

General Li Has Telegraphed to the Imperial Representatives Arranging to Meet in the City of Hankow to Arrange Terms of Peace---Where Peace Delegates Will Meet

Shanghai, Dec. 11.—General Li, commander-in-chief of the victorious rebel forces, has telegraphed from Wu Chang to the representatives of the Imperial authorities, who are in refuge at this city, offering to meet them at Hankow for the purpose of aranging terms of peace.

The offer will be accepted, and a meeting with the rebel leaders will be arranged. It is believed here from private information received that the rebels will be agreeable to modified form of monarchy for China, giving wide prerogatives to the people. They will not, however, consent to the Manchu dynasty having anything to do with the throne of China again.

ENTOMBED ALIVE IN COAL MINE

Terrible Fate of 207 Men in Cross Mountain Coal Mine at Tennessee-Only Three Rescued-Small Hope for Rest.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Briceville, Tenn., Dec. 10 .-

Two hundred and seven men, living or dead, are entombed here tonight, as they have been all day, in the great cross mountain coal mine. They had entered to begin their day's work on Saturday when there came a terrific explosion of gas. Only three came out alive.

THE UNITED STATES THANKS THE NEWS.

In its task of making Prince Rupert known all over the Continent, The Daily News receives almost daily some evidence of the attention it is attracting abroad. One of the most amusing of these occurs in a recent number of the Harrisburg Telegraph, which "on behalf of the United States" confers its thanks to the Prince Rupert News. The Telegraph in a lengthy editorial article entitled "Helping the Players" says:

Prince Rupert is a comparatively new and booming town in British Columbia not far from the Alaska line. It is to be the terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, which is now in course of construction, but although it will doubtless be an important city some day, it does seem a little odd that we should be obliged-close as we are to Yale, Harvard, Princeton and Carlisle, not to mention the occosionally efficient University of Pennsylvania-to acknowledge ourselves indebted to Prince Rupert for football pointers, yet so it is.

The Prince Rupert Daily News tells of a game between the Medford High School and Grants Pass teams, in which Medford won by the unusual score of thirty-nine to nothing. The victory is attributed entirely to the girls of the domestic science department in the Medford High School who prepared luncheon for the high school players before the game under the direction of their teacher.

It was the object of the hostesses to provide a menu which would furnish a maximum force, calories, food units, etc., with a minimum of digestive effort. After careful study of the needs of the team, it was decided that bean soup, poached eggs, toast and spring water constituted the proper ration. The girls did the cooking themselves and waited on the table and after they had fed their champions went to the football field to cheer and watch the result of their experiment.

We are informed by The News that "their vocal enthusiasm was superfluous, however, for the soup and poached egg players simply swamped the Grants Pass eleven, who had to rely upon what nourishment the Medford restaurants offered."

Here is an argument in favor of domestic science which seems to have been overlooked by those of us who have advocated its establishment in the public schools of Harrisburg, as well as in the summer playground course. If our young women have been rather contemptuous of the knowledge offerd them in domestic science text books it is because they interpreted it to mean only prosaic "kitchen drudgery" and have not realized its romantic possibilities in the field of sport.

What would be the satisfaction of making a sofa pillow or embroidering a pennant in comparison with the delights of fattening or thinning to the required dimensions a candidate for the varsity team? Or consider the proud distinction of watching your special charge leap victorious against the tape after a hard-fought race, while the uproarious applause of the spectators proclaim the prowess of your skillet and kettle. You could share in every show of strength and every sign of weakness. You could say as he dropped behind:

"It was a mistaken kindness to allow him that charlotte russe."

And when he forged ahead:

"Ah! There go the calories in yesterday's saus-

When, however, the couple again met the following year Cribb wisely left nothing to chance, and entered the ring in superb condition and beat Molyneaux so badly that the black's seconds threw up the sponge within twenty minutes.

From that time until Johnson beat Jeffries there has been no colored champion, though the Bill Richmond, who affords a striking instance of the veteran on the stage. Until he was turned fifty he was not considered of much account, and in the early battles displayed the "white feather." In his fifty-second year, however, he entered the ring Bi-weekly train service to Vanarsdol. against a muscular young fellow named Davis, to whom he was giving twenty-eight years in age and eight pounds in weight, and gained a signal victory.

The following year he accomplished an even greater feat when he decisively thrashed Tom Shelton, who was classed among the foremost heavyweights of the day. Even then his career was not quite over, for in 1818, when in his fifty-sixth year, he had a rattling turnup with Jack Carter, who at that time was laying claim to the championship, and in three rounds put "paid" to that bumptious boxer's account.

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

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
