failed to top the century, Wykes four times made more than 70 runs, his highest total being 89 against United Colleges at St. Catharines, Ont.

J. M. Brocklebank, blond leg-break bowler, proved most destructive of the M. C. C. bowlers, taking 52 wickets for 526 runs, an average of 10.11. Another Cambridge University star, Brocklebank's best feat was against a team of Montreal juniors when he bagged 10 wickets for 27 runs, but he had most success in Western Canada where his slow deliveries had the opposition in difficulty at all times.

The old English rugby international, K. A. Sellar, ran Wykes a close race with the bat and the hard-hitting Sussex man was in the lead when the team concluded its series at the Pacific Coast. In the closing matches at Montreal and Ottawa, Sellar struck a bad patch to fall behind.

Three centuries were rung up by the M. C. C. players. Sellar hit 111 out of a total of 137 runs scored by the Englishmen in their second innings against Hon. R. C. Matthew's Canadian Eleven at Toronto but his spectacular effort did not prevent the Canadians winning by 10 wickets. It was the only defeat chalked up against the tourists who won 12 contests and drew six.

H. J. Enthoven made 101 not out against a Toronto team in the opening match of the tour while C. H. Taylor scored 118 in the closing contest at Montreal.

VETERANS AROUSED

Feel Indignant at Attitude Of Pensions Board Meeting At Smithers

SMITHERS, Sept. 15:—Bulkeley Valley Branch of the Canadian Legion at Smithers, made a visit to Hazelton on Saturday evening and held a quarterly meeting of the Branch with comrades at that place. A number of veterans from Telkwa and Quick also joined the party and a very interesting and enthusiastic meeting was held. The resolutions passed at the Provincial Convention were reviewed.

A resolution was passed at the meeting deploring the miserable attitude assumed by the various Pensions Boards and Commissions when dealing with applications of veterans for pensions or for an allowance under the War Veterans Allowance Act. It was felt that these boards assumed the attitude that the evidence presented in claim for allowances was more or less falsification and that veterans applying were not in need. It is generally felt by ex-service men as a whole that the whole business is a farce and that it is just about impossible for a man to derive any benefit under the various acts in the face of the method adopted in handling these cases. Numerous cases can be cited where this has been the situation and returned men are becoming "fed up" with such administration and are not backward about expressing their views to that effect.

After the business meeting was finished the soldiers spent an hour in singing the old war songs at midnight after a very enjoyable meeting, where friends had met for the first time since the war.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

A couple of hours late, C.N.R. steamer Prince George, Capt. Edward Mabbs, arrived in port at 12:30 noon today from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow night southbound. The vessel brought in a good-sized list of passengers.

At Seattle yesterday two halibut schooners were in with catches from the banks of Area No. 3 with catches totalling 79,000 pounds selling as follows: Wizard, 40,000 pounds, Whiz, 12½¢ and 9¢; Radio, 39,000, Sebastian-Stuart, 12½¢ and 9¢. Two other boats were also in with small catches of halibut incidental to cod fishing in closer waters.

There is no confirmation either at the office of the Dominion Fisheries or the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union of reports which have been in circulation that fourteen Canadian boats have been seized for fishing black cod within Alaskan territorial waters. The report to this effect is believed to be without foundation.

The Armour Salvage co. has taken a month's charter on the halibut boat John Essler for general work locally while regular boats of the Armour fleet are away on other duties. Capt. Paul Armour is taking control of the John Essler with the owner, Walter Bremner, remaining aboard as engineer.

A fifteen-ton anchor block is being installed at Captain's Cove by the Armour Salvage Co. for use of the Kingcome Navigation Co. in mooring tugs and Davis rafts. The anchor block is at present being made at the local dry dock and is expected to be taken out for installation in about ten days.

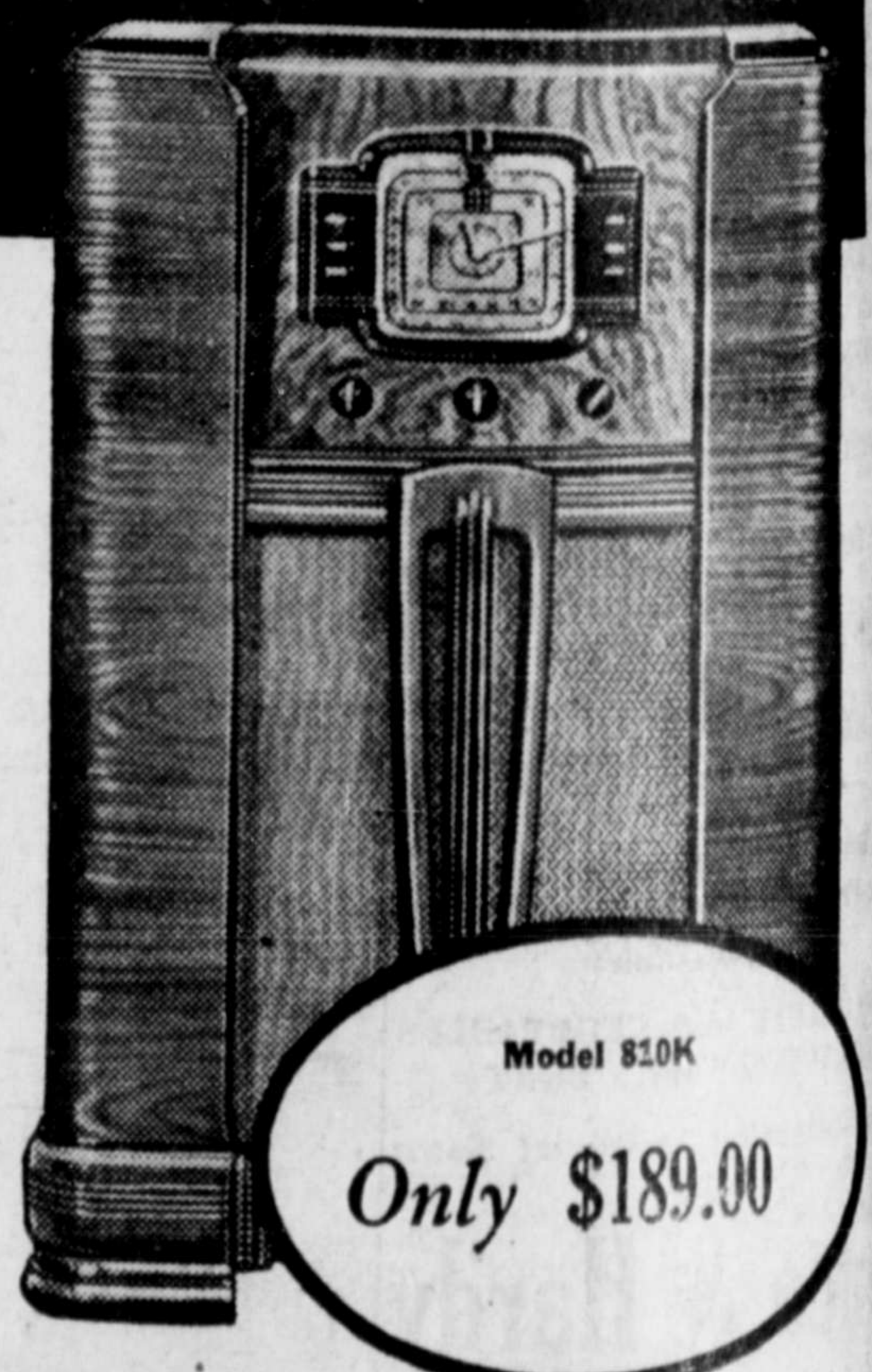
